

Discussion: NCE performed surveys of representative samples of each section of our road system. After measuring distresses such as cracking and weathering, a database was created using StreetSaver software. Based on the effect of each distress on the remaining service life of a pavement, each section was given a rating known as a Pavement Condition Index (PCI) between 1 and 100. This number objectively groups pavements into the following categories:

With the reality of limited funding, the software also determines which roads will benefit the most from treatment today, providing the longest remaining pavement life for a given budget. The roads with the highest benefit-cost ratio are shown as green and blue in the following map:



Pending field inspection to verify the treatment of these sections, the following sections (measured in centerline miles) are recommended for this project:

Measures / Evaluation: This project will provide preventative maintenance to approximately 11 centerline miles (or 22 lane-miles) of county roads with an estimated cost of \$38,000 per lane-mile for a total estimate of \$836,000. Service life in these sections will be extended 7-10 years and prevent these sections from needing more expensive repairs in the future.

During the November Board meeting, the Board supported the consultant recommendation of a budget split of 80% toward preventative maintenance of the better, higher PCI, roads and 20% toward reconstruction and patching of the lower PCI roads. Staff has utilized StreetSaver to generate a list of roads which would benefit from preventative maintenance in the form of Microsurfacing. Staff reduced that list to 11.2 miles of roads through out Amador County as shown on the Staff Report. Tree Mortality Hazard Tree Removal Plan

The Tuolumne County Board of Supervisors proclaimed a Local State of Emergency due to drought conditions in February 2014 and has renewed it every 30 days as required by the California Emergency Services Act, Article 14 §8630(c). Four years of extreme drought have created cascading effects to the residents of Tuolumne County such as failing wells and pervasive tree mortality. It is estimated there are over 29 million dead trees in California and this number continues to grow. As a result, the Board of Supervisors proclaimed a Local State of Emergency on September 15th, 2015.

There are several tools Tuolumne County will employ in approaching removal of hazard trees that threaten public infrastructure and public safety.

An important role County OES fulfills is education and outreach. With regard to the tree mortality emergency, staff has been meeting with and providing guidance to other local jurisdictions on how to access CDAA (e.g. Community Service Districts, School Districts). This process includes:

Presentations will be made to local service clubs seeking assistance on behalf of private landowners.

Community forums were an effective tool in communicating with residents during past emergencies and will be employed once jurisdictional plans are finalized.

Role of all Local Governmental Agencies

Each agency must apply for CDAA independently of the County and is responsible to develop its own plans based on what their governing Board desires to accomplish and within their jurisdictional authority. Local governments include County, City, special districts and Tribes. It is important for the Board and the community to understand that the application for CDAA and the way in which each agency implements their plan is between them and Cal OES.

Hazard Tree Removal on County Owned and Maintained **Properties**

The County of Tuolumne has been in the process of identifying and removing dead and dying trees due to drought and successful bark beetle infestation for months now. This process continues as the number of hazard trees has greatly increased. Public safety and continuity of essential services (power, water, communications, roads, etc.) are of primary concern. Therefore, County resources will be focused in the following areas:

- > Roads
- County Facilities
- Airports

Tuolumne County will assess all County owned and maintained infrastructure for dead and/or dying trees due to drought and bark beetle infestation within 200 feet of infrastructure. Registered Professional Foresters (and/or licensed Arborists) will inspect trees for successful bark beetle attack and designate trees for removal. Visually dead trees (brown from top to bottom) will be marked and pictures taken to document mortality. Photographs will be taken of all dead trees and a GIS mapping system is being developed utilizing GPS locators for each worksite.

The Roads Department is assessing all County roads (with assistance of Licensed Foresters or Arborists) and will be prioritized and categorized as outlined below:

Priority 1 – Major Collectors (ex. Tuolumne Rd., Phoenix Lake Rd.) Priority 2 – Minor Collectors (ex. Fuller Rd., Woodham Carne Rd.)

Priority 3 – Local Collectors (ex. Subdivisions: Ponderosa Hills)

Only roads in pine belts will be assessed at this time (2,500-6,000 ft elevation).

Private Property

Hazard trees located on private property, that threaten public Right of Way or Public Infrastructure, will be assessed and removed with landowner approval only (Right of Entry Permit attached). By signing the attached permit, landowner allows access and entry to property to the State of California, the County of Tuolumne, and their agents, officials, employees, and/or volunteers, contractors and subcontractors, subject to all license, easements, encumbrances, and claims affecting the Premises. The owner grants County a right-of-entry ("Permit") over the premises for the purpose of inspecting the premises for dead and/or dying trees, testing materials on the Premises, removing and/or clearing trees, hauling and/or disposing of trees, subject to the terms set forth in the Permit. No inspection, removal or clearance of trees will take place until Permit is signed. Owner also agrees and understands the County and/or its agents may sell the felled trees and hereby waives any and all right, actions, claims, in law or equity as to the value of the said trees in exchange for the services provided pursuant to this Permit. The county will not be requesting reimbursement from Cal OES for the removal of trees from private property that do not threaten the public Right of Way or Public Infrastructure.

Removal and Disposal of Trees, Slash and Wood Products

Removal and disposal of wood products is one of the most difficult aspects of the hazard tree removal process as resources are very limited. However, there are several tools available locally to assist in the removal of trees and slash. Located within Tuolumne County are several mills:

- Sierra Pacific Industries
- Ultra Power-Chinese Camp
- > American Wood Fibers

Each has indicated their willingness to become a partner by accepting wood products.

Per the Governor's Executive Order on October 30, 2015, County staff is working with Cal Trans and Cal Fire in identification of equipment such as commercial chippers, masticators, and air curtain burners that can be made available for use. Cal Fire will provide a list of locations for storage locations for removed trees and Cal Trans is assessing their needs for woodchips and mulch that can be used locally.

Meetings with local tree removal companies and haulers has been scheduled to determine capacity for potential contracts.

The County is also in the process of developing a contract with a local company who specializes in all aspects of tree removal, inclusive of consulting on process, site management of sites designated to receive wood product, and rental of equipment.

Inmate Crews

County staff has met with Cal Fire representatives and the local Sheriff's Office in an effort to contract for use of inmate crews. These crews offer a cost effective manner in which to provide labor for removing small trees, limbing trees that have been felled, bucking up logs, debris clean up, and feeding chippers and air curtain burners.

Request for Air Curtain Burner

County is in the process of developing a request to Cal OES and/or Cal Fire to purchase an Air Curtain Burner to dispose of slash, small trees, limbs, branches, and pine needles. A location will be designated to bring slash and other wood products in which local inmate crews will maintain the site and feed the wood products into the air curtain burner.

Potential Revenues Generated by Wood Product

Any revenues generated from the sale of wood products salvaged may be used to offset the local match of 25% or to offset the claim to Cal OES for CDAA. As outlined in the Right of Entry Permit, any and all revenues generated from wood product salvaged from private property is waived, by the landowner, in exchange for the services provided pursuant to the Permit signed by the land owner.

This plan is a rough draft and has not yet gone before the Board of Supervisors for final approval. The plan is scheduled to go before the Board on January 5th for consideration and approval.

R E S O L U T I O N OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF THE COUNTY OF TUOLUMNE December 15, 2015

Declaration of Local State of Emergency in Tuolumne County due to pervasive tree mortality;

WHEREAS,

California Government Code section 8630 and Chapter 2.40 of the Codified Ordinance of the County of Tuolumne empowers the Board of Supervisors to proclaim the existence or threatened existence of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property and are or are likely to be beyond the control of the services, personnel, equipment, and facilities of this County; and

WHEREAS,

On January 17, 2014, the Governor of the State of California proclaimed a Drought State of Emergency as the State is experiencing the most severe drought in history with four years of below average rain and snow; and

WHEREAS,

On February 4th, 2014, the Tuolumne County Board of Supervisors declared a local state of emergency due to drought conditions and imminent threat of disaster and has renewed same declaration every 30 days, as required by the California Emergency Services Act, Article 14 §8630(c); and

WHEREAS,

California is in its 4th year of record drought resulting in widespread tree mortality and a major bark beetle epidemic; and

WHEREAS,

On July 31, 2015, Governor Brown proclaimed a State of Emergency due to a series of wildfires statewide citing drought conditions which have increased the State's risk of wildifires and caused millions of trees to die; and

WHEREAS.

On October 30, Governor Brown issued an Executive Order related to unprecedented tree mortality due to drought conditions, directed state agencies to begin collaborating and partnering with local government to take action to remove dead and dying trees threatening public safety and infrastructure and approved California Disaster Assistance Act funding to assist in these efforts; and

WHEREAS,

US Forest Service and Cal Fire have reported there is over 13.4 million dead trees due to drought and bark beetle; and

WHEREAS,

Unless the risks posed by dead, dying and diseased trees are immediately abated, there will be a significantly increased risk to life and property (e.g. trees falling on homes), and interruption of essential services (i.e. roads, power, water, sewer, communications); and

WHEREAS,

The magnitude of pervasive tree mortality represents a threat that is beyond the capacity of the County (public and private) services, personnel, equipment and facilities and requires coordination and assistance from State and Federal agencies.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Tuolumne County Board of Supervisors do hereby find that the aforesaid conditions of extreme peril warrant and necessitate the proclamation of a local emergency in Tuolumne County and imminent threat of disaster as the result of tree mortality.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Tuolumne County Board of Supervisors does hereby request the Governor of the State of California Proclaim a State of Emergency, approve California Disaster Assistance Act (CDAA) and seek a Federal assistance via a Presidential Proclamation.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the County of Tuolumne also requests the State of California assist in the coordination of resources (e.g. CCC Crews, Prison Inmate Crews, etc...) to assist in the removal of dead and dying trees due to drought and bark beetle infestation.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the County of Tuolumne also requests the State of California to waive regulations that may hinder response (Department of Industrial Relations Registration) and recovery efforts, make available assistance under the California Disaster Assistance Act or any other state funding (e.g. SRA Grant Funds, AB32 Funds, etc...), and to expedite access to federal resources and any other appropriate federal disaster relief programs (e.g. USDA Funding, etc...).

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED AND ORDERED that said local State of Emergency shall be deemed to continue to exist until its termination is proclaimed by the Board of Supervisors, County of Tuolumne, State of California.

Amador County Tree Mortality

Amador County has approximately 376,081 acres. The USDA Forest Service Eldorado National Forest comprises 78,116 acres or 22%. USDOI Bureau of Land Management comprises 9,045 acres or 2.5%. The rest, approximately 75%, is privately owned.

The USDA conducted the latest aerial detection survey of the central and south Sierra foothills July 6-10, 2015. Data collected on the extent and severity of tree mortality and damage during this survey shows current tree mortality in Amador County affecting approximately 60,000 trees on 15,000 acres (roughly 4% of the total County land area). As evidenced from the data and maps, the majority of this area is located within US Forest Service lands.

Aerial Detection Survey - South Sierra Foothills July 6th-10th, 2015




Figure 1. Flown area and drought conditions as of Aug 4, 2015 based on USGS Drought Monitor.

Background: Most of California is well into its fourth year of exceptional drought. As the drought has become increasingly severe and prolonged, tree mortality has generally increased in most areas, sometimes dramatically. This portion of the 2015 regular survey season was conducted for normal data collection within some of the most severe and prolonged drought conditions statewide and included areas of private lands not typically surveyed since mortality and other forest health concerns are not typically expressed in these areas. Particular attention was paid to lowland pine. Current drought conditions in this area are almost entirely exceptional especially to the south. See Figure 1 Objective: Detect and map extent and severity of tree mortality and drought stress along the central Sierras particularly within the Wildland Urban Interface where wild fires can most impact life and property. Much of this area was surveyed in April, but drought stress expression and status of deciduous trees particularly oaks were not discernable at that time. Additionally, more recent conifer mortality is now apparent. Surveyors: J. Moore, A. Jirka, L. McAfee

Methodology: Recently dead or currently injured/stressed trees were mapped visually by surveyors using a digital aerial sketch-mapping system while flying in a light fixed-wing aircraft approximately 1,000 feet above ground level. Surveyors recorded the species of tree affected, number recently killed and/or any type of other damage (defoliation, dieback etc.) detected at each mapped location.

Details:

- Approximately 3.6 million acres were surveyed; covering the lower western foothills of the central and southern Sierras from the
 Sacramento area south to Visalia. Much of this area is privately owned oak woodlands and low elevation pine forests, but public areas of
 note include the western extents of the Stanislaus, Sierra and Sequoia National Forests, Sequoia/Kings Canyon national Park and the Giant
 Sequoia National Monument. See Figure 3.
- An estimated more than 6 million recently killed trees across over 500,000 acres were recorded. See Figure 3.




Figure 2. Gray pine, blue and live oak mortality and discoloration near Yuba River State Park.

- Drought induced oak discoloration/defoliation often associated with suspected mortality was widespread throughout the southern portion
 of surveyed area. Oaks often looked dead and were recorded as such over large areas. However, oak trees are quite tenacious and early leaf
 drop and die back are common drought responses. See Figures 2, 4.
- Well over half of the recorded mortality was of recently killed Ponderosa pine often mixed with incense cedar in the north, other pine species further south or with white fir in higher elevation areas. See Figures 5-8.
- Incense cedar mortality was also elevated and since these trees are not killed by bark beetles, mortality was attributed directly to drought.
 See Figures 5, 8.
- Gray pine mortality was also somewhat elevated but not at levels seen last year. See Figures 2, 7.






Figure 3. Map of area Surveyed depicting tree mortality and other damage.

RESOLUTION OF THE Board OF SUPERVISORS OF THE COUNTY OF AMADOR February 23, 2016

Declaration of Local State of Emergency in Amador County due to pervasive tree mortality;

WHEREAS,	On October 20, 2015, Governor Brown of the State of California, issued an Executive Order related to unprecedented tree mortality due to drought conditions, directed state agencies to begin collaborating and partnering with local government to take action to remove dead and dying trees threatening public safety and infrastructure and approved California Disaster Assistance Act funding to assist in these efforts; and
WHEREAS,	California Government Code Section 8630 and Chapter of the Codified Ordinance of the County of Amador empowers the Board of Supervisors to proclaim the existence or threatened existence of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property and are or are likely to be beyond the control of the services, personnel, equipment, and facilities of this County; and
WHEREAS,	On January 17, 2014, Governor Brown proclaimed a Drought State of Emergency as the State is experiencing the most severe drought in history with four years of below average rain and snow; and
WHEREAS,	On December 14, 2015, California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection issued a news release stating "even with recent rains it will likely take years to slow down the massive tree mortality and bark beetle infestation"; and
WHEREAS,	The latest aerial survey estimated that over 29 million trees have died across California as a result of the drought and the effects of bark beetle infestation, up from 3.3 million in 2014; and
WHEREAS,	Tree mortality from bark beetle infestation has accelerated over the past few months in Amador County; and
WHEREAS,	On July 31, 2015, Governor Brown proclaimed a State of emergency due to a series of wildfires statewide citing drought conditions which have increased the State's risk of wildfires and caused millions of trees to die; and
WHEREAS,	Beginning on September 9, 2015 the Butte Fire in Amador and Calaveras

County destroyed 921 structures including; 549 homes, 368 outbuildings, and 4 commercial properties, caused power loss to thousands of homes and business, and thousands of families to evacuate their homes, all resulting in

part from dead and dying trees caused by drought conditions; and

WHEREAS, Unless the risks posed by dead, dying and diseased trees are immediately

abated, there will remain a significantly increased risk to life and property,

and interruption of essential services; and

WHEREAS, The magnitude of the Butte Fire tree mortality and the pervasive tree

mortality in other parts of the County represents a threat that is beyond the capacity of the County (public and private) services, personnel, equipment and facilities and requires coordination and assistance from State and

Federal agencies.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Amador County Board of Supervisors do hereby find that the aforesaid conditions of extreme peril warrant and necessitate the proclamation of a local emergency in Amador County and imminent threat of disaster as the result of tree mortality.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Amador County Board of Supervisors does hereby establish a tree mortality taskforce and charge it to develop a risk abatement plan, coordinate agency, organization and citizen efforts, seek funding, resolve barriers, and maximize County resources.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the County of Amador requests the State of California include Amador County in the list of Priority Counties within the California Tree Mortality Task Force.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the County of Amador requests the assistance of the State of California in the coordination of resources to assist in the removal of dead and dying trees due to drought and bark beetle infestation.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the County of Amador requests the state of California to waive or expedite regulations, permits and permit fees that may hinder response and recovery efforts, make available assistance under the California Disaster Assistance Act or any other state funding, and to expedite access to federal resources and any other appropriate federal disaster relief programs.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that said local State of Emergency shall be deemed to continue to exist until its termination is proclaimed by the Board of Supervisors of Amador, State of California.
