MINUTES

April 21, 2016



This meeting was available via live audio streaming and was digitally recorded.

1. Call to Order, Pledge of Allegiance & Roll Call

The April 21, 2016, meeting of the Amador Local Agency Formation Commission (LAFCO), held at the County Administration Center, 810 Court Street, Jackson, California, was called to order by Vice Chairman Vinciguerra at 6:00 p.m.

2. Roll Call

Members Present:

Louis Boitano, Chairman (left the meeting as it began) Jim Vinciguerra, Vice-Chairman Patrick Crew, City Member Tim Murphy, City Member Brian Oneto, County Member (arrived at 6:05 p.m.)

Roseanne Chamberlain, Executive Officer Nancy Mees, Clerk to the Commission William Chamberlain, Legal Counsel

3. Approval of Agenda for April 21, 2016

Motion: It was moved by Commissioner Murphy, seconded by Commissioner Crew, and carried unanimously to approve the agenda.

4. Approval of the Minutes of January 21, 2016

Motion: It was moved by Commissioner Crew, seconded by Commissioner Murphy, and carried unanimously to approve the Minutes for January 21, 2016.

5. Approval of Claims to April 21, 2016

Motion: It was moved by Commissioner Murphy, seconded by Commissioner Crew, and carried unanimously to approve the Approval of Claims – Meeting Final as submitted.

6. Public Forum – Public Comment

There were no comments.



7. Wastewater Treatment Plant Reorganization to City of Jackson; LAFCO Project #288; Resolution #2016-05.

Executive Officer Chamberlain gave a brief review of the staff report for this proposal and the Resolution. She explained that this project approves a boundary change that historically was thought to be within the city of Jackson. The reorganization meets the requirements for exemption from notice and public hearing.

Two representatives of the City of Jackson were present: Mike Daley, City Manager, and Susan Peters, City Planner.

Motion: It was moved by Commissioner Murphy, seconded by Commissioner Crew, and carried unanimously to approve Resolution #2016-05, accepting all recommended findings and determinations, and directing staff to prepare all documents necessary.

8. Adoption of the Proposed Budget for Fiscal Year 2016-17.

Executive Officer Chamberlain reviewed the spreadsheets in the meeting packet. She reported that the fund balance was determined conservatively and that spending for the 2016-17 fiscal year should be slightly less than last fiscal year. She also noted that, as in last year's budget, she wished to keep the cities and county cost shares at a reasonable amount and to transfer another \$10,000 into the legal defense reserve.

Commissioner Murphy commended the Executive Officer for her ability to operate Amador LAFCO frugally, yet still accomplish all that is required to be done.

Vice Chairman Vinciguerra opened the Public Hearing. No one was present.

Motion: It was moved by Commissioner Murphy, seconded by Commissioner Crew, and carried unanimously to approve the Proposed Budget for Fiscal Year 2016-17 as submitted.

9. Amador LAFCO Audit Report, June 30, 2015.

Executive Officer Chamberlain summarized the Audit Report by stating that it said the finances and financial procedures of Amador LAFCO looked good and no problems were found. The firm employed for the audit, Gallina LLP, is the same firm the county uses. Because they are familiar with Amador County record-keeping, the firm was able to spend less time on the LAFCO audit, thereby keeping the cost down.

Motion: It was moved by Commissioner Oneto, seconded by Commissioner Murphy, and carried unanimously to receive and file the Audit Report for Fiscal Year 2014-2015.

10. Other Business, Reports

- a. Correspondence an email from the Jackson Rancheria stating that they wished to withdraw their request for annexation of property on French Bar Road into the City of Jackson. Executive Officer Chamberlain reported that all the fees they had accrued for the work already performed by LAFCO have been paid in full.
- b. Commissioner Announcements none.



c. Executive Officer's Report – Executive Officer Chamberlain reported that LAFCO is working with the ACTC GIS planner to verify and correct boundary lines for the various cities in order to correct the county's census maps. This LAFCO GIS map layer will also be able to interact with other county agencies and will have a link on the website that will be accessible to anyone who needs to see them.

LAFCO is also working on: 1) Pine Grove CSD parcel research; 2) assistance on the possible Joint Powers Authority Agreement between Jackson Valley Irrigation District, Amador Water Agency, and Amador County concerning the Consumnes River groundwater basin; 3) assisting the new General Manager of River Pines PUD in her efforts to clean up their records, and in handling an unapproved extension of service into El Dorado County that has already occurred; 4) assisting the Plymouth City Manager who is investigating water rights in the Shenandoah Valley; 5) helping Ione Public Works to determine the boundary lines of various roads along the city's perimeter; and 6) determining the Sphere of Influence for Jackson Valley Fire Protection District, which has not been done before but is probably coterminous with its boundaries.

RESOLUTION ADOPTING THE FINAL BUDGET FOR FISCAL YEAR 2016-17 LAFCO RESOLUTION NUMBER 2016-06

WHEREAS, Government Code \$56381 specifies the Commission shall adopt, following a noticed public hearing, a proposed budget by May 1, and a final budget by June 15; and

WHEREAS, the proposed budget was adopted on May 19, 2016, and transmitted to all parties specified in Government Code §56381(a), and a hearing for agencies and the public on the budget was held on May 19, 2016, and

WHEREAS, the Executive Officer has given notice of hearing in the form and manner specified by law for adoption of the final budget and upon the date, time and place specified in said notice of hearing, the Commission heard, discussed and considered all oral and written testimony submitted including, but not limited to, work plans and priorities for 2016-17 and the Executive Officer's report and recommendation; and

WHEREAS, the final budget is less than the budget adopted in the previous fiscal year, and the Commission does hereby find and determine that notwithstanding the reduced budget, the 2016-17 Budget, as proposed, will allow the commission to fulfill the purposes and programs of the Cortese-Knox-Hertzberg Act.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDERED, that the Local Agency Formation Commission of the County of Amador does approve and adopt the final budget for Fiscal Year 2016-17 as shown in Exhibit A, attached, and by this reference incorporated herein and does further order and direct the following:

Section 1: The Executive Officer shall transmit the final budget to the Auditor and all parties specified in Government Code \$56381(a) as promptly as possible.

Section 2: The Executive Officer is directed to prepare a Journal Entry for the transfer of the first two months of operating expense (\$22,443) should such funds be necessary to continue the usual operation of LAFCO. The Board of Supervisors of Amador County shall transfer funds in that amount to the Commission on July 1, 2016, as specified in \$56381(c).

Section 3: The Auditor shall apportion the budget as specified in Government Code \$56381(b) and request payment from the County and each city no later than July 1, 2016, as specified in \$56381(c).

Section 4: If the County or a City does not remit its required payment within 60 days, the Auditor is requested to collect an equivalent amount from the property tax, or any fee or eligible revenue owed to the city or county as described in §56381(c).

The bill was significantly amended on April 12 to require LAFCOs to conduct a review of the entire county and to file a map with the state that identifies all disadvantaged areas that lack adequate water or sewer services, The bill now also requires that LAFCO, wihtin two years of identifying a disadvantaged unincorporated community that lacks adequate water ot sewer services, to prepare a plan for services, and adopt any actions necessary to implement the plan.

Legislative Report for May 4, 2016 Agenda

Summary: The LAFCO staff tracks bills during the legislative session, and makes monthly written reports. The Commission may take a position on any tracked bill.

Staff Recommendation: Receive report and take no new positions.

Legislative Committee hearings are in full swing. New bills must clear the policy committee in the house of introduction by May 6. The web site for bill information is

The LAFCO staff is tracking seventeen bills of interest to Santa Cruz LAFCO. These are listed on the attached tracking sheet.

On April 6, 2016, Santa Cruz LAFCO took a position in opposition to SB 1318, authored by Senator Wolk from Yolo County. Among other provisions, the early version of the bill would have prohibited LAFCOs from approving a city's or district's annexation or an extraterritorial service extension of water or sewer service unless the agency has entered into an agreement to extend those services to any disadvantaged unincorporated community within or adjacent to the agency's sphere of influence. The bill was substantially gutted and amended on April 12, 2016. The new version of the bill includes the following provisions:

ADDS WATER AND SEWER DISTRICTS

(1) The bill would add water and sewer districts with more than 500 connections to the current law that prohibits LAFCO from approving an annexation to a city of any territory greater than 10 acres, where there exists a disadvantaged unincorporated community, contiguous to the proposed annexation, that lacks safe drinking water or wastewater service, unless the agency applies to annex the disadvantaged community.

PROHIBITS REMOVAL OF DISADVANTAGED COMMUNITIES FROM SPHERES

(2) LAFCO would be prohibited from amending a sphere of influence to remove a disadvantaged unincorporated community from a city's, water district's, or sanitation district's sphere of influence unless LAFCO makes a finding that removal of the community will result in improved service delivery to the community.

ADDS REQUIREMENTS TO SERVICE REVIEWS

(3) When preparing municipal service reviews, the bill would require that LAFCO identify whether an agency is in compliance with the California Safe Drinking Water Act, and assess various alternatives relating to the efficiency and

- affordability of infrastructure and delivery of services to all disadvantaged communities lacking adequate water or sanitary sewers.
- (4) On or before 1/1/22 and every 5 years thereafter, LAFCO shall prepare municipal service reviews for the entire county territory.
- (5) LAFCO shall prepare and file with the State Office of Planning and Research a map that identifies disadvantaged unincorporated communities that lack safe drinking water or wastewater.

REQUIRES SERVICE PLANS FOR DISADVANTAGED COMMUNITIES

- (6) Within 2 years of identifying such a disadvantaged community, LAFCO shall create a service plan and adopt any actions necessary to implement the plan.
- (7) LAFCO will not be required to implement a plan if it is infeasible to connect the disadvantaged community to an existing system.
- (8) LAFCO cannot amend a sphere or authorize any extraterritorial extension of services if an agency identified in a LAFCO service plan for a disadvantaged community has not begun service within 3 years of LAFCO's adoption of the service plan.

ANNEXATION PROTEST AND ELECTION PROCESS

(9) Some protest and election requirements are exempted for annexations of disadvantaged communities.

STATE MANDATED PROGRAM

(10) The bill specifies that LAFCO and local agency costs that are mandated by this bill would be reimbursed if the Commission of State Mandate determines that the costs fall within the mandate law.

In response to CALAFCO's request for opposition letters, and the Commission's previous opposition to the earlier version of the bill, I sent the attached letter of opposition dated April 15, 2016. The Commission should review whether it continues to oppose the bill in its current form. The staff RECOMMENDS that the Commission take no new positions on any bills; thereby maintaining opposition to SB 1318 (Wolk).

SUBJECT: EXECUTIVE OFFICER'S REPORT; CITY BOUNDARY MAPPING PROJECT

DATE: MEETING OF MAY 19, 2016

As reported at the last meeting, the effort to review and verify city boundaries is almost complete. The genesis for the project is an effort by ACTC to correct geographic census information. GIS services provided by ACTC will ensure that the LAFCO effort will build on work we have completed over the years and will permanently record and integrate the exact city boundaries into the mapping data available to agencies and the public.

The review effort included comparing the map of each city annexation approved by LAFCO to the current boundaries as shown in commonly accepted city and/or county maps. The annexation boundaries were also compared to the State Board of Equalization maps, census blocks, voting precincts, and the mapping data at ACTC. Differences and discrepancies have been known to exist for years. In the past, on a case-by-case basis, portions of the correct boundaries have been confirmed. What distinguishes this effort is that it comprehensively reviewed each city's entire boundary and will accurately map those boundaries as verified by LAFCO. This will build a powerful tool for a wide range of future LAFCO endeavors.

Among the challenges was the need to review legal descriptions. While I am able to generally understand and follow legal descriptions, we needed a more qualified person to precisely interpret the information. The Executive Officer contacted George Allen, the recently retired County Surveyor to help. George was available on a limited basis and willing to help. His charges are reasonable and well within the scope of the current budget. We prepared a memorandum outlining the terms of work and payment for the project. Arrangements to authorize temporary contract services appears to be within the scope of my job duties, which provide for "planning, assigning, and supervising the work of support staff."

Legal Counsel pointed out that the commission should be advised of the arrangement and should be offered the opportunity to define any desired limits to my authority to hire and manage temporary outside contractors.

If the commission wishes to further define my authority to contract for support staff or set a limit to the amount of my contract authority, this matter can be placed on a future agenda.
