MINUTES

November 19, 2015



This meeting was available via live audio streaming and was digitally recorded.

1. Call to Order, Pledge of Allegiance & Roll Call

The November 19, 2015, meeting of the Amador Local Agency Formation Commission (LAFCO), held at the County Administration Center, 810 Court Street, Jackson, California, was called to order by Chairman Boitano at 6:00 p.m.

2. Roll Call

3. Approval of Agenda for November 19, 2015

Motion: It was moved by Commissioner Crew, seconded by Commissioner Vinciguerra, and carried unanimously to approve the agenda.

4. Approval of the Minutes of August 20, 2015

Motion: It was moved by Commissioner Murphy, seconded by Commissioner Crew, and carried unanimously to approve the Minutes for August 20, 2015, with Commissioners Boitano and Oneto abstaining.

5. Approval of Claims for November 19, 2015

Motion: It was moved by Commissioner Murphy, seconded by Commissioner Vinciguerra, and carried unanimously to approve the Approval of Claims – Meeting Final as submitted.



6. Public Forum – Public Comment

There were no comments.

7. <u>Jackson Rancheria Development Corporation Reorganization to City of Jackson; LAFCO Project #287; Resolution #2015-07. CEQA: Negative Declaration by City of Jackson as Lead Agency; Exempt from the requirements for notice and public hearing (§56662)</u>

The landowner requests that this agenda item be deferred to the January 21, 2016, meeting due to the unavailability of one of the parties. The deferral was approved by consensus.

8. <u>Proposed Mitigated Negative Declaration for the Rancho Victoria Vineyard Recycled Water Project</u>

Ms. Chamberlain advised the Commission that she was requesting them to review her written comments to the City of Plymouth. After reviewing §56133 and conferring with other LAFCOs around the state, the consensus is that a project of the proposed type does not fit within any of the listed exemptions from LAFCO review and therefore the City of Plymouth should, to be on the safe side, list LAFCO as a responsible agency. Ms. Chamberlain also presented a letter from the Foothill Conservancy stating that they believed this project should be subject to LAFCO review. After discussion, the Commission came to the consensus that the wording of §56133 could be interpreted so as to allow this project to fall under the exemption for wastewater, and that they therefore did not wish to set a precedent for LAFCO review of all future wastewater issues in the county and cities.

Motion: It was moved by Commissioner Murphy, seconded by Commissioner Oneto, and carried unanimously to direct Executive Officer Chamberlain to send a letter to the City of Plymouth stating that the LAFCO Board had determined that no hearing or review by LAFCO is needed to go forward with this project.

9. Other Business, Reports

- a. Correspondence Above-mentioned letter from the Foothill Conservancy was the only item received.
- b. Commissioner Announcements none.
- c. Executive Officer's Report Ms. Chamberlain reported that a CALAFCO dues increase is coming.

She also reported that she had had a good meeting with the Foothill Conservancy and advised them on how best to engage with LAFCO with respect to various projects.

Finally, she reported that she had attended a groundwater management workshop put on by the State Water Resources Board that was very instructive as to issues that may be arising in the future which could affect Amador County.

d. Legislation Report (CALAFCO) – Ms. Chamberlain referred the Commissioners to the CALAFCO legislation report in the packet, specifically pointing out SB88, 229, 13, 226, and AB656.



e. Project Status Update – Ms. Chamberlain referred the Commissioners to the project status report in the packet.

DESCRIPTION AND BACKGROUND

Jackson Valley Irrigation District (JVID) proposes to exercise its latent power to provide treated water pursuant to a compliance order implementing the Federal Safe Drinking Water Act. Under the order & agreement with CA Department of Health Services, (CDPH Compliance Agreement No. 03-10-01CA-001 of 2001) Jackson Valley Irrigation District is required to provide treated water wherever the district's non-treated water is available for residential use. Historically, the district only provided non-potable, untreated water within the district boundaries and to certain parcels outside the district. Government Code section 56133 requires LAFCO approval for service extensions outside district boundaries, but an exemption applies for the transfer of non-potable or untreated surplus water (§56133e). The new service to property outside the boundaries with treated water will require LAFCO approval. That action is included later in this agenda.

JVID's untreated water was primarily used for irrigation and agricultural uses, however in some cases the water was treated by individual customers and used as potable water. For example, the district provided untreated water to the Oaks Mobile Home Park (small individually owned parcels), which is outside the district boundaries. The untreated water is sold to the Oaks Association in bulk to one parcel within the district boundaries and the Association then uses a small, unregulated system to privately serve the water to the individual parcels outside the district.

Over the last few years, the state has moved to eliminate small water systems like that used by the Oaks association, and make safer water available to citizens. Jackson Valley Irrigation District has been working with state regulators and has been providing alternative treated water (temporary bottled water) wherever the district's non-treated water is available for residential use. Simultaneously, JVID has been developing and implementing plans for a long term sustainable treated water supply. Federal and state grant funding for improved public water systems has been used for the construction of the JVID's treatment plant (Phase 1) and will be

used for the transmission and distribution system (Phase 2). The entire cost of the needed infrastructure is paid from state and federal grant funding.

JVID and its services are described and fully detailed in the 2014 Municipal Services Review (MSR), recently provided to the commission. The MSR is made a part of the record of these proceedings. The proposed extension of new water service is consistent with the Municipal Services Review determinations made by the commission in 2014.

CEQA

Jackson Valley Irrigation District, as lead agency, prepared and certified a Mitigated Negative Declaration and Monitoring Program for the extension of treated water, including construction of needed facilities for the provision of this service. CEQA documents are attached to this packet for Commission review. LAFCO, as a responsible agency, participated in the CEQA review process for the project, and the Executive Officer has reviewed and considered the environmental documents prepared and approved by the lead agency, including the findings, mitigations and mitigation monitoring plans, and related documents.

Staff finds that the review of the environmental impacts of the project including the exercise of the latent power to serve treated water, extension of the new service and construction of needed facilities for the provision of this service have been disclosed and adequately addressed by the lead agency and the environmental effects have been adequately mitigated. The district's Mitigation Plan for the project is approved and attached as Exhibit A to Resolution #2016-01.

FINANCING PLANS

The cost of infrastructure, including the pipeline and treatment plant to bring water from Pardee reservoir to Lake Amador (Phase 1) and the transmission and distribution system (Phase 2) is grant funded through federal and state grants including the Safe Drinking Water State Revolving Fund and Prop 1 funds. The district is taking advantage of grant funding for disadvantaged communities and system consolidation program for eliminating small, unregulated private water treatment systems, such as the one used for the Oaks community. To comply with grant requirements, JVID has prepared extensive funding analysis, established a rate structure with inflation adjustments and long-term capital maintenance costs, and developed detailed 5-year projected budgets based on fixed and variable costs. The financial analysis demonstrates sustainability of the system. The financing structure apportions a pro-rata share of all costs to the Resort at Lake Amador, the Oaks Association (a bulk water customer with a master meter) and the other water users. The rate and budget methodologies are transparent and thorough. The district will accomplish the project without incurring debt. The JVID 5 year budget projections are attached.

SERVICE PLANS

In addition to financing plans, the district has prepared capital improvement plans, detailed system engineering, phased construction plans and evidence of existing water rights and entitlements. These documents have been reviewed by the Executive Officer. The water lines follow existing road right of way and utility easements. The district will finalize certain

arrangements for easements with the county and other parties.

Two conditions for the final grant funding remain and are expected to be completed by the end of January. The district is vetting the rate structure and soliciting objections (described by JVID as a Prop 218 requirement). The final action on the rate structure will occur January 27, 2016 at the JVID board meeting. The district is also finalizing its contractual agreement with the Oaks community and signatures are expected within the same time frame. Staff recommends these two remaining conditions be part of the LAFCO resolution authorizing the extension of new service to ensure adequacy of revenues for sustainability of the new service.

DETERMINATIONS & FINDINGS

Staff recommends the following determinations based on project research, state law and local policies:

- 1. The commission finds that Jackson Valley Irrigation District, as lead agency for the project, has fulfilled its obligations under the California Environmental Quality Act. The environmental impacts of the project, and the extension of treated water, including construction of needed facilities for the provision of this service have been disclosed and adequately addressed by the lead agency. The Commission has fulfilled its obligations as a responsible agency as defined by the California Environmental Quality Act and finds that the environmental impacts of the reorganization have been disclosed and adequately addressed by the lead agency.
- 2. Jackson Valley Irrigation District is the only logical provider of treated water in the area where services are required. There are no feasible alternatives for the provision of this service.
- 3. Following approval of the proposal by the Commission, the proposal is subject to conducting authority proceedings under Government Code §57076.
- 4. Jackson Valley Irrigation District will have sufficient revenues to carry out the proposed new service subject to the approval of proposed new water rates and charges and completion of a service agreement with the Oaks Community. These requirements are anticipated by the Commission to be completed on or about January 27, 2016, and conditions are added to ensure that if the revenue sources pursuant to Section 56886 are not approved, the authority of the special district to provide new or different functions or class of services shall not be established.

RECOMMENDATIONS

The Executive Officer recommends that the Commission take the following actions:

1. Find that the environmental documents prepared by JVID are adequate and complete for the extension of new treated water service.

- 2. Adopt Resolution #2016-01, making determinations and approving the exercise of a new function and class of service by Jackson Valley Irrigation District.
- 3. Direct the Executive Officer to conduct a protest hearing and prepare and file a Notice of Determination pursuant the California Code of Regulations.
- 4. Direct the executive officer to complete the necessary filings and transmittals for the new service as required by statute and policy.

RESOLUTION MAKING DETERMINATIONS AND APPROVING THE EXERCISE OF A NEW FUNCTION (TREATED WATER SERVICE) BY THE JACKSON VALLEY IRRIGATION DISTRICT (LAFCO PROJECT #280)

WHEREAS, Jackson Valley Irrigation District proposes to exercise its latent power to provide treated water pursuant to a compliance order implementing the Federal Safe Drinking Water Act, and

WHEREAS, under the order & agreement with California Department of Health Services, (CDPH Compliance Agreement No. 03-10-01CA-001 of 2001) Jackson Valley Irrigation District is required to provide treated water wherever the district's non-treated water is available for residential use; and

WHEREAS, Jackson Valley Irrigation District has secured state and federal grant funding sufficient for construction costs through the State Water Resources Control Board Safe Drinking Water State Revolving Fund program for disadvantaged communities and Proposition 1 for consolidation of small systems; and

WHEREAS, Jackson Valley Irrigation District Resolution No. 383-08-15 making application to activate a latent power and add a new class of service (treated water) was filed with the Executive Officer of this Local Agency Formation Commission pursuant to the Cortese/Knox/Hertzberg Local Government Reorganization Act, commencing with Section §56000, et seq. of the Government Code and specifically with Article 1.5, §56824.10, et.seq; and

WHEREAS, the Executive Officer has examined the resolution, and associated plans for service and service financing, and has certified that the application to exercise a latent power and provide a new service is complete; and

WHEREAS, Jackson Valley Irrigation District as lead agency prepared and certified a Mitigated Negative Declaration and Monitoring Program for the extension of treated water, including construction of needed facilities for the provision of this service and found the MND and related documents. LAFCO, as a responsible agency participated in the CEQA review process for the project and the Commission has reviewed and considered the environmental documents prepared and approved by the lead agency including the findings, mitigations and mitigation monitoring plans, and related documents; and

WHEREAS, the Commission has received, heard, discussed and considered all oral and written information related to the proposal, including but not limited to comments and objections, the Executive Officer's report and recommendation, the environmental review, the Municipal Service Review of 2014, plans for providing and financing the new service;



WHEREAS, the Commission does hereby make the following determinations regarding the proposal:

- Jackson Valley Irrigation District, as lead agency for the project, has fulfilled its
 obligations under the California Environmental Quality Act. The environmental impacts
 of the project, and the extension of treated water, including construction of needed
 facilities for the provision of this service have been disclosed and adequately addressed
 by the lead agency.
- 2. Jackson Valley Irrigation District is the only logical provider of treated water in the area where services are required. There are no feasible alternatives for the provision of this service.
- 3. Following approval of the proposal by the Commission, the proposal is subject to conducting authority proceedings under Government Code §57076.
- 4. Jackson Valley Irrigation District will have sufficient revenues to carry out the proposed new service subject to the approval of proposed new water rates and charges and completion of a service agreement with the Oaks Community. These requirements are anticipated to be completed on or about January 27, 2016, and conditions are added below to ensure that if the revenue sources pursuant to Section 56886 are not approved, the authority of the special district to provide new or different functions or class of services shall not be established.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED, DETERMINED AND ORDERED as follows:

- 1. The environmental impacts of the project including the exercise of the latent power to serve treated water, extension of the new service and construction of needed facilities for the provision of this service have been disclosed and adequately addressed by the lead agency and the environmental effects have been adequately mitigated.
- 2. Pursuant to Section 15096 of the CEQA Guidelines, LAFCO has considered the environmental documents adopted by the Lead Agency, which contains measures to fully mitigate all potential negative environmental impacts. LAFCO hereby adopts the District's Conditions of Approval and Mitigation Monitoring Program as approved by the Lead Agency and attached as Exhibit "A" to this resolution.
- 3. The Jackson Valley Irrigation District's request to exercise its latent power to serve treated water is approved, subject to the following conditions:
 - Payment of all applicable LAFCO fees and outstanding charges



- Completion and establishment of rates and charges by the district sufficient to comply with the requirements of California Department of Health Compliance (CDPH) agreement No. 03-10-01-CA-001
- Completion of an agreement with the Oaks community as required by California Department of Health Compliance (CDPH) agreement No. 03-10-01-CA-001.
- 4. The Executive Officer is hereby directed to file a Notice of Determination in compliance with the California Environmental Quality Act and local ordinances implementing the same.
- 5. The Executive Officer is hereby directed to conduct a protest hearing and complete all necessary filings and transmittals needed to complete this approval.
- 6. The effective date shall be the date of recording.

MITIGATION MONITORING PLAN FOR THE PHASE 2 TREATED WATER PROJECT

Jackson Valley Irrigation District shall be the agency responsible for implementing the mitigation measures specified in this Mitigation monitoring Plan.

Air Pollution

Mitigation Measures:

- 1. During construction, Stony Creek Road, Jackson Valley Road, Buena Vista Road, Martin Lane, Camanche Road, Camanche Parkway and Curran Road shall be kept free of dust, dirt and mud.
- 2. All vehicles leaving the work site shall be cleaned to prevent dirt and mud from reaching adjacent roads.
- 3. Use dust palliatives or moisture control to reduce fugitive dust during construction.
- 4. Cease earthwork operations during periods of rain or high wind conditions.

Biological Communities

Mitigation Measure:

Migratory Birds & Birds of Prey

- If construction begins outside the 1 February to 31 August breeding season, there will no need to conduct a preconstruction survey for active nests. If a nest becomes active after construction has started, then the bird is considered adapted to construction disturbance.
- 6. If construction is scheduled to begin between 1 February and 31 August then a qualified biologist shall conduct a preconstruction survey for active nests at the construction site and within 250 feet of the construction site from publicly accessible areas within 30 days prior to construction. If no active nest of a bird of prey or Migratory Bird Treaty Act (MBTA) bird is found, then no further mitigation measures are necessary. If an active nest of a bird of prey or MBTA bird is found, then the biologist shall flag a minimum 250 foot Environmentally Sensitive Area (ESA) around the nest if the nest is of a bird of prey, and a minimum 100 foot ESA around the nest if the nest is of an MBTA bird other than a bird of prey. No construction activity shall be allowed in the buffer until the biologist determines that the nest is no longer active, or unless monitoring determines that a smaller buffer will protect the active nest. The buffer may be reduced if the biologist monitors the construction activities and determines that no disturbance to the active nest is occurring. The size of suitable buffers depends on the species of bird, the location of the nest relative to the project, project activities during the time the nest is active, and other project specific conditions.

Mitigation Measure:

Jurisdictional Waters

7. Potential jurisdictional water features subject to jurisdiction under Section 404 of the CWA shall be shown on construction design drawings. A note will be placed on the drawings stating that prior to any work that requires trenching or placement of fill in jurisdictional features, the applicant shall obtain a Section 404 Nationwide Permit and a Section 401 Water Quality Certification, as applicable. The project proponent shall fulfill the mitigation requirements of the permits.

Archaeological and Historic Resources

Mitigation Measures:

8. A professional archaeologist will monitor the construction in the area of the Native American village. Should any sensitive objects be located during this portion of the construction activities, all work shall halt and the California SHPO shall be immediately notified.

Geology and Soils

Mitigation Measures:

Exposed Soils

- 9. Revegetate newly disturbed exposed soils with Blando Brome at 40 pounds of live seed per acre with Type 16-20-0 fertilizer at 250 pounds per acre; or hydromulch all exposed soils prior to October 15th.
- 10. Incorporate methods to ensure slope stabilization in newly disturbed areas.
- 11. Submit an erosion control plan for review and approval by the Amador County Department of Public Works and Region 2 of the California Department of Fish & Game, if required.

Erosion and Siltation

Mitigation Measures:

- 12. Implement general construction measures during construction as follows:
 - Limit soil disturbance to the minimum necessary to complete the pipeline improvements;
 - Protect all erodible surfaces prior to the advent of fall storms;
 - Clear slopes only when construction is scheduled;
 - Provide temporary surface drainage for topsoil and spoil piles; and
 - Berm graded material to maximize temporary ponding and minimize surface water flow across graded areas.
- 13. Improve all swale/gully outfalls to resist erosion and channel scouring, preferably with vegetation and, if necessary, selective application of gunite or similar material.
- 14. Install filter strips (waddles) to maximize infiltration and minimize runoff from the project site.

- 15. Install permanent sediment traps at runoff points once all improvements are in place, if necessary.
- 16. Demonstrate methods to prevent adverse effects on tributary seasonal drainages, drainage ways, and Jackson Creek.
- 17. All storm drainage improvements shall be sufficient to comply with County standards and adequately convey storm water.
- 18. Obtain a Construction Activities Storm Water General Permit from the Central Valley Regional Water Quality Control Board prior to start of construction.
- 19. If required, prior to any work within the Jackson Creek streambed, obtain a Temporary Streambed Alteration Agreement from the California Department of Fish and Game.
- 20. As applicable, consult with the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers for any permit requirements related to Jackson Creek.

Noise

Mitigation Measure:

- 21. All construction equipment shall be properly muffled in compliance with State of California requirements.
- 22. Construction shall occur during daylight hours.

DESCRIPTION AND BACKGROUND

Jackson Valley Irrigation District (JVID) proposes a sphere of influence for treated water representing a different area than its sphere of influence for non-treated water (adopted by LAFCO August 20, 2015.) The sphere represents the plan and geographic area where the district is required to serve treated water pursuant to a compliance order implementing the Federal Safe Drinking Water Act. Under the order & agreement with CA Department of Health Services, (CDPH Compliance Agreement No. 03-10-01CA-001 of 2001) Jackson Valley Irrigation District is required to provide treated water wherever the district's non-treated water is available for residential use. The proposed treated water sphere of influence represents this area. It includes property inside and outside district boundaries. The map is attached as Exhibit A to Resolution 2016-02.

JVID and its services are described and fully detailed elsewhere in this agenda for LAFCO Projects 280 and 285 and in the 2014 Municipal Services Review (MSR) recently provided to the commission. These materials are made a part of the record of these proceedings.

CEQA

Jackson Valley Irrigation District as lead agency prepared and certified a Mitigated Negative Declaration and Monitoring Program for the extension of treated water, including extension of treated water outside the boundaries. CEQA documents are attached to this packet for Commission review. LAFCO, as a responsible agency participated in the CEQA review process for the project and the Commission has reviewed and considered the environmental documents prepared and approved by the lead agency including the findings, mitigations and mitigation monitoring plans, and related documents.

Staff finds that the review of the environmental impacts of the project including the adoption of a sphere of influence, extension of treated water outside the boundaries, exercise of the latent power to serve treated water, extension of the new service and construction of needed facilities for the provision of this service have been disclosed and adequately addressed by the lead agency

and the environmental effects have been adequately mitigated. The district's Mitigation Plan for the project is approved and attached as Exhibit "C" to Resolution #2016-02.

The staff recommended determinations, CEQA findings and conditions of approval are included in the draft resolution.

RECOMMENDATIONS

Staff recommends that the Commission take the following actions:

- 1. Find that the environmental documents are adequate and complete for adoption of the Jackson Valley Irrigation District sphere of influence for treated water.
- 2. Adopt Resolution #2016-02, making determinations adding conditions and approving the sphere of influence for the Jackson Valley Irrigation District for treated water.
- 3. Direct the Executive Officer to prepare and file a Notice of Determination pursuant the California Code of Regulations.
- 4. Direct the executive officer to complete the necessary filings and transmittals as required by statute and policy.

WHEREAS, pursuant to the Cortese/Knox/Hertzberg Local Government Reorganization Act, commencing with §56000, et seq. of the Government Code, and specifically in accordance with §56425; and

WHEREAS, a comprehensive municipal services review has been completed and was found by LAFCO to be adequate and complete on May 22, 2014; and

WHEREAS, under an order & agreement with CA Department of Health Services, (CDPH Compliance Agreement No. 03-10-01CA-001 of 2001) Jackson Valley Irrigation District is required to provide treated water wherever the district's non-treated water is available for residential use; and

WHEREAS, the functions and classes of services provided by the Jackson Valley Irrigation District as of this date, January 21, 2016, are determined to be treated water, untreated water, wholesale treated and untreated water, limited wastewater service, temporary distribution of bottled water and limited hydroelectric power, as described in the Municipal Services Review and district plans of service; and

WHEREAS, the adoption of the sphere of influence of Jackson Valley Irrigation District for treated water is initiated by Jackson Valley Irrigation District; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors of the Jackson Valley Irrigation District Board of Directors has reviewed and considered the proposed sphere in a public hearing and recommends the proposed sphere of influence as shown in Exhibit A. The sphere of influence for treated water is a different geographic area than the sphere of influence for the district's other services; and

WHEREAS, Jackson Valley Irrigation District as lead agency prepared and certified a Mitigated Negative Declaration (MND) and Monitoring Program for the extension of treated water, including construction of needed facilities for the provision of this service in the sphere of influence area. LAFCO, as a responsible agency participated in the CEQA review process for the project and the Commission has reviewed and considered the environmental documents prepared and approved by the lead agency including the findings, mitigations and mitigation monitoring plans, and related documents; and

WHEREAS, at the times and in the form and manner required by law, Executive Officer has given notice of the hearing by this Commission; and

WHEREAS, upon the date, time and place specified in said notice of hearing and in any order or orders containing such hearing, the Commission has received, heard, discussed and considered all oral and written testimony related to the sphere of influence, including but not limited to comments, objections, the Executive Officer's written and oral report and recommendation, the environmental determination, the municipal services review, and the

previously adopted sphere of influence;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED, DETERMINED AND ORDERED as follows:

- 1. Jackson Valley Irrigation District, as lead agency for the project, has fulfilled its obligations under the California Environmental Quality Act. The environmental impacts of the project, and the extension of treated water within the sphere area, including construction of needed facilities for the provision of this service have been disclosed and adequately addressed by the lead agency. Pursuant to Section 15096 of the CEQA Guidelines, LAFCO has considered the environmental documents adopted by the lead agency. LAFCO hereby adopts the District's Conditions of Approval and Mitigation Monitoring Program as approved by the lead agency that contains measures that fully mitigate all potential negative environmental impacts and which are attached as Exhibit "C" to this resolution.
- 2. The sphere of influence of Jackson Valley Irrigation District is determined and approved as shown on the attached map marked "Exhibit A", subject to the following terms and conditions:
- Payment of all applicable LAFCO fees and outstanding charges.
- Completion and establishment of rates and charges by the district sufficient to comply with the requirements of California Department of Health Compliance (CDPH) agreement No. 03-10-01-CA-001
- Completion of an agreement with the Oaks community as required by California Department of Health Compliance (CDPH) agreement No. 03-10-01-CA-001.
- Treated water service within the sphere of influence is limited to the service connections required by California Department of Health Compliance (CDPH) agreement No. 03-10-01-CA-001 for treated water service connections to existing customers who have untreated water available for domestic uses.
- Changes to levels of service provided by JVID and new or additional treated water service within the sphere of influence but outside the boundaries of the district are subject to all applicable state laws, including the California Environmental Quality Act and the Knox-Cortese-Hertzberg Act.
- 3. Determinations with respect to the Sphere of Influence for Jackson Valley Irrigation District are set forth and described in the attached "Exhibit B" and are incorporated herein by this reference.
- 4. The Executive Officer is hereby directed to file a Notice of Determination in compliance with the California Environmental Quality Act and local ordinances and complete the necessary filings and transmittals required by law and locally adopted policy
