Overview

In December 2017, the County hired Willdan Engineering (Consultant) to perform an Engineering and Traffic Survey Study on Ten (10) roads; Buckhorn Ridge Road, Camanche Road (Lake Entrance to Camanche Parkway), Curran Road, Clinton Road, Fiddletown Road (Vineyard Lane to 1/4 mile east of Tyler Road), Climax Road, Ridge Road (SR88 to Dapple Drive), Willow Creek Road (SR124 to SR16), Shenandoah Road (Fiddletown Road to Pine Trail), and Shake Ridge Road (Hale Road to Dew Drop Drive). The objective of the Study was to determine the appropriate speed limits for certain segments of these roads. A draft Engineering and Traffic Survey Study has been prepared by the Consultant with recommendations of enforceable speed limits for these road segments. The Board may review the findings and recommendations contained in the report and decide whether to direct staff to prepare ordinance updates for adoption of speed limits on certain segments of roads.

Requested Actions:

1. Find Draft Engineering and Traffic Survey Study complete and direct staff to finalize the Engineering and Traffic Survey Study; and
2. Direct staff to prepare an ordinance update for speed limits on certain road segments contained in the Engineering and Traffic Survey Study for future adoption by the Board of Supervisors.

Fiscal Impact

Not applicable for this agenda Item.

BACKGROUND

This Engineering and Traffic Survey is intended to be the basis for the establishment, revision, and enforcement of speed limits for selected roads within Amador County. This Engineering and Traffic Survey presents recommended speed limits for thirteen (13) roadway segments along ten (10) roads in Amador County. Engineering and Traffic Surveys are required by the State of California to establish intermediate speed limits on local roads and to enforce those limits using radar or other speed measuring devices. These surveys must be updated every 5 or 7 years to ensure the speeds reflect current conditions as dictated by the California Vehicle Code (CVC). The CVC also requires that the surveys be conducted based on the methodology required by the California Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices (California MUTCD) dated November 2014.

The survey was requested by Staff for the proper posting of speed limits and to enable the California

Highway Patrol (CHP) to utilize radar or other electronic speed measuring devices for speed enforcement. CVC Sections 40801 and 40802 require Engineering and Traffic Surveys that verify the prima facie speed limit before enforcement by such a device is legal. The law further specifies that these surveys be conducted every 5 years. The surveys can be extended to 7 years provided the CHP officer(s) have completed a 24-hour radar operator course [CVC 40802(c)(2)(B)(i)(I)]. Additionally, some surveys may be extended to 10 years if a traffic engineer certifies that no changes in roadway or traffic conditions have occurred [CVC 40802(c)(2)(B)(i)(II)]. These provisions assure that posted speed limits are kept reasonably current.

DISCUSSION

Between February 2018 and April 2018, the County's Consultant performed Speed Surveys on the following road segments:

Certain criteria are used to determine whether existing speed limits should be considered for change. Although the critical speed is a primary indicator in determining whether the existing speed limits should be considered for change, other factors such as collision rates and road conditions are included in the analysis and recommendation for speed limits. The Engineering and Traffic Survey discuss these factors and considerations in detail. Table 2 summarizes the recommended speed limits changes for the segments of roads studied.

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INTRODUCTION

This Engineering and Traffic Survey is intended to be the basis for the establishment, revision, and enforcement of speed limits for selected streets within Amador County. This Engineering and Traffic Survey presents recommended speed limits for 13 roadway segments in Amador County. Engineering and Traffic Surveys are required by the State of California to establish intermediate speed limits on local streets and to enforce those limits using radar or other speed measuring devices. These surveys must be updated every 5 or 7 years to ensure the speeds reflect current conditions as dictated by the California Vehicle Code (CVC). The CVC also requires that the surveys be conducted based on the methodology required by the California Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices (California MUTCD) dated November 2014.

The survey was requested by the County for the proper posting of speed limits and to enable the California Highway Patrol (CHP) to utilize radar or other electronic speed measuring devices for speed enforcement. CVC Sections 40801 and 40802 require Engineering and Traffic Surveys that verify the prima facie speed limit before enforcement by such a device is legal. The law further specifies that these surveys be conducted every 5 years. The surveys can be extended to 7 years provided the CHP officer(s) have completed a 24-hour radar operator course [CVC 40802(c)(2)(B)(i)(I)]. Additionally, some surveys may be extended to 10 years if a traffic engineer certifies that no changes in roadway or traffic conditions have occurred [CVC 40802 (c)(2)(B)(i)(II)]. These provisions assure that posted speed limits are kept reasonably current.

The Engineering and Traffic Surveys for the County were conducted in accordance with procedures outlined in the California MUTCD and as required by Section 627 of the CVC. The CVC further describes three elements of an engineering and traffic survey:

1. Measurement of prevailing speed;
2. Collision history; and
3. Roadway characteristics not readily apparent to the motorist.

Posted speed limits are established primarily to protect the general public from the reckless and unpredictable behavior of dangerous drivers. They provide law enforcement with a clearly understood method to identify and apprehend violators of the basic speed law (CVC Section 22350). This law states that "No person shall drive a vehicle on a highway at a speed greater than is reasonable or prudent having due regard for weather, visibility, the traffic on, and the surface and width of the highway, and in no event at a speed which endangers the safety of persons or property." The posted speed limit gives motorists a clear warning of the maximum speed that is reasonable and prudent under typical driving conditions.

The basic fundamentals for establishing speed limits recognize that the majority of drivers behave in a safe and reasonable manner, and therefore, the normally careful and competent actions of a reasonable driver should be considered legal. Speed limits established on these fundamentals conform to the consensus that those who drive the highway determine what speed is reasonable and safe, not on the judgment of one or a few individuals. A radar speed study is usually used to record the prevailing speed of reasonable drivers.

Speed limits are also established to advise drivers of conditions which may not be readily apparent to a reasonable driver. For this reason, collision history, roadway conditions, traffic characteristics, and land use must also be analyzed before determining speed limits. Speed limit changes are usually made in coordination with physical changes in roadway conditions or roadside developments. Unusually short zones of less than one-half mile in length should be avoided to reduce driver confusion.

Additionally, it is generally accepted that speed limits cannot be successfully enforced without voluntary compliance by a majority of drivers. Consequently, only the driver whose behavior is clearly out of line with the normal flow of traffic is usually targeted for enforcement.

ELEMENTS OF THE ENGINEERING AND TRAFFIC SURVEY

Two of the basic elements of the Engineering and Traffic Survey are discussed in more detail below.

Speed Sampling

Existing vehicle speeds are surveyed by a certified radar operator with a calibrated radar unit in an unmarked vehicle. Speed samples are taken for each segment representing a statistically significant sample of current traffic. This data is then evaluated to identify the distribution of speeds. A key element in the evaluation is the identification of the 85th percentile speed. The 85th percentile speed is the speed at or below which 85 percent of the traffic travels. This threshold represents what is historically found to be a safe and reasonable speed for most drivers based on common roadway conditions. Therefore, a speed limit is established at the nearest 5-mile per hour (mph) increment to the 85th percentile speed, except as shown in the two options below from the MUTCD:

Option 1: The posted speed may be reduced by 5 mph from the nearest 5 mph increment of the 85th-percentile speed, in compliance with CVC Section 627 and 22358.5.

Option 2: For cases in which the nearest 5 mph increment of the 85th-percentile speed would require a rounding up, then the speed limit may be rounded down to the nearest 5 mph increment below the 85th percentile speed, if no further reduction is used. Refer to CVC Section 21400(b).

If the speed limit to be posted has had the 5 mph reduction applied, then an E&TS shall document in writing the conditions and justification for the lower speed limit. The reasons for the lower speed limit shall be in compliance with CVC Section 627 and 22358.5

The following examples are provided to explain the application of these speed limit criteria:

- A. Using Option 1 above and first step is to round down: If the 85th percentile speed in a speed survey for a location was 37 mph, then the speed limit would be established at 35 mph since it is the closest 5 mph increment to the 37 mph speed. As indicated by the option, this 35 mph established speed limit could be reduced by 5 mph to 30 mph if conditions and justification for using this lower speed limit are documented in the E&TS.
- B. Using Option 1 above and first step is to round up: If the 85th percentile speed in a speed survey for a location was 33 mph, then the speed limit would be established at 35 mph since it is the closest 5 mph increment to the 33 mph speed. As indicated by the option, this 35 mph speed limit could be reduced by 5 mph to 30 mph if the conditions and justification for using this lower speed limit are documented in the E&TS.
- C. Using Option 2 above and first step is to round up: If the 85th percentile speed in a speed survey for a location was 33 mph, instead of rounding up to 35 mph, the speed limit can be established at 30 mph, but no further reduction can be applied.

Conditions Not Readily Apparent to Motorists

Each street segment is field inspected to identify roadway conditions that may not be readily apparent to motorists. A determination is made whether any conditions are significant and warrant the recommendation of the speed limit 5 mph or more below the basic speed limit. It is important to note that the California MUTCD recommends exercising great care when establishing speed limits 5 mph or more below the basic speed limit. Given the elevation of Amador County, many of the roadways are subject to icy and slippery when wet conditions during the winter. These types of conditions are not readily apparent to motorists, and therefore the recommended speed limit was at least 5 mph below the basic speed limit (per Example A above) for the following roadway segments:

- Buckhorn Ridge Road between Pioneer Creek Road and Highway 88
- Fiddletown Road between Post Mile 4.8 and Post Mile 5.8
- Ridge Road between Ponderosa Way and Highway 88
- Shake Ridge Road between Hale Road and Dew Drop Drive
- Shenandoah Road between Post Mile 8.5 and Post Mile 9.1.

SURVEY CONDITIONS

SURVEY LOCATIONS

The procedures described below describe the criteria and methods used to survey selected streets within Amador County. The specific location of the radar speed survey for each street segment was selected after considering the following:

1. Minimum stop sign and traffic signal influence.
2. Minimum visibility restrictions.
3. Non-congested traffic flow away from intersections and driveways.
4. Minimum influence from curves or other roadway conditions that would affect the normal operation of a vehicle.

DATA COLLECTION

Data of existing conditions was obtained including prevailing speed of vehicles and general roadway conditions within the community. Field reviews were conducted between January and March 2018.

Speed Data

Speed measurements were conducted in January and April 2018. All surveys were conducted in good weather conditions on a typical weekday, with school still in session. The radar unit was operated from an unmarked vehicle to minimize any influence on driver behavior. Typically, a minimum sample size of 100 vehicles or the total samples during a maximum period of 2 hours were obtained for each segment. Traffic speeds in both directions were recorded for individual segments.

Field Review Data

On 1/26/18, 2/28/18 and 3/19/18, a field review was conducted for each of the selected roadway segments in the County with consideration for the following factors:

1. Street width and alignment (design speed);
2. Pedestrian activity and traffic flow characteristics;
3. Number of lanes and other channelization and striping patterns;
4. Frequency of intersections, driveways, and on-street parking;
5. Location of stop signs and other regulatory traffic control devices;
6. Visibility obstructions;
7. Land use and proximity to schools;
8. Pedestrian and bicycle usage;
9. Uniformity with existing speed zones and those in adjacent jurisdictions; and
10. Any other unusual condition not readily apparent to the driver.

ANALYSIS

CRITERIA

Survey data was compiled and analyzed to determine the recommended speed limit in accordance with several criteria contained in The California Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices (CA MUTCD) dated November 2014. Some of the criteria used are:

- A. The critical speed or 85th percentile speed is that speed at or below which 85 percent of the traffic is moving. This speed is the baseline value in determining what the majority of drivers believe is safe and reasonable. Speed limits set higher than the critical speed are not considered reasonable and safe. Speed limits set lower than the critical speed make a large number of reasonable drivers "unlawful," and do not facilitate the orderly flow of traffic. The "basic speed limit" is the nearest 5 mph increment to the 85th percentile speed.
- B. The 10 mph pace speed is the 10 mph increment that contains the highest percentage of vehicles. It is a measure of the dispersion of speeds across the range of the samples surveyed. An accepted practice is to keep the speed limit within the 10 mph pace while considering the critical speed and other factors that might require a speed lower than the critical speed.
- C. When necessary, the collision rate for a street segment was compared to average collision rates that can be reasonably expected to occur on streets and highways in other jurisdictions, in proportion to the volume of traffic per lane mile. These average collision rates have been developed by the State of California and are considered reasonable for use in Amador County. A list of reported collisions in Amador County from the State Wide Integrated Traffic Records System (SWITRS) for this three-year period is included in Appendix A.

RESULTS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

The Engineering and Traffic Survey Forms, presented in Appendix B, illustrate results of a thorough evaluation of the available data and recommend a speed limit for each street segment surveyed. A complete summary of all recommendations is shown in Table 2. In each case, the recommended speed limit was consistent with the prevailing behavior as demonstrated by the radar speed measurements.

Typically, a speed limit in the upper range of the 10-mile pace was selected unless a collision rate significantly higher than expected was discovered or roadway conditions not readily apparent to the driver were identified.

Any segments with recommended speed limits 5 mph or more below the basic speed limit are fully explained later in this report.

The Legislature, in adopting Section 22358.5 of the CVC, has made it clear that physical conditions, such as width, curvature, grade and surface conditions, or any other condition readily apparent to a driver, in the absence of other factors, would not be the basis for

special downward speed zoning. In these cases, the basic speed law (CVC Section 22350) is sufficient to regulate such conditions.

The recommendations contained in this Report are intended to establish prima facie speed limits. They are not intended to be absolute for all prevailing conditions. All prima facie speed violations are actually violations of the basic speed law (Section 22350 of California Vehicle Code). This statute states that a person shall not drive a vehicle at a speed greater than is safe having regard for traffic, roadway, and weather conditions. A prima facie limit is intended to establish a maximum safe speed under normal conditions.

Table 1 identifies the street segment with recommended changes in posted speed limits and Table 2 summarizes the recommendations for all surveyed segments. See Appendix B for the complete Engineering and Traffic Survey for the segments presented in Table 2.

LEGISLATIVE REFERENCES

APPLICABLE SECTIONS OF CALIFORNIA VEHICLE CODE

SECTION 1. Section 627 of the Vehicle Code:

Section 627.

- (a) *“Engineering and traffic survey,”* as used in this code, means a survey of highway and traffic conditions in accordance with methods determined by the Department of Transportation for use by state and local authorities.
- (b) An engineering and traffic survey shall include, among other requirements deemed necessary by the department, consideration of all of the following:
 - (1) Prevailing speeds as determined by traffic engineering measurements.
 - (2) Accident records.
 - (3) Highway, traffic, and roadside conditions not readily apparent to the driver.
- (c) When conducting an engineering and traffic survey, local authorities, in addition to the factors set forth in paragraphs (1) to (3), inclusive, of subdivision (b) may consider all of the following:
 - (1) Residential density, if any of the following conditions exist on the particular portion of highway and the property contiguous thereto, other than a business district:
 - a. Upon one side of the highway, within a distance of a quarter of a mile, the contiguous property fronting thereon is occupied by 13 or more separate dwelling houses or business structures.
 - b. Upon both sides of the highway, collectively, within a distance of a quarter of a mile, the contiguous property fronting thereon is occupied by 16 or more separate dwelling houses or business structures.
 - c. The portion of highway is longer than one-quarter of a mile but has the ratio of separate dwelling houses or business structures to the length of the highway described in either subparagraph (A) or (B).
 - (2) Pedestrian and bicyclist safety.

Basic Speed Law

22350. No person shall drive a vehicle upon a highway at a speed greater than is reasonable or prudent having due regard for weather, visibility, the traffic on, and the surface and width of, the highway, and in no event at a speed which endangers the safety of persons or property.

Speed Law Violations

Section 22351.

- (a) The speed of any vehicle upon a highway not in excess of the limits specified in Section 22352 or established as authorized in this code is lawful unless clearly proved to be in violation of the basic speed law.
- (b) The speed of any vehicle upon a highway in excess of the prima facie speed limits in Section 22352 or established as authorized in this code is prima facie unlawful unless the defendant

establishes by competent evidence that the speed in excess of said limits did not constitute a violation of the basic speed law at the time, place and under the conditions then existing.

Prima Facie Speed Limits

Section 22352.

The prima facie limits are as follows and shall be applicable unless changed as authorized in this code and, if so changed, only when signs have been erected giving notice thereof:

(a) Fifteen miles per hour:

(1) When traversing a railway grade crossing, if during the last 100 feet of the approach to the crossing the driver does not have a clear and unobstructed view of the crossing and of any traffic on the railway for a distance of 400 feet in both directions along such railway. This subdivision does not apply in the case of any railway grade crossing where a human flagman is on duty or a clearly visible electrical or mechanical railway crossing signal device is installed but does not then indicate the immediate approach of a railway train or car.

(2) When traversing any intersection of highways, if during the last 100 feet of the driver's approach to the intersection, the driver does not have a clear and unobstructed view of the intersection and of any traffic upon all of the highways entering the intersection for a distance of 100 feet along all those highways, except at an intersection protected by stop signs or yield right-of-way signs or controlled by official traffic control signals.

(3) On any alley.

(b) Twenty-five miles per hour:

(1) On any highway other than a state highway, in any business or residence district unless a different speed is determined by local authority under procedures set forth in this code.

(2) When approaching or passing a school building or the grounds thereof, contiguous to a highway and posted with a standard "SCHOOL" warning sign, while children are going to or leaving the school either during school hours or during the noon recess period. The prima facie limit shall also apply when approaching or passing any school grounds which are not separated from the highway by a fence, gate or other physical barrier while the grounds are in use by children and the highway is posted with a standard "SCHOOL" warning sign. For purposes of this subparagraph, standard "SCHOOL" warning signs may be placed at any distance up to 500 feet away from school grounds.

(3) When passing a senior center or other facility primarily used by senior citizens, contiguous to a street other than a state highway and posted with a standard "SENIOR" warning sign. A local authority may erect a sign pursuant to this paragraph when the local agency makes a determination that the proposed signing should be implemented. A local authority may request grant funding from the Pedestrian Safety Account pursuant to Section 894.7 of the Streets and Highways Code, or any other grant funding available to it, and use that grant funding to pay for the erection of those signs, or may utilize any other funds available to it to pay for the erection of those signs, including, but not limited to, donations from private sources.

Increase of Local Speed Limits to 65 Miles Per Hour

Section 22357.

- (a) Whenever a local authority determines upon the basis of an engineering and traffic survey that a speed greater than 25 miles per hour would facilitate the orderly movement of vehicular traffic and would be reasonable and safe upon any street other than a state highway otherwise subject to a prima facie limit of 25 miles per hour, the local authority may by ordinance determine and declare a prima facie speed limit of 30, 35, 40, 45, 50, 55 or 60 miles per hour or a maximum speed limit of 65 miles per hour, whichever is found most appropriate to facilitate the orderly movement of traffic and is reasonable and safe. The declared prima facie or maximum speed limit shall be effective when appropriate signs giving notice thereof are erected upon the street and shall not thereafter be revised except upon the basis of an engineering and traffic survey. This section does not apply to any 25 mile per hour prima facie limit, which is applicable when passing a school building or the grounds thereof or when passing a senior center or other facility primarily used by senior citizens.
- (b) This section shall become operative on the date specified in subdivision (c) of Section 22366.

Downward Speed Zoning

Section 22358.5.

It is the intent of the Legislature that physical conditions such as width, curvature, grade and surface conditions, or any other condition readily apparent to a driver, in the absence of other factors, would not require special downward speed zoning, as the basic rule of Section 22350 is sufficient regulation as to such conditions.

Boundary Line Streets

Section 22359.

With respect to boundary line streets and highways where portions thereof are within different jurisdictions, no ordinance adopted under Sections 22357 and 22358 shall be effective as to any such portion until all authorities having jurisdiction of the portions of the street concerned have approved the same. This section shall not apply in the case of boundary line streets consisting of separate roadways within different jurisdictions.

Speed Trap Prohibition

Section 40801.

No peace officer or other person shall use a speedtrap in arresting, or participating or assisting in the arrest of, any person for any alleged violation of this code nor shall any speed trap be used in securing evidence as to the speed of any vehicle for the purpose of an arrest or prosecution under this code.

Speed Trap

Section 40802.

- (a) A "speed trap" is either of the following:
- (1) A particular section of a highway measured as to distance and with boundaries marked, designated, or otherwise determined in order that the speed of a vehicle may be calculated by securing the time it takes the vehicle to travel the known distance.
 - (2) A particular section of a highway with a prima facie speed limit that is provided by this code or by local ordinance under paragraph (1) of subdivision (b) of Section 22352, or established under Section 22354, 22357, 22358, or 22358, if that prima facie speed limit is not justified by an engineering and traffic survey conducted within five years prior to the date of the alleged violation, and enforcement of the speed limit involves the use of radar or any other electronic device that measures the speed of moving object. This paragraph does not apply to a local street, road, or school zone.
- (b)(1) For purposes of this section, a local street or road is one that is functionally classified as "local" on the "California Road System Maps," that are approved by the Federal Highway Administration and maintained by the Department of Transportation. When a street or road does not appear on the "California Road System Maps," (see Appendix C) it may be defined as a "local street or road" if it primarily provides access to abutting residential property and meets the following three conditions:
- (A) Roadway width of not more than 40 feet.
 - (B) Not more than one-half of a mile of uninterrupted length. Interruptions shall include official traffic control signals as defined in Section 445.
 - (C) Not more than one traffic lane in each direction.
- (2) For purposes of this section "school zone" means that area approaching or passing a school building or the grounds thereof that is contiguous to a highway and on which is posted a standard "SCHOOL" warning sign, while children are going to or leaving the school either during school hours or during the noon recess period. "School zone" also includes the area approaching or passing any school grounds that are not separated from the highway by a fence, gate, or other physical barrier while the grounds are in use by children if that highway is posted with a standard "SCHOOL" warning sign.
- (c)(1) When all the following criteria are met, paragraph (2) of this subdivision shall be applicable and subdivision (a) shall not be applicable:
- (A) When radar is used, the arresting officer has successfully completed a radar operator course of not less than 24 hours on the use of police traffic radar, and the course was approved and certified by the Commission on Peace Officer Standards and Training.
 - (B) When laser or any other electronic device is used to measure the speed of moving objects, the arresting officer has successfully completed the training required in subparagraph (A) and an additional training course of not less than two hours approved and certified by the Commission on Peace Officer Standards and Training.

- (C)(i) The prosecution proved that the arresting officer complied with subparagraphs (A) and (B) and that an engineering and traffic survey has been conducted in accordance with subparagraph (B) of paragraph (2). The prosecution proved that, prior to the officer issuing the notice to appear, the arresting officer established that the radar, laser, or other electronic device conformed to the requirements of subparagraph (D).
 - (ii) The prosecution proved the speed of the accused was unsafe for the conditions present at the time of alleged violation unless the citation was for a violation of Section 22349, 22356, or 22406.
 - (D) The radar, laser, or other electronic device used to measure the speed of the accused meets or exceeds the minimal operational standards of the National Traffic Highway Safety Administration, and has been calibrated within the three years prior to the date of the alleged violation by an independent certified laser or radar repair and testing or calibration facility.
- (2) A “speed trap” is either of the following:
- (A) A particular section of a highway measured as to distance and with boundaries marked, designated, or otherwise determined in order that the speed of a vehicle may be calculated by securing the time it takes the vehicle to travel the known distance.
 - (B)(i) A particular section of a highway or state highway with a prima facie speed limit that is provided by this code or by local ordinance under subparagraph (A) of paragraph (2) of subdivision (a) of Section 22352, or established under Section 22354, 22357, 22358, or 22358.3, if that prima facie speed limit is not justified by an engineering and traffic survey conducted within one of the following time periods, prior to the date of the alleged violation, and enforcement of speed limit involves the use of radar or any other electronic device that measures the speed of moving objects:
 - (I) Except as specified in subclause (II), seven years.
 - (II) If an engineering and traffic survey was conducted more than seven years prior to the date of the alleged violation, and a registered engineer evaluates the section of the highway and determines that no significant changes in roadway or traffic conditions have occurred including, but not limited to, changes in adjoining property or land use, roadway width, or traffic volume, 10 years.
 - (ii) This subparagraph does not apply to a local street, road, or school zone.

Speed Trap Evidence

Section 40803.

- (a) No evidence as to the speed of a vehicle upon a highway shall be admitted in any court upon the trial of any person in any prosecution under this code upon a charge involving the speed of a vehicle when the evidence is based upon or obtained from or by the maintenance or use of a speedtrap.

- (b) In any prosecution under this code of a charge involving the speed of a vehicle, where enforcement involves the use of radar or other electronic devices which measure the speed of moving objects, the prosecution shall establish, as part of its prima facie case, that the evidence or testimony presented is not based upon a speed trap as defined in paragraph (2) of subdivision (a) of Section 40802.
- (c) When a traffic and engineering survey is required pursuant to paragraph (2) of subdivision (a) of Section 40802, evidence that a traffic and engineering survey has been conducted within five years of the date of the alleged violation or evidence that the offense was committed on a local street or road as defined in paragraph (2) of subdivision (a) of Section 40802 shall constitute a prima facie case that the evidence or testimony is not based upon a speed trap as defined in paragraph (2) subdivision (a) of Section 40802.

Following the addition of this item to the Board’s Agenda, it was requested that my office prepare a memo regarding the topic. Given the short time available, this memo only provides a very general overview. If, following the discussion, the Board seeks more specified information on certain questions or issues, we may need additional time to respond.

BACKGROUND:

As the Board may recall, at two separate meetings back in April of 2017, the Board considered the proposed legislation in Senate Bill 54 (SB 54) (the California Values Act) (often also referred to as the “Sanctuary State” bill). As part of those discussions, the Undersheriff indicated that under the proposed language, the ability of the Sheriff’s Office to communicate and cooperate with U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) would be significantly limited, even beyond already existing limitations in state law. It was also brought up during those meetings that the Trump Administration might view SB 54 as being in direct conflict with federal law, and/or could seek to tie certain federal grant funds to specific cooperation with ICE that could not occur under the State legislation being proposed.

At the conclusion of the meeting on April 25, 2017, the Board voted unanimously to draft a letter in strong opposition to SB 54. (A copy of the meeting minutes is attached.) Ultimately, the legislation was passed by the Legislature and signed by the Governor on October 5, 2017 and went into effect in January 2018.

SB 54

The specific restrictions in SB 54 that apply to local law enforcement in connection with immigration related enforcement matters are summarized below. (Please note that this is simply a summary and is not intended to be a complete review and discussion of the restrictions in SB 54). Also, at the end of March 2018, the California Attorney General issued an Information Bulletin entitled “Responsibilities of Law Enforcement Agencies Under the California Values Act, California TRUST Act, and the California TRUTH Act” that further clarifies the obligations under SB 54.

1. SB 54 generally restricts direct enforcement of federal immigration laws. Government Code § 7284.6(a)(1).
2. SB 54 restricts the holding or detaining of individuals upon request of federal immigration authorities beyond the individual's scheduled release date. Government Code § 7284.6(a)(1)(B).

The courts have held that hold requests from immigration authorities are voluntary, not mandatory. If they were mandatory, they would violate the Tenth Amendment to the U.S. Constitution by compelling state and local governments to enforce a federal regulatory program. *Galarza v. Szalcyk*, 745 F.3d 634 (3d Cir. 2014).

Also, a local agency that complies with a hold request may also violate the individual's Fourth Amendment rights against unreasonable search and seizure if that continued detention is not based on probable cause. *Miranda-Olivares v. Clackamas County*, 2014 WL 1414305 (D. Or. 2014); *Morales v. Chadbourne*, 793 F.3d 208 (1st Cir. 2015).

3. Under SB 54, Government Code § 7284.6(a)(4), a local law enforcement agency may only transfer individuals in local custody to federal immigration authorities when either (1) authorized by a judicial warrant or a judicial probable cause determination; or (2) under the following circumstances:
 - a. The individual has been convicted for specified offenses identified in Government Code § 7282.5. Attached is a copy of Government Code § 7282.5, which outlines those offenses.
 - b. The individual is a current registrant on the California Sex and Arson Registry.

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- c. The individual is the subject of an outstanding felony federal arrest warrant.
4. SB 54 prohibits a county law enforcement agency from providing to immigration authorities personal information, as defined in Section 1798.3 of the Civil Code, about an individual, including, but not limited to, the individual's home address or work address unless that information is available to the public. Government Code § 7284.6(a)(1)(D).
5. SB 54 provides that a local law enforcement agency shall not provide information regarding a person's release date or respond to requests for notification by providing release dates or other information unless (1) that information is available to the public, or (2) is in response to a notification request from immigration authorities in accordance with Government Code § 7282.5. Government Code § 7284.6(a)(1)(C).

When immigration authorities have provided to a local law enforcement agency a "notification request" (a request from immigration authorities that a local law enforcement agency inform immigration authorities of the release date and time in advance of the public of an individual in its custody), a local law enforcement agency may only provide that information under the following circumstances:

- a. The individual has been convicted for specified offenses identified in Government Code § 7282.5.
- b. The individual is a current registrant on the California Sex and Arson Registry.
- c. The individual is the subject of an outstanding felony federal arrest warrant.
- d. The individual has been charged with certain felonies for which a judge has found probable cause under Penal Code § 872.
6. Under SB 54, the California Attorney General, by October 1, 2018, shall publish a model policy limiting assistance with immigration enforcement to the fullest extent possible consistent with federal and state law at health facilities operated by the County. These health facilities shall implement the model policy, or an equivalent policy. Government Code § 7284.8(a).

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SB 54 also establishes various exemptions from the above restrictions. Those exemptions are summarized below.

1. Local law enforcement agencies may investigate, enforce, or detain upon reasonable suspicion, or arrest an alien who (1) was previously denied admission or removed from the United States based on a conviction for committing an aggravated felony and who (2) enters, or attempts to enter or is at any time found in the United States. This information must have been detected during unrelated law enforcement activity. Government Code § 7284.6(b)(1).
2. Local law enforcement agencies may conduct enforcement or investigative duties associated with a joint law enforcement task force, including the sharing of information with other law enforcement agencies for purposes of task force investigations, so long as the following conditions are met:
 - a. The primary purpose of the joint law enforcement task force is not immigration enforcement.
 - b. The enforcement or investigative duties are primarily related to a violation of state or federal law unrelated to immigration enforcement.
 - c. Participation in the task force does not violate any local law or policy. Government Code § 7284.6(b)(3).
3. Local law enforcement agencies may make inquiries into information necessary to certify whether an individual has been identified as a potential crime or trafficking victim and is eligible for a “T” or “U” visa under 8 U.S.C. §§ 1101(a)(15)(n or (U). Government Code § 7284.6(b)(4).
4. Local law enforcement agencies may make inquiries to comply with 18 U.S.C. § 922(d)(5). That federal statute makes it unlawful for any person to sell or otherwise dispose of any firearm or ammunition to any person knowing or having reasonable cause to believe that such person is illegally or unlawfully in the United States. Government Code § 7284.6(b)(4).
5. Local law enforcement agencies may give immigration authorities access to interview an individual in agency or department custody. However, the interview access shall comply with the requirements of the TRUTH Act, commencing with Government Code § 7283.

SB 54 does not prevent a local law enforcement agency from responding to a request from immigration authorities for information about a specific person's criminal history, including previous criminal arrests, convictions, or similar history information accessed through the California Law Enforcement Telecommunications System (CLETS), where otherwise permitted by state law. Government Code § 7284.6(b)(2).
7. SB 54 does not prohibit or restrict any government entity from sending to, or receiving from, federal immigration authorities, information regarding the citizenship or immigration status, lawful or unlawful, of an individual, or from requesting from federal immigration authorities immigration status information, lawful or unlawful, of any individual, or maintaining or exchanging that information with any other federal, state, or local government entity, pursuant to 8 U.S.C. § 1373 and 8 U.S.C. § 1644. Government Code § 7284.6(e).

EXISTING LITIGATION:***United States v. State of California, et al.,*****United States District Court, Eastern District of California, Case No. 2:18-cv-00490**

On March 6, 2018, the U.S. Attorney's Office filed litigation in Sacramento against the State of California regarding SB 54 and two other related state laws AB 450 and AB 103. (A copy of the Complaint is attached.) AB 450 (the "Immigrant Worker Protection Act") generally regulates how private employers in California respond and cooperate in federal immigration investigations at work sites, and the portion of omnibus bill AB 103 challenged in this action involves the inspection and review of county, local, or private immigration detention facilities by the California Attorney General.

In general, the federal government contends that these state statutes (or portions thereof) are preempted by federal law and impermissibly discriminate against the United States, and therefore violate the Supremacy Clause of the United States Constitution. The United States also is seeking a preliminary injunction to enjoin the enforcement of these provisions of California law. The parties are in the middle of briefing the Motion for Preliminary Injunction, and a hearing on the Motion is currently set for June 20, 2018.

Several parties have filed amici curiae briefs in support of the request for preliminary injunction, including cities within California, other states, interest groups, associations, and individuals. In

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reviewing the court's docket in preparation of this Memo, it does not appear that any California counties have participated in the case.

The time to file amicus curiae briefs in support of Plaintiff's Motion for Preliminary Injunction expired on April 6, 2018. Amici curiae briefs in support of Defendant's Opposition to the Preliminary Injunction are due on or before May 18, 2018. Given the political nature of this litigation, it is highly likely that any decision by the District Court will be appealed to the Ninth Circuit and perhaps to the U.S. Supreme Court. There will be additional opportunities for amici support at those levels.

The ultimate resolution of this litigation will determine whether or not the County must comply with these particular provisions of state law whether or not we participate in any manner. However, in the interim, Amador County must continue to comply with these state law provisions, even if the County deemed these state law provisions to be unconstitutional.

CONCLUSION

As this Item is discussion only, if the Board would like to consider possible action(s) at a future meeting, the Board would need to direct staff accordingly.





§ **7282.5**. Cooperation with immigration authorities; certain activities relating to immigration enforcement; conditions

Effective: January 1, 2018

[Currentness](#)

(a) A law enforcement official shall have discretion to cooperate with immigration authorities only if doing so would not violate any federal, state, or local law, or local policy, and where permitted by the California Values Act (Chapter 17.25 (commencing with [Section 7284](#))). Additionally, the specific activities described in subparagraph (C) of paragraph (1) of subdivision (a) of, and in paragraph (4) of subdivision (a) of, [Section 7284.6](#) shall only occur under the following circumstances:

(1) The individual has been convicted of a serious or violent felony identified in [subdivision \(c\) of Section 1192.7](#) of, or [subdivision \(c\) of Section 667.5](#) of, the Penal Code.

(2) The individual has been convicted of a felony punishable by imprisonment in the state prison.

(3) The individual has been convicted within the past five years of a misdemeanor for a crime that is punishable as either a misdemeanor or a felony for, or has been convicted within the last 15 years of a felony for, any of the following offenses:

(A) Assault, as specified in, but not limited to, [Sections 217.1, 220, 240, 241.1, 241.4, 241.7, 244, 244.5, 245, 245.2, 245.3, 245.5, 4500, and 4501](#) of the Penal Code.

(B) Battery, as specified in, but not limited to, [Sections 242, 243.1, 243.3, 243.4, 243.6, 243.7, 243.9, 273.5, 347, 4501.1, and 4501.5](#) of the Penal Code.

(C) Use of threats, as specified in, but not limited to, [Sections 71, 76, 139, 140, 422, 601, and 11418.5](#) of the Penal Code.

(D) Sexual abuse, sexual exploitation, or crimes endangering children, as specified in, but not limited to, [Sections 266, 266a, 266b, 266c, 266d, 266f, 266g, 266h, 266i, 266j, 267, 269, 288, 288.5, 311.1, 311.3, 311.4, 311.10, 311.11, and 647.6](#) of the Penal Code.

- (E) Child abuse or endangerment, as specified in, but not limited to, [Sections 270, 271, 271a, 273a, 273ab, 273d, 273.4, and 278 of the Penal Code](#).
- (F) Burglary, robbery, theft, fraud, forgery, or embezzlement, as specified in, but not limited to, [Sections 211, 215, 459, 463, 470, 476, 487, 496, 503, 518, 530.5, 532, and 550 of the Penal Code](#).
- (G) Driving under the influence of alcohol or drugs, but only for a conviction that is a felony.
- (H) Obstruction of justice, as specified in, but not limited to, [Sections 69, 95, 95.1, 136.1, and 148.10 of the Penal Code](#).
- (I) Bribery, as specified in, but not limited to, [Sections 67, 67.5, 68, 74, 85, 86, 92, 93, 137, 138, and 165 of the Penal Code](#).
- (J) Escape, as specified in, but not limited to, [Sections 107, 109, 110, 4530, 4530.5, 4532, 4533, 4534, 4535, and 4536 of the Penal Code](#).
- (K) Unlawful possession or use of a weapon, firearm, explosive device, or weapon of mass destruction, as specified in, but not limited to, [Sections 171b, 171c, 171d, 246, 246.3, 247, 417, 417.3, 417.6, 417.8, 4574, 11418, 11418.1, 12021.5, 12022, 12022.2, 12022.3, 12022.4, 12022.5, 12022.53, 12022.55, 18745, 18750, and 18755 of, and subdivisions \(c\) and \(d\) of Section 26100 of, the Penal Code](#).
- (L) Possession of an unlawful deadly weapon, under the Deadly Weapons Recodification Act of 2010 (Part 6 (commencing with [Section 16000](#)) of the Penal Code).
- (M) An offense involving the felony possession, sale, distribution, manufacture, or trafficking of controlled substances.
- (N) Vandalism with prior convictions, as specified in, but not limited to, [Section 594.7 of the Penal Code](#).
- (O) Gang-related offenses, as specified in, but not limited to, [Sections 186.22, 186.26, and 186.28 of the Penal Code](#).
- (P) An attempt, as defined in Section 664 of, or a conspiracy, as defined in [Section 182 of, the Penal Code](#), to commit an offense specified in this section.
- (Q) A crime resulting in death, or involving the personal infliction of great bodily injury, as specified in, but not limited to, [subdivision \(d\) of Section 245.6 of, and Sections 187, 191.5, 192, 192.5, 12022.7, 12022.8, and 12022.9 of, the Penal Code](#).
- (R) Possession or use of a firearm in the commission of an offense.

- (S) An offense that would require the individual to register as a sex offender pursuant to [Section 290](#), [290.002](#), or [290.006](#) of the Penal Code.
- (T) False imprisonment, slavery, and human trafficking, as specified in, but not limited to, [Sections 181](#), [210.5](#), [236](#), [236.1](#), and [4503](#) of the Penal Code.
- (U) Criminal profiteering and money laundering, as specified in, but not limited to, [Sections 186.2](#), [186.9](#), and [186.10](#) of the Penal Code.
- (V) Torture and mayhem, as specified in, but not limited to, [Section 203](#) of the Penal Code.
- (W) A crime threatening the public safety, as specified in, but not limited to, [Sections 219](#), [219.1](#), [219.2](#), [247.5](#), [404](#), [404.6](#), [405a](#), [451](#), and [11413](#) of the Penal Code.
- (X) Elder and dependent adult abuse, as specified in, but not limited to, [Section 368](#) of the Penal Code.
- (Y) A hate crime, as specified in, but not limited to, [Section 422.55](#) of the Penal Code.
- (Z) Stalking, as specified in, but not limited to, [Section 646.9](#) of the Penal Code.
- (AA) Soliciting the commission of a crime, as specified in, but not limited to, [subdivision \(c\) of Section 286](#) of, and [Sections 653j](#) and [653.23](#) of, the Penal Code.
- (AB) An offense committed while on bail or released on his or her own recognizance, as specified in, but not limited to, [Section 12022.1](#) of the Penal Code.
- (AC) Rape, sodomy, oral copulation, or sexual penetration, as specified in, but not limited to, [paragraphs \(2\) and \(6\) of subdivision \(a\) of Section 261](#) of, [paragraphs \(1\) and \(4\) of subdivision \(a\) of Section 262](#) of, [Section 264.1](#) of, [subdivisions \(c\) and \(d\) of Section 286](#) of, [subdivisions \(c\) and \(d\) of Section 288a](#) of, and [subdivisions \(a\) and \(j\) of Section 289](#) of, the Penal Code.
- (AD) Kidnapping, as specified in, but not limited to, [Sections 207](#), [209](#), and [209.5](#) of the Penal Code.
- (AE) A violation of [subdivision \(c\) of Section 20001](#) of the Vehicle Code.
- (4) The individual is a current registrant on the California Sex and Arson Registry.

(5) The individual has been convicted of a federal crime that meets the definition of an aggravated felony as set forth in subparagraphs (A) to (P), inclusive, of paragraph (43) of subsection (a) of Section 101 of the federal Immigration and Nationality Act (8 U.S.C. Sec. 1101), or is identified by the United States Department of Homeland Security's Immigration and Customs Enforcement as the subject of an outstanding federal felony arrest warrant.

(6) In no case shall cooperation occur pursuant to this section for individuals arrested, detained, or convicted of misdemeanors that were previously felonies, or were previously crimes punishable as either misdemeanors or felonies, prior to passage of the Safe Neighborhoods and Schools Act of 2014 as it amended the Penal Code.

(b) In cases in which the individual is arrested and taken before a magistrate on a charge involving a serious or violent felony, as identified in [subdivision \(c\) of Section 1192.7](#) or [subdivision \(c\) of Section 667.5 of the Penal Code](#), respectively, or a felony that is punishable by imprisonment in state prison, and the magistrate makes a finding of probable cause as to that charge pursuant to [Section 872 of the Penal Code](#), a law enforcement official shall additionally have discretion to cooperate with immigration officials pursuant to [subparagraph \(C\) of paragraph \(1\) of subdivision \(a\) of Section 7284.6](#).

COMPLAINT

25
 26 Plaintiff, the United States of America, by and through its undersigned counsel, brings
 27 this civil action for declaratory and injunctive relief, and alleges as follows:
 28

PRELIMINARY STATEMENT

1
2 1. In this action, the United States seeks a declaration invalidating and preliminarily and
3 permanently enjoining the enforcement of certain provisions of California law. These
4 provisions are preempted by federal law and impermissibly discriminate against the
5 United States, and therefore violate the Supremacy Clause of the United States
6 Constitution.

7
8 2. The United States has undoubted, preeminent authority to regulate immigration matters.
9 This authority derives from the United States Constitution and numerous acts of
10 Congress. California has no authority to enforce laws that obstruct or otherwise conflict
11 with, or discriminate against, federal immigration enforcement efforts.

12
13 3. This lawsuit challenges three California statutes that reflect a deliberate effort by
14 California to obstruct the United States’ enforcement of federal immigration law, to
15 regulate private entities that seek to cooperate with federal authorities consistent with
16 their obligations under federal law, and to impede consultation and communication
17 between federal and state law enforcement officials.

18
19 4. The first statute, the “Immigrant Worker Protection Act,” Assembly Bill 450 (“AB 450”),
20 prohibits private employers in California from voluntarily cooperating with federal
21 officials who seek information relevant to immigration enforcement that occurs in places
22 of employment.

23
24 5. The second statute, Assembly Bill 103 (“AB 103”), creates an inspection and review
25 scheme that requires the Attorney General of California to investigate the immigration
26 enforcement efforts of federal agents.

27 6. The third statute, Senate Bill 54 (“SB 54”), which includes the “California Values Act,”
28

1 limits the ability of state and local law enforcement officers to provide the United States
2 with basic information about individuals who are in their custody and are subject to
3 federal immigration custody, or to transfer such individuals to federal immigration
4 custody.

5
6 7. The provisions of state law at issue have the purpose and effect of making it more
7 difficult for federal immigration officers to carry out their responsibilities in California.
8 The Supremacy Clause does not allow California to obstruct the United States' ability to
9 enforce laws that Congress has enacted or to take actions entrusted to it by the
10 Constitution. Accordingly, the provisions at issue here are invalid.

11
12 **JURISDICTION AND VENUE**

13 8. The Court has jurisdiction over this action under 28 U.S.C. §§ 1331 and 1345.

14 9. Venue is proper in this jurisdiction under 28 U.S.C. § 1391(b) because Defendants reside
15 within the Eastern District of California and because a substantial part of the acts or
16 omissions giving rise to this Complaint arose from events occurring within this judicial
17 district.

18
19 10. The Court has the authority to provide the relief requested under the Supremacy Clause,
20 U.S. Const. art. VI, cl. 2, as well as 28 U.S.C. §§ 1651, 2201, and 2202, and its inherent
21 equitable powers.

22
23 **PARTIES**

24 11. Plaintiff, the United States, regulates immigration under its constitutional and statutory
25 authorities, and it enforces the immigration laws through its Executive agencies,
26 including the Departments of Justice, State, and Labor, and the Department of Homeland
27 Security (DHS) including its component agencies U.S. Immigration and Customs
28

1 Enforcement (ICE), and U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP).

2 12. Defendant State of California is a state of the United States.

3 13. Defendant Edmund Gerald Brown Jr. is the Governor of the State of California and is
4 being sued in his official capacity.

5 14. Defendant Xavier Becerra is Attorney General for the State of California and is being
6 sued in his official capacity.
7

8 **FEDERAL IMMIGRATION LAW**

9 15. The Constitution affords Congress the power to “establish an uniform Rule of
10 Naturalization,” U.S. Const., art. I § 8, cl. 4, and to “regulate Commerce with foreign
11 Nations,” U.S. Const., art. I § 8, cl. 3, and affords the President of the United States the
12 authority to “take Care that the Laws be faithfully executed.” U.S. Const., art. II § 3.

13
14 16. The Supremacy Clause of the Constitution mandates that “[t]his Constitution, and the
15 Laws of the United States which shall be made in Pursuance thereof . . . shall be the
16 supreme Law of the Land . . . any Thing in the Constitution or Laws of any State to the
17 Contrary notwithstanding.” U.S. Const., art. VI, cl. 2. Thus, a state enactment is invalid if
18 it “stands as an obstacle to the accomplishment and execution of the full purposes and
19 objectives of Congress,” *Hines v. Davidowitz*, 312 U.S. 52, 67 (1941), or if it
20 “discriminate[s] against the United States or those with whom it deals,” *South Carolina v.*
21 *Baker*, 485 U.S. 505, 523 (1988).
22

23
24 17. Based on its enumerated powers and its constitutional power as a sovereign to control and
25 conduct relations with foreign nations, the United States has broad authority to establish
26 immigration laws, the execution of which the States cannot obstruct or discriminate
27 against. *See Arizona v. United States*, 567 U.S. 387, 394-95 (2012); *accord North*
28

1 *Dakota v. United States*, 495 U.S. 423, 435 (1990) (plurality); *id.* at 444-47 (Scalia, J.,
2 concurring).

3 18. Congress has exercised its authority to make laws governing the entry, presence, status,
4 and removal of aliens within the United States by enacting various provisions of the
5 Immigration and Nationality Act (INA), 8 U.S.C. § 1101 *et seq.*, the Immigration Reform
6 and Control Act of 1986 (IRCA), Pub. L. No. 99-603, 100 Stat 3359, codified at 8 U.S.C.
7 § 1324a *et seq.*, and other laws regulating immigration.
8

9 19. These laws codify the Executive Branch’s authority to inspect, investigate, arrest, detain,
10 and remove aliens who are suspected of being, or found to be, unlawfully in the United
11 States. *See* 8 U.S.C. §§ 1182, 1225, 1226, 1227, 1228, 1231, 1357.
12

13 20. Congress has also codified basic principles of cooperation and comity between state and
14 local authorities and the United States. For example, federal law contemplates that
15 removable aliens in state custody who have been convicted of state or local offenses will
16 generally serve their state or local criminal sentences before being subject to removal, but
17 that they will be taken into federal custody upon the expiration of their state prison terms.
18 *See id.* §§ 1226(c), 1231(a)(1)(B)(iii), (a)(4).
19

20 21. “Consultation between federal and state officials is an important feature of the
21 immigration system.” *Arizona*, 567 U.S. at 411. Congress has therefore directed that a
22 federal, state, or local government entity or official may not prohibit, or in any way
23 restrict, any government entity or official from sending to, or receiving from, DHS
24 “information regarding the citizenship or immigration status of an individual.” 8 U.S.C.
25 § 1373(a); *see* 8 U.S.C. § 1644 (same); *see also* 8 U.S.C. § 1357(g)(10)(A) (providing for
26 state and local “communicat[ion] with [DHS] regarding the immigration status of any
27
28

1 individual, including reporting knowledge that a particular alien is not lawfully present in
2 the United States”). Congress also authorized states and localities “to cooperate with the
3 [Secretary] in the identification, apprehension, detention, or removal of aliens not
4 lawfully present in the United States.” *Id.* § 1357(g)(10)(B).

5
6 22. Federal law also explicitly recognizes the United States’ authority to “arrange for
7 appropriate places of detention for aliens detained pending removal or a decision on
8 removal,” including the lease or rental of state, local, and private facilities. *See* 8 U.S.C.
9 § 1231(g); *accord* 8 U.S.C. § 1103(a)(11).

10 23. Federal regulation provides that “[n]o person, including any state or local government
11 entity or any privately operated detention facility, that houses, maintains, provides
12 services to, or otherwise holds any detainee on behalf of [DHS] (whether by contract or
13 otherwise), and no other person who by virtue of any official or contractual relationship
14 with such person obtains information relating to any detainee, shall disclose or otherwise
15 permit to be made public the name of, or other information relating to, such detainee.
16 Such information shall be under the control of [DHS] and shall be subject to public
17 disclosure only pursuant to the provisions of applicable federal laws, regulations and
18 executive orders.” 8 C.F.R. § 236.6.

19
20
21 24. Congress, through IRCA, has also enacted a “comprehensive framework for combating
22 the employment of illegal aliens.” *Arizona*, 567 U.S. at 404. IRCA makes it illegal for
23 employers to knowingly hire, recruit, refer, or continue to employ aliens without
24 appropriate work authorization. *See* 8 U.S.C. § 1324a(a)(1)(A), (a)(2). It also requires
25 every employer to verify the employment authorization status of prospective employees.
26 *See id.* § 1324a(a)(1)(B), (b). DHS enforces these requirements through criminal
27
28

1 penalties and an escalating series of civil penalties tied to the number of times an
2 employer has violated the provisions. *See* 8 U.S.C. §§ 1324a(e)(4), (f).

3 25. As a means of enforcing IRCA’s criminal and civil penalties, Congress established a
4 nationally uniform inspection process whereby employers are required to retain
5 documentary evidence of authorized employment of aliens, and to permit federal
6 investigative officers to inspect such documents. *See* 8 U.S.C. § 1324a(b), (e)(2)(A).

7
8 26. DHS, through ICE and CBP, performs a significant portion of its law enforcement
9 activities in California. In Fiscal Year 2017, ICE’s Enforcement and Removal Operations
10 (ERO) apprehended 20,201 aliens in California alone, or roughly 14% of the aliens
11 apprehended nationwide. Thus far in 2018, ICE ERO has apprehended 8,588 aliens in
12 California, or roughly 14% of the aliens apprehended nationwide. Of those aliens
13 apprehended nationwide in 2016, 2017, and thus far in 2018, 92%, 90%, and 87%
14 respectively, were criminal aliens. In Fiscal Year 2017, ICE ERO booked a total of
15 323,591 aliens into custody, 41,880 of whom were detained in California. And CBP is
16 responsible for enforcing the immigration laws at ports of entry and areas near the border
17 in California, including apprehending recent entrants with criminal convictions or who
18 are national security concerns, and patrolling the border for narcotics.
19
20

21 CALIFORNIA PROVISIONS

22 Restrictions on Cooperation with Workplace Immigration Enforcement (AB 450)

23
24 27. On October 5, 2017, Governor Brown signed into law the “Immigrant Worker Protection
25 Act,” Assembly Bill 450 (AB 450), effective January 1, 2018 (Exhibit 1). Through AB
26 450, California regulates how private employers in California must respond to federal
27 efforts to ensure compliance with federal immigration laws through investigations in
28

1 places of employment.

2 28. AB 450 added Section 7285.1(a) of the California Government Code, which provides that
3 an employer or its agent “shall not provide voluntary consent to an immigration
4 enforcement agent to enter any nonpublic areas of a place of labor,” unless “the
5 immigration enforcement agent provides a judicial warrant” or consent is “otherwise
6 required by federal law.”
7

8 29. Section 7285.2(a)(1) similarly prohibits an employer or its agent from “provid[ing]
9 voluntary consent to an immigration enforcement agent to access, review, or obtain the
10 employer’s employee records without a subpoena or judicial warrant.”
11

12 30. Section 7285.2(a)(2) contains an exception for certain documents for which the United
13 States has provided a “Notice of Inspection,” Cal. Gov’t Code § 7285.2(a)(2). AB 450
14 added provisions to the California Labor Code that establish new requirements employers
15 must satisfy *before* allowing ICE to conduct the inspection process directed by federal
16 law. AB 450 requires employers to notify employees and their authorized representatives
17 of upcoming inspections of employment records “within 72 hours of receiving notice of
18 the inspection.” Cal. Lab. Code § 90.2(a)(1). It also requires employers to provide
19 employees and their authorized representatives, within 72 hours, with copies of written
20 immigration agency notices providing results of inspections. *Id.* § 90.2(b)(1).
21

22 31. All these provisions are subject to a schedule of civil penalties “of two thousand dollars
23 (\$2,000) up to five thousand dollars (\$5,000) for a first violation and five thousand
24 dollars (\$5,000) up to ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) for each subsequent violation.” Cal.
25 Gov’t Code §§ 7285.1(b), 7285.2(b); Cal. Lab. Code § 90.2(c).
26

27 32. AB 450 added Section 1019.2(a) of the California Labor Code, which provides that an
28

1 employer or its agent “shall not reverify the employment eligibility of a current employee
2 at a time or in a manner not required by Section 1324a(b) of Title 8 of the United States
3 Code.” Violators are subject to “a civil penalty of up to ten thousand dollars (\$10,000).”
4 Cal. Lab. Code § 1019.2(b).

5 33. Upon information and belief, California law does not prohibit employers from voluntarily
6 complying with requests from any other federal or California entities for information or
7 inspection, or compel employers to provide notice to their employees of other efforts to
8 collect information.

9
10 34. In Fiscal Year 2017, ICE conducted approximately 1,300 worksite inspections authorized
11 by IRCA across the country, including approximately 230 in California. If conditions are
12 appropriate, any of those investigations could lead to an inspection with the consent of
13 the employer, and often employers are very willing to provide consent in order to
14 alleviate and address concerns that arise during the inspection process. In addition such
15 inspections with the consent of the employer are critical to investigating cross border
16 smuggling of people, narcotics, and terrorism.

17
18
19 35. These provisions, individually and collectively, have the purpose and effect of interfering
20 with the enforcement of the INA and IRCA’s prohibition on working without
21 authorization. California has no lawful interest in protecting unauthorized workers from
22 detection or in shielding employers who have violated federal immigration law from
23 penalty. These provisions, as applied to private employers, violate the Supremacy Clause
24 by, among other things, constituting an obstacle to the United States’ enforcement of the
25 immigration laws and discriminating against federal immigration enforcement.
26

27 **Inspection and Review of Immigration Detention Facilities (AB 103)**
28

1 36. Under longstanding California law, “local detention facilities” are subject to biennial
2 inspections concerning health and safety, fire suppression preplanning, compliance with
3 training and funding requirements, and the types and availability of visitation. Cal. Penal
4 Code § 6031.1(a). The law defines “local detention facilities” as any city, county, or
5 regional facility in which individuals are confined for more than 24 hours, and includes
6 private facilities (though it excludes certain facilities for parolees, treatment and
7 restitution facilities, community correctional centers, and work furlough programs). *Id.*
8 § 6031.4.
9

10 37. On June 27, 2017, California enacted Assembly Bill 103 (AB 103) (Exhibit 2). Section
11 12 of AB 103 added Section 12532 to the California Government Code.
12

13 38. Rather than subject facilities housing civil immigration detainees to the inspection
14 scheme deemed sufficient for other detention facilities, the statute imposes a new set of
15 requirements specific to facilities housing immigration detainees. In particular, Section
16 12532(a) requires the California Attorney General or his designee “to engage in reviews
17 of county, local, or private locked detention facilities in which noncitizens are being
18 housed or detained for purposes of civil immigration proceedings in California.”
19

20 39. The statute is not limited to an inspection of facilities. The law also requires the
21 California Attorney General or his designee to examine the “due process provided” to
22 civil immigration detainees, and “the circumstances around their apprehension and
23 transfer to the facility.” Cal. Gov’t Code § 12532(b). Section 12532(c) instructs that the
24 California Attorney General or his designee “shall be provided all necessary access for
25 the observations necessary to effectuate reviews required pursuant to this section,
26 including, but not limited to, access to detainees, officials, personnel, and records.”
27
28

1 40. DHS, through ICE, has entered into contracts for detention services with private entities,
2 intergovernmental services agreements (IGSAs) with county, city, or local government
3 entities in California, and intergovernmental agreements (IGAs) with the U.S. Marshals
4 service that provide ICE with guaranteed housing for ICE detainees as needed. ICE
5 currently has twenty active contracts, IGSAs or IGAs, in California and regularly uses
6 nine detention facilities in California to house civil immigration detainees in ICE
7 custody.
8

9 41. Information obtained or developed as a result of an agreement with the detention facility
10 are federal records under the control of ICE for purposes of disclosure and are subject to
11 disclosure only pursuant to applicable federal information laws, regulations, and policies,
12 including but not limited to the Freedom of Information Act, 5 U.S.C. § 552 *et seq.*, and 8
13 C.F.R. § 236.6.
14

15 42. Three of these facilities, the Adelanto Correctional Facility, the Imperial Regional
16 Detention Facility, and the Mesa Verde Detention Facility are dedicated facilities that
17 exclusively house immigration detainees. In Fiscal Year 2018, these three facilities have
18 had an average daily population of 1,685, 680, and 384 detainees pending the outcome of
19 their administrative immigration cases, respectively.
20

21 43. The remaining facilities with IGSAs house both immigration detainees and local
22 detainees and are used on an as-needed basis. In Fiscal Year 2018, average daily detainee
23 populations at the as-needed facilities have ranged between a high of 956 at Otay Mesa
24 Detention and a low of 171 at Rio Cosumnes Correctional Center.
25

26 44. DHS, through ICE, houses civil immigration detainees at the Otay Mesa Detention
27 Center in California, a private detention facility that CoreCivic owns and operates. Otay
28

1 Mesa has an average daily population of around 1,000 detainees awaiting removal or a
2 decision on removal.

3 45. Upon information and belief, on November 16, 2017, Defendant Becerra initiated via
4 letter a request to inspect various ICE detention facilities, including Imperial, Adelanto,
5 Mesa Verde, the Theo Lacy Facility, the James A. Musick Facility, Yuba County Jail,
6 Rio Cosumnes Correctional Center, Contra Costa West County Detention Facility, and
7 Otay Mesa, as well as a request to inspect DHS documents concerning aliens detained in
8 these locations.
9

10 46. Upon information and belief, Yuba, Rio Cosumnes, Contra Costa, Theo Lacy, and James
11 A. Musick, have been inspected since the law's passage
12

13 47. On January 24, 2018, Defendant Becerra via letter informed Imperial, Adelanto, Mesa
14 Verde, and Otay Mesa that he intended to inspect those facilities on either February 26,
15 2018 or March 5, 2018, and required access to documents and other material subject to
16 ICE control and deemed privileged under federal law and regulation. *See* 8 C.F.R. §
17 236.6.
18

19 48. Upon information and belief, California does not require any local detention facility to
20 comply with section 12532's heightened inspections regime when it houses detainees for
21 other federal or California entities. AB 103's requirements apply only when local
22 detention facilities house federal civil immigration detainees.
23

24 49. AB 103 thus requires the California Attorney General to investigate the law enforcement
25 efforts of federal agents engaged in apprehending and transferring aliens, to assess the
26 "due process" provided to those aliens and the "circumstances around their apprehension
27 and transfer to the facility," and to assess the law enforcement decisions of personnel
28

1 under contract to the United States, as well as records of unspecified scope. The statute
2 thus commands an improper, significant intrusion into federal enforcement of the
3 immigration laws. California has no lawful interest in investigating federal law
4 enforcement efforts. These provisions violate the Supremacy Clause by, among other
5 things, constituting an obstacle to the United States' enforcement of the immigration laws
6 and discriminating against the United States.
7

8 **Restrictions on State and Local Cooperation with Federal Officials (SB 54)**

9 50. On October 5, 2017, the Governor signed into law the Senate Bill 54 (SB 54), which
10 includes the "California Values Act," effective January 1, 2018 (Exhibit 3).

11 51. SB 54 limits state and local cooperation with federal immigration enforcement in a
12 number of ways. New Section 7284.6 prohibits state and local law enforcement officials,
13 other than employees of the California Department of Corrections, from, among other
14 things: "[p]roviding information regarding a person's release date or responding to
15 requests for notification by providing release dates or other information," Cal Gov't Code
16 § 7284.6(a)(1)(C); providing "personal information," including (but not limited to) an
17 individual's home address or work address, *id.* § 7284.6(a)(1)(D); and "[t]ransfer[ring] an
18 individual to immigration authorities," *id.* § 7284.6(a)(4).
19
20

21 52. These provisions contain limited exceptions. State and local law enforcement may share
22 with the United States "information regarding a person's release date" or respond "to
23 requests for notification by providing release dates or other information," but only where
24 an individual subject to such information sharing has been convicted of a limited subset
25 crimes, or where the information is available to the public. Cal. Gov't Code §§ 7282.5(a),
26 7284.6(a)(1)(C). Personal information also may be shared only if it is available to the
27
28

1 public. *Id.* § 7284.6(a)(1)(D). State and local law enforcement agencies may “[t]ransfer
2 an individual to immigration authorities” only if the United States presents a “judicial
3 warrant or judicial probable cause determination,” or the individual in question has been
4 convicted of one of a limited set of enumerated felonies or other serious crimes. Cal.
5 Gov’t Code §§ 7284.6(a)(4), 7282.5(a).

6
7 53. The limited subset of criminal violations does not match federal law governing what may
8 serve as the predicate for inadmissibility or removability, including listing a set of crimes
9 more narrow than those that render an alien removable. *See* 8 U.S.C. §§ 1182(a)(2),
10 1227(a)(2). And it does not match the set of criminal offenses that require the federal
11 government to detain such aliens upon their release from state or local custody. *Id.* §
12 1226(c).

13
14 54. Upon information and belief, California law does not impose these restrictions on other
15 forms of information sharing on other topics, nor does it restrict transfers of individuals
16 to other law enforcement agencies in this way.

17
18 55. These provisions impermissibly prohibit even the most basic cooperation with federal
19 officials. As noted above, federal law contemplates that criminal aliens in state custody
20 who may be subject to removal will complete their state or local sentences first before
21 being detained by the United States, but that federal immigration detention for
22 immigration proceedings or for removal will begin upon the alien’s release from state
23 custody. 8 U.S.C. § 1226(c); § 1231(a)(4). Additionally, federal law contemplates that
24 DHS will be able to inspect all applicants for admission, and take all appropriate action
25 against those found to be inadmissible to the United States, even those that may have
26 been transferred to the custody of state and local law enforcement pending such a state
27
28

1 and local prosecution. *See* 8 U.S.C. §§ 1182, 1225(b)(2); 8 C.F.R. § 235.2. And, to
2 facilitate coordination between state and local officials and the United States, Congress
3 expressly prohibited any federal, state, or local government entity or official from
4 prohibiting, or in any way restricting, any government entity or official from sending to,
5 or receiving from, DHS “information regarding the citizenship or immigration status of
6 an individual.” 8 U.S.C. § 1373(a); *see also* 8 U.S.C. § 1644. Although SB 54 purports to
7 be consistent with section 1373, *see* Cal. Gov’t Code § 7284.6(e), sections
8 7284.6(a)(1)(C) and (D) explicitly forbid the sharing of information covered by 8 U.S.C.
9 § 1373.

10
11 56. The transfer restriction additionally requires that the United States present a “judicial
12 warrant or judicial probable cause determination” before the state or locality may transfer
13 an alien to DHS for appropriate immigration enforcement action. This provision also
14 conflicts with federal law, which establishes a system of civil administrative warrants as
15 the basis for immigration arrest and removal, and does not require or contemplate use of a
16 judicial warrant for civil immigration enforcement. *See* 8 U.S.C. § 1226(a), 1231(a).

17
18 57. Upon information and belief, since January 1, 2018, law enforcement agencies in
19 California, as defined by SB 54, will not communicate to DHS the release date or home
20 address of aliens DHS has reason to believe are removable from the United States, or
21 transfer such aliens to DHS custody, even where DHS presents a Congressionally-
22 authorized civil administrative warrant of arrest or removal, *see* 8 U.S.C. § 1226(a);
23 1231(a), or has transferred those aliens to local law enforcement in the first instance to
24 permit California or its subdivisions to criminally prosecute them for a state crime.

25
26 58. By restricting basic information sharing and by barring the transfer to DHS of aliens in
27
28

1 state or local custody upon their release through the means provided for by federal law,
2 SB 54 requires federal immigration officers to either engage in difficult and dangerous
3 efforts to re-arrest aliens who were previously in state custody, endangering immigration
4 officers, the alien at issue, and others who may be nearby, or to determine that it is not
5 appropriate to transfer an alien to state or local custody in the first place, in order to
6 comply with their mission to enforce the immigration laws. California has no lawful
7 interest in assisting removable aliens to evade federal law enforcement.
8

9 59. These provisions violate the Supremacy Clause by, among other things, constituting an
10 obstacle to the United States' enforcement of the immigration laws and discriminating
11 against federal immigration enforcement, as well as (with respect to the information-
12 sharing restrictions) expressly violating 8 U.S.C. § 1373(a).
13

14 **CLAIM FOR RELIEF**

15 **COUNT ONE – Restrictions on Cooperation with Workplace Immigration Enforcement**

16 60. Plaintiff hereby incorporates paragraphs 1 through 26, and 27 through 35 of the
17 Complaint as if fully stated herein.
18

19 61. Sections 7285.1, and 7285.2 of the California Government Code and Sections 90.2 and
20 1019.2 of the California Labor Code, violate the Supremacy Clause as applied to private
21 employers, and are invalid.
22

23 **COUNT TWO – Inspection and Review of Detention Facilities**

24 62. Plaintiff hereby incorporates paragraphs 1 through 26, and 36 through 49 of the
25 Complaint as if fully stated herein.
26

27 63. Section 12532 of the California Government Code violates the Supremacy Clause, and is
28 invalid.

COUNT THREE – Restrictions on State and Local Cooperation

64. Plaintiff hereby incorporates paragraphs 1 through 26, and 50 through 59 of the Complaint as if fully stated herein.

65. Sections 7284.6(a)(1)(C) & (D) and 7284.6(a)(4) of the California Government Code violate the Supremacy Clause and 8 U.S.C. § 1373(a), and are invalid.

PRAYER FOR RELIEF

WHEREFORE, the United States respectfully requests the following relief:

1. That this Court enter a judgment declaring that Sections 7285.1 and 7285.2 of the California Government Code, and Sections 90.2 and 1019.2 of the California Labor Code violate the Supremacy Clause as applied to private employers and are therefore invalid;
2. That this Court enter a judgment declaring that Section 12532 of the California Government Code violates the Supremacy Clause and is therefore invalid;
3. That this Court enter a judgment declaring that Sections 7284.6(a)(1)(C) & (D) and 7284.6(a)(4) of the California Government Code violate the Supremacy Clause and are therefore invalid;
4. That this Court issue preliminary and permanent injunctions that prohibit Defendants as well as their successors, agents, and employees, from enforcing against private employers sections 7285.1 and 7285.2 of the California Government Code, and Sections 90.2 and 1019.2 of the California Labor Code;
5. That this Court issue preliminary and permanent injunctions that prohibit Defendants, as well as their successors, agents, and employees, from enforcing Section 12532 of the California Government Code;
6. That this Court issue preliminary and permanent injunctions that prohibit Defendants as

1 well as their successors, agents, and employees, from enforcing Sections 7284.6(a)(1)(C)
2 & (D) and 7284.6(a)(4) of the California Government Code;

3 7. That this Court award the United States its costs in this action; and

4 8. That this Court award any other relief it deems just and proper.

This letter provides an overview of the process for Amador County to rejoin the Central Sierra Economic Development District (CSEDD). Mother Lode Job Training currently provides administration services for the CSEDD.

The CSEDD has been the Central Sierra region's EDA-recognized economic development district for over forty years. Formed as a Joint Powers Authority (JPA) in 1976, CSEDD's original member entities included the counties of Alpine, Amador, Calaveras, and Tuolumne as well as the cities of Sonora, Angels Camp, Jackson, Sutter Creek, Amador City, Lone, and Plymouth. Mariposa County was ratified into the District in November 2011.

On February 5, 2014, Amador County withdrew from the CSEDD. Under the CSEDD JPA agreement at that time, the five incorporated cities of Amador County were automatically removed from CSEDD upon the departure of the County.

CSEDD's board is comprised of both public and private sector members. An elected official from each county's Board of Supervisors and an alternate are appointed for a one-year term and one City Council member and an alternate are appointed from Sonora and Angels Camp. Each county Board of Supervisors also appoints a public member and an alternate.

Amador County officials have approached the CSEDD and expressed interest in rejoining the CSEDD. On September 21, 2017, the CSEDD board discussed and voted unanimously to endorse Amador County's membership request.

The current fees for Amador County to rejoin the CSEDD, based on the 35,056 population figure discussed at the September 21, 2017, board meeting, is \$5,819.30. Should Amador County wish to pursue CSEDD membership, the Amador Board of Supervisors will need to expressly ratify and adopt the CSEDD JPA and its amendment, both of which are attached hereto.

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SECOND AMENDED AND RESTATED JOINT EXERCISE OF POWERS
 AGREEMENT BETWEEN ALPINE COUNTY, CALAVERAS COUNTY,
 MARIPOSA COUNTY, AND TUOLUMNE COUNTY; CITY OF ANGELS AND
 THE CITY OF SONORA FOR THE PURPOSE OF CREATING AN ECONOMIC
 DEVELOPMENT DISTRICT

THIS SECOND AMENDED AND RESTATED AGREEMENT ("Agreement") is entered into this 17 day of March, 2015, by and between the counties of Alpine, Calaveras, Mariposa and Tuolumne, ("County Members"), and the cities of Angels and Sonora, ("City Members"). County Members and City Members are collectively referred to as "Members" or "Member Agencies." This Agreement supersedes and repeals the "Joint Exercise of Powers Agreement Between Alpine County, Amador County, Calaveras County, and Tuolumne County; Amador City, City of Angels, City of Lone, City of Jackson, City of Plymouth, City of Sonora, the City of Sutter Creek for the Purpose of Creating an Economic Development District" dated August 1, 1976 and amended in 1996 ("Original Agreement") and the Revised CSEDD JPA dated November 19, 2012, as defined below.

WITNESSETH

WHEREAS, each Member is empowered by law to provide economic development planning and to participate in federal programs relating to economic development; and

WHEREAS, each Member is of the opinion that there should be regional planning for economic development; and

WHEREAS, the Economic Development Act of 1965, PL 89-136 as amended ("Act") provides that public agencies may combine to form Economic Development Districts; and

WHEREAS, the geographical area of Member Agencies represents an economic development district for purposes of the Act; and

WHEREAS, the Member Agencies deem it necessary and proper to create a separate public entity by joint exercise of powers agreement to devise and create an organizational and administrative structure for the operation of an economic development district encompassing the geographical territory of the Member Agencies and to secure approval of the federal government for designation as an Economic Development District pursuant to the Act and to assist Member Agencies in applying to the federal and state governments for grants, funds, and assistance; and

WHEREAS, in 1976, the counties of Alpine, Amador, Calaveras, and Tuolumne and the cities of Amador City, Angels, Lone, Jackson, Plymouth and Sonora entered into the Original Agreement creating the Central Sierra Economic Development District, which was later amended in 1996; and

WHEREAS, the County of Mariposa joined the Central Sierra Economic Development District in 2011; and

WHEREAS, the Original Agreement was revised and restated on November 19, 2012 ("Revised CSEDD JPA"); and

WHEREAS, in 2014, the County of Amador submitted its letter of withdrawal and the cities of Amador City, Lone, Jackson, Plymouth and Sutter Creek were automatically withdrawn through the operation of the Revised CSEDD JPA.

NOW THEREFORE, the Boards of Supervisors of the Counties of Alpine, Calaveras, Mariposa and Tuolumne, and the City Councils of Angels and Sonora for and in consideration of the mutual promises and agreements herein contained do agree as follows:

1. Formation of Agency. The Central Sierra Economic Development District ("District") was established in 1976 upon the execution of the Original Agreement by all designated county Members and at least one city Member located in each county which is a Member. A county or city may become a Member of the District upon (1) its governing body expressly ratifying and adopting this Agreement, and (2) amendment of this Agreement pursuant to Paragraph 15. The District shall be a public agency separate and distinct from its Members, and which may sue and be sued.
2. Purpose. The purpose of the Agreement shall be to provide for the joint participation by Members, as Members of the District, to:
 - (a) Promote economic growth by means of planning and coordinating the efforts of Members and the private sector within the territorial limits of the Members;
 - (b) Promote more jobs for the unemployed and underemployed residents of the Members;
 - (c) Improve the social and physical environments of the Members;
 - (d) Prevent unnecessary duplication of effort on behalf of Members;
 - (e) Assume any additional purposes, duties and functions as may be determined by all parties to this Agreement.
3. Governing Board. The governing board of the District ("Board") shall be composed of the following directors:
 - (a) Elected Officials. One director and one alternate director appointed by and from the membership of the board of supervisors of each County Member; one director and one alternate director appointed by and from the membership of the city councils of each City Member.
 - (b) Citizen Representation. The boards of supervisors of each County Member shall appoint one director and one alternate director who reside in the appointing county. Said additional directors and alternates shall not be elected officials of any county or city.
 - (c) Vacancies for directors who are elected officials shall be filled in the same manner as the initial directors are selected. Vacancies for citizen directors shall be filled by the board of supervisors of each County Member.
 - (d) Appointments to the Board should be made so that the Board may be broadly representative of all segments of the community.
 - (e) The terms of office of directors who are elected officials shall be at the pleasure of their respective appointing board of supervisors or city council. The term of office of the citizen directors shall be at the pleasure of their appointing board of supervisors, provided, however, that no such director shall continue to be a director if the appointing

County ceases to be a Member Agency of the District or said director ceases to be a resident of the appointing County.

- (f) The Board shall elect from its membership a chair and a vice-chair, each of whom shall serve for a term of one year.
 - (g) A majority of the directors of the District shall constitute a quorum. A majority of the directors present shall be required to vote affirmatively for any action in order for said action to be valid and effective.
 - (h) Alternate directors may take part in any discussion or meeting of the Board whether or not the primary director from the respective Member is present, provided, however, that in the event that the primary director is present at any meeting, the alternate director shall not have a vote in any decision or participate in closed sessions.
 - (i) Member Agencies understand and agree that, in order for the District to function effectively, it is imperative to have an active, engaged and full Board. To that end, Member Agencies will use all due diligence and reasonable efforts to appoint directors and alternate directors who have the time, expertise and interest to participate in the governance of the District. In the event of excessive absenteeism by a Member Agency's director and their alternate, the District Board shall not consider applications for projects or funding within the jurisdiction of said Member Agency until the Member's director(s) have attended two (2) consecutive District Board meetings. Excessive absenteeism is defined as missing three (3) consecutive Board meetings or fifty percent (50%) of the Board meetings in a rolling 12-month period without excuse. The District Board shall adopt a formal policy regarding director attendance, including what constitutes an excused absence, and District communication with Member Agencies regarding the same.
4. Duties of Governing Board. The Board shall have the following duties and powers:
- (a) To act as the policy making body of the District;
 - (b) To act as the executive body of the District, which power said Board may delegate to staff to the extent the Board deems appropriate and is otherwise in accordance with law;
 - (c) To enter into contracts and to accept and expend funds from Federal, State, Member Agencies, and other sources for the purposes specified herein;
 - (d) To prepare, review and update an economic development plan for the District, establish priorities for grant applications, make annual progress reports to the U.S. Economic Development Administration pursuant to the Act, and make such other reports as may be required or appropriate;
 - (e) To assist, upon request, area and local economic development program committees of Member Agencies and private economic development corporations within the jurisdiction of the District in the preparation of applications to state and federal agencies for grants, loans, and technical assistance;
 - (f) To assist the private sector in making applications for loans, and work with local development corporations to assist private enterprise in the development of new business and the expansion of existing business;

- (g) To work with local committees of Member Agencies to coordinate programs complying with local community desires;
 - (h) To appoint or hire such staff or contract with such entities or individuals as the Board deems necessary to carry out the District's functions and purposes; and
 - (i) If a Member and other agencies request it, the Board may review applications of Members and other agencies for grants from the U.S. Economic Development Administration or other funding sources. Upon review of such applications, the Board may establish priorities for funding.
5. Budget. An annual budget for the operation of the District and fiscal year shall be adopted by the Board.
 6. Financing. The Members shall provide the cost of administration of the District until a federal grant is received for this purpose. If or when the U.S. Economic Development Administration or other funding sources provides grant funds for the District, with Members to supply local matching funds of whatever proportion, Members shall supply said matching funds upon notice therefor from District. In the event that any Member within sixty (60) days of notice therefor has failed to contribute the funds required by District, the Board may request Member Agencies amend this Agreement to remove the delinquent Member. All contributions to the District shall be in accordance with the formula or plan established by the Board, which formula or plan may be amended at any time and from time to time. Required contributions may be in-kind so long as the approval therefor shall have first been obtained from the Board.
 7. Custody of funds; reporting. All payments of public funds shall be paid to and disbursed by District which shall be strictly accountable for all funds and responsible for reporting to the Members hereof concerning all receipt disbursements. All of District's funds shall be deposited in a special fund established for the purpose in the treasury of one County Member. The treasurer of said county shall be in charge of and be the depository for said funds and other property of the District. No bond shall be required of said treasurer.
 8. Payment of warrants; audits. The District Controller shall be the auditor/controller of one County Member, who shall draw warrants to pay demands against the District to meet all of the District's obligations, as authorized by the District Board of Directors. The District Controller shall serve on his/her official bond. The District Controller shall be responsible for strict accounting responsibilities as outlined in the California Government Code, Sections 6505 and 6505.5.
 9. Permissible contributions. Every Member Agency may, but shall not be required to, contribute money, office supplies, furnishings, equipment, supplies or service as the respective governing board of said Member may deem appropriate in excess of the contributions required under Paragraph 6 hereof.


10. Limitations on expenditures. The Board and every official or employee of the District shall be limited in the making of expenditures or the incurring of liabilities to the amount of appropriations allowed by the budget as adopted by the Board or thereafter revised by the Board. No expenditure of any kind or contract entered into on behalf of District without approval by the Board, except as otherwise provided by law, warrants issued, expenditures made or liabilities incurred in excess of any budget appropriation are not a liability of the District or a liability of any party to this Agreement.
11. Member not liable for debts of District. Pursuant to Section 6508.1 of the California Government Code, the debts, liabilities, and obligations of the District shall be those of the District and not of the parties to this Agreement.
12. Duration of Agreement. This Agreement shall continue in effect until terminated by agreement or withdrawal of all but one of the County Members, provided, however, that any Member may withdraw from the District at any time without terminating the District unless and until all but one of the County Members have withdrawn therefrom. Withdrawal by any Member shall relieve said Member from any obligation to contribute any money or property previously required of said Member by the Board, provided, however, that in the event that said withdrawing Member has received any benefit related to said required contributions, said Member shall not be relieved from said obligation.
13. Disposition of property upon termination. In the event that the District is terminated by agreement, the property and monies on hand at the time of termination after all debts and liabilities are paid shall be distributed among the parties then Members of the District in accordance with their proportionate contributions thereto. Any Member who withdraws from the District shall forfeit all of its right, title and interest to all such property and monies.
14. Members Option to bypass District. It is the option of Members to submit grant applications through the District to the U.S. Economic Development Administration or other funding sources, or directly to the U.S. Economic Development Administration or other funding sources, bypassing District.
15. Amendment. This Agreement may be amended at any time by the mutual written agreement of two-thirds (2/3) of the Members hereof.
16. Agency Designation: Pursuant to Government Code section 6509, the District's exercise of power is subject to the restrictions upon the manner of exercising the power of Tuolumne County.
17. Counterparts. This Agreement shall be executed in counterpart and when so executed by each and every party hereto shall be deemed to be executed by all parties as if it were a single

document. Said executed counterparts shall be retained by District and District shall distribute to all other parties copies of said original counterparts.

AMENDMENT #1 TO
SECOND AMENDED AND RESTATED JOINT EXERCISE OF POWERS AGREEMENT
BETWEEN ALPINE COUNTY, CALAVERAS COUNTY, MARIPOSA COUNTY, AND
TUOLUMNE COUNTY; CITY OF ANGELS AND THE CITY OF SONORA FOR THE
PURPOSE OF CREATING AN ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT DISTRICT

This Amendment #1 (“Amendment #1”) is entered into by and between the counties of Alpine, Calaveras, Mariposa and Tuolumne (“County Members”), the cities of Angels and Sonora (“City Members”) and the County of Amador (“Amador”).

WHEREAS, on March 17, 2015, the County Members and the City Members adopted the Second Amended and Restated Joint Exercise of Powers Agreement (“Agreement”) for the purpose of creating, the Central Sierra Economic Development District (“District”); and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Paragraph 1 of the Agreement, “a county or city may become a Member of the District upon (1) its governing body expressly ratifying and adopting this Agreement, and (2) amendment of this Agreement pursuant to Paragraph 15.”; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Paragraph 15 of the Agreement, the “Agreement may be amended at any time by the mutual written agreement of two-thirds (2/3) of the Members hereof.”; and

WHEREAS, the County of Amador has expressed interest in becoming a County Member of the District.

NOW THEREFORE, THE COUNTY MEMBERS, CITY MEMBERS AND AMADOR AGREE as follows:

1. This Amendment #1 shall be operative and AMADOR shall be a County Member of the District upon both of the following:
 - a. The AMADOR Board of Supervisors expressly ratifies and adopts the Agreement. By signing this Amendment #1, the AMADOR signatories certify that the AMADOR Board of Supervisors has taken this action.
 - b. Two-Thirds (2/3) of the District Members approve this Amendment #1.
2. AMADOR shall have the same rights and responsibilities under the Agreement as a County Member.
3. Except as amended herein, all other terms and conditions of the Agreement shall remain in full force and effect.





AMADOR TRAVEL-RELATED EMPLOYMENT





Request for temporary increase and extension to the JVID \$500,000 Bridge Loan:

The Jackson Valley Irrigation District (JVID) has been diligently working since 2008 to complete the JVID Treated Water Project. The California Department of Public Health (CDPH) has identified a category "C" health risk within Jackson Valley since 2001 because JVID has been serving customers untreated lake water from the irrigation system for in-home use. The first phase of this project was completed in 2012-2013. This phase consisted of a raw water pipeline from nearby Lake Pardee, a new treatment plant building and treatment unit using a \$2 million dollar California Department of Public Health Prop. 50 Grant.

In 2017 JVID was then granted a \$9.6 million Prop. 1 Water Board grant to extend the project to end users which consists of additional upgrades to the treatment plant, storage tank and 17 miles of pipeline distribution.

This bridge loan has been a necessity to pay contractors within a reasonable amount of time of 30-60 days. From experience working with the Water Board in the past, the time between claim submission and reimbursement can be very unpredictable, sometimes up to 90 days or longer.

Since this a much larger project than the first \$2 million-dollar project there is a need to temporarily increase the bridge loan from \$500,000 to \$1.5 million to allow us to pay the contractor for mobilization and other start up items until the Prop 1 funding (which is expected to by July – August) is in place and allows JVID to reimburse through the grant.

JVID would like to first request a temporary increase on the bridge loan from \$500,000 to \$1.5 million.

JVID would like to additionally request the Amador County Board of Supervisors to consider extending the effective date of the JVID Bridge Loan from December 31st, 2018 till **December 31st, 2020** thus giving JVID the ability to draw from this loan during the new projected construction timeline of the JVID Treated Water Project Phase 2.

ORDINANCE NO. XXXX

Chapter 2.68

SALARIES OF ELECTED OFFICIALS

The Board of Supervisors of the County of Amador ordains as follows:

Section 1. Chapter 2.68 of the Amador County Code is hereby amended as follows:

Chapter 2.68

SALARIES OF ELECTED OFFICIALS

Sections:

- 2.68.020 Salaries.
- 2.68.025 Benefits.
- 2.68.030 Payable when.

2.68.020 Salaries and benefits.

The Elected Officials of the County shall receive as compensation for services required of him/her by law or virtue of his/her office salaries in accordance with the table listed as "Appendix A" for each month during which the elected official holds the office. Such salaries shall be prorated for the first and last month of his/her term.

2.68.025 Benefits.

A. Except as set forth in this Chapter 2.68, each elected official shall accrue benefits as set forth in the most current resolution adopted for management unit employees (as if they are employees), with the exception of vacation, sick leave, unemployment, and SDI benefits; provided, however, that each elected official shall receive six days of sick leave credit for each year of continuous service for which they were elected, which credit may be used only toward PERS retirement credit. Pension benefits for each elected official shall be as set forth in Section 2.68.025.C.

B. The Sheriff- Coroner shall be eligible for the same Retirement Plan to which the members of the Deputy Sheriff's Association, Sheriff's Office Association, and Sheriff's Office Mid-Management Unit are entitled. The District Attorney shall be eligible for the same Retirement Plan for local prosecutors to which the members of the Amador County Deputy District Attorney Association are entitled. If an elected official elects not to participate in PERS, the total amount that the County would contribute to PERS on that official's behalf shall be paid to that official in cash and that official shall not be entitled to the sick leave credit described above.

C. Effective July 1, 2016, the Employer Paid Member Contribution (EPMC) for each elected officer shall be reduced as follows:

1. For the Sheriff-Coroner and the District Attorney, the EPMC shall be reduced from nine percent (9%) to (i) eight percent (8%) on July 1, 2016, and from eight percent (8%) to (ii) seven percent (7%) on July 1, 2017; and

2. For the Treasurer-Tax Collector, , the Clerk-Recorder and the Assessor, the EPMC shall be reduced from seven percent (7%) to (i) six percent (6%) on July 1, 2016 and from six percent (6%) to (ii) five percent (5%) on July 1, 2017; and
3. All elected officials elected as new employees according to PERS regulations shall pay one half of normal cost as determined by CalPERS.

2.68.030 Payable when.

All salaries provided for under this chapter shall be paid under the same terms and conditions as salaries of other employees working for the county of Amador.

Section II. Prior to the expiration of fifteen (15) days from the passage of this Ordinance a summary thereof shall be published in the Amador Ledger-Dispatch, a newspaper of general circulation, published and circulated in the County of Amador. This Ordinance shall take effect thirty (30) days after the date of its adoption, and thenceforth and thereafter the same shall be in full force and effect.

EMPLOYMENT AGREEMENT

THIS EMPLOYMENT AGREEMENT (this “Agreement”) is entered into between the COUNTY OF AMADOR, a political subdivision of the State of California (“County”) and CHARLES T. ILEY (“Iley”) and shall be effective on May ___, 2018.

A. County desires to employ Iley to serve as County Administrative Officer (“CAO”), pursuant to the terms and conditions of this Agreement.

B. Iley is willing to serve as CAO upon the terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement.

NOW, THEREFOR, the parties agree as follows:

1. Duties.

(a) County hereby employs Iley as CAO to perform the functions and duties as generally set out in Amador County Code Chapter 2.22 and to perform other duties and functions as the Board of Supervisors may from time to time assign.

(b) Iley shall perform his duties to the best of his ability in accordance with the highest professional and ethical standards of the profession and shall comply with all general rules and regulations established by County.

(c) Iley shall not engage in any activity that is or may become a conflict of interest or that may create an incompatibility of office as defined by California law. Iley agrees to remain in the exclusive employ of County during the term of this Agreement and agrees that he shall not take any position, paid or otherwise, that may in any degree conflict or appear to conflict with the duties inherent in the position of CAO. Iley shall complete disclosure forms as required by law.

2. Term.

The term of the Agreement shall be from the date first written above and shall continue in perpetuity unless terminated by either party in accordance with the provisions of Paragraph 3 or by Iley’s death or permanent disability.

3. Resignation and Termination.

(a) Iley may resign at any time and agrees to give County at least ninety (90) days’ advance written notice of the effective date of his resignation.

(b) County may terminate Iley at any time upon written notice.

(c) The parties recognize and affirm that Iley is an “at will” employee whose employment may be terminated by County without cause, and there is no express or implied promise made to him for any form of continued employment. This Agreement is the sole and

exclusive basis for an employment relationship between Iley and County. Nothing in this Agreement shall affect in any manner Iley's status as an "at-will" employee.

4. Severance Pay.

If Iley is terminated by County, for reasons other than for cause, while still willing and able to perform his duties, County agrees to pay Iley a cash "severance" payment equal to two (2) months base salary at his then-current rate, less applicable tax withholding. As a condition to receipt of severance pay, Iley shall execute a release of all claims in a form deemed satisfactory to County. Acceptance of such payment shall release County from any further obligations under this Agreement. The foregoing notwithstanding, if Iley is terminated for cause County shall have no obligation to pay the severance set forth in this paragraph, although he shall be eligible for other accrued benefits.

5. Salary and Benefits.

County shall compensate Iley annually in the amount shown below:

<u>Effective Date</u>	<u>Annual Salary</u>
October 1, 2017	\$158,972
October 1, 2018	\$160,562

Iley shall contribute 4% towards the Employee Paid Retirement Contribution. Effective July 1, 2018, Iley shall contribute 7% towards the Employee Paid Retirement Contribution. Iley shall receive all other benefits afforded to Management Unit employees, as set forth in the Resolution adopted by County's Board of Supervisors for the Management Unit, as such resolution may be unilaterally amended by the Board of Supervisors from time to time. Such benefits shall include without limitation retirement, insurance (health, vision, dental, life), sick leave, vacation leave, management/administrative leave, holiday leave, and employee wellness program. Iley shall also be allowed to participate in all other voluntary programs, such as deferred compensation and longevity pay, offered to Management Unit employees. Iley's salary and benefits will be reviewed annually and may be adjusted by the Board of Supervisors in conjunction with his performance evaluation.

6. Indemnification.

County shall defend and indemnify Iley against claims and liabilities arising within the course and scope of his employment as set forth in Division 3.6 of Title 1 of the California Government Code (commencing with section 810).

7. Performance Evaluation.

The Board of Supervisors shall evaluate Iley's performance at least annually and set goals and objectives for the ensuing year.

8. Notices.

Any notices required by this Agreement shall be in writing and either given in person or by first class mail with the postage prepaid and addressed as follows:

9. Entire Agreement.

This Agreement is the final and complete agreement of the parties with respect to the matters specified herein and supersedes all prior oral or written understandings. Except as prescribed herein, this Agreement cannot be modified except by written mutual agreement by the parties.

10. Assignment.

This Agreement is not assignable by either County or Iley.

11. Severability.

In the event that any provision of this Agreement is finally held or determined to be illegal or void by a court having jurisdiction over the parties, the remainder of this Agreement shall remain in full force and effect unless the parts found to be void are wholly inseparable from the remaining portion of this Agreement.

Mr. Dave Thoeny, Motherlode Job Training Executive Director, addressed the Board and provided a summary of the process for Amador County to rejoin the Central Sierra Economic Development District (CSEDD). A memorandum summarizing this matter is hereby incorporated into these minutes as though set forth in full.

Discussion ensued with Supervisor Oneto requesting this matter be continued to a future meeting when documentation regarding the last ten years of funding history can be reviewed and possibly with a breakdown by totals per County. In addition the Board requested further

information on the nine objectives that are identified in the Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy that Mr. Thoeny referred to.

Ms. Sherry Curtis, District III resident

Discussion ensued with the following action being taken.

Amador Arts: Discussion and possible action relative to a presentation by Ms. Terra Forgette, Amador Arts Executive Director, relative to a recent work by Amador Arts in the community and a request for funding in the 2018-19 Budget.

Ms. Terra Forgette, Amador Arts Executive Director, took this time to update the Board on past accomplishments and future endeavors planned for Amador Arts. She continued by respectfully requesting the Board consider allocating \$5,000 to Amador Arts in the next fiscal year.

Discussion ensued with the following action being taken.

ACTION: Direction given to consider this request for funding as part of the budget workshop to be held on May 15, 2018.

Jackson Valley Fire Protection District MOU: Discussion and possible action regarding an MOU between Amador County and the Jackson Valley Fire Protection District to allow Cal Fire to provide services within JVFPD limits as part of the County's ISA with the Buena Vista Band of Miwuk Indians.

Supervisor Oneto recused himself relative to this item to avoid any conflict of interest issues.

Mr. Greg Gillott, County Counsel, addressed the Board and provided a brief synopsis of this issue. He stated recently the county became aware that the tribe obtained funding to move forward with their casino project. In an effort to implement the provision of the Intergovernmental Services Agreement (ISA) several details need to be worked out. The ISA calls for CalFire to provide fire/emergency service to the casino and surrounding area and conduct its operations from the Jackson Valley Fire Protection District station. The County maintains an agreement with CalFire, however there is not a mechanism in place that allows CalFire to operate in Jackson Valley and to utilize the equipment/fire apparatus of the JVFPD. Therefore, he continued, a simple MOU has been drafted between the County and JVFPD to allow CalFire to begin operations and provide service as outlined in the ISA. Mr. Gillott noted Jackson Valley Fire Protection District Board dis approve this MOU at their meeting on April 18, 2018.

Chairperson Morgan opened this matter to public comment at this time. The following individuals wished to speak:

Mr. Rob Withrow, CalFire, provided a summary of what the responsibilities of CalFire will be as this project moves forward.

Mr. Bill May, District II resident, addressed the Board and expressed concern relative to Jackson Valley Fire Protection District being “held harmless” in the event that something goes awry with the Casino and its operations. Mr. May fears the financial impacts on such a small Department would be devastating if they were held responsible for any outstanding costs owed to CalFire in the event Casino operations ceased.

Mr. Greg Gillott, County Counsel, addressed Mr. May’s concern by stating “hold harmless” is a broad legal term. He stated the likelihood of Jackson Valley Fire Protection District being held responsible for paying CalFire for their services is not likely. He pointed out that the County has the agreement with CalFire, therefore CalFire would not have basis to make a claim against JVFPD in such circumstances.

Supervisor Forster stated he understands the concerns of Mr. May regarding the financial impact on taxpayers and Jackson Valley Fire Protection District if Casino operations suddenly stop. He would like staff to continue to work towards allocating funds to be held in specific accounts in the event CalFire finds they can no longer provide service or the Casino ceases making payments. Supervisor Forster stated a “wind-down” period for CalFire should be implemented to ensure a smooth transition and avoid any financial impacts if unforeseen circumstances should occur.

ACTION: Direction given pursuant to the following motion.

MOTION: It was moved by Supervisor Axe, seconded by Supervisor Crew and unanimously carried to approve the MOU between Amador County and the Jackson Valley Fire Protection District to allow Cal Fire to provide services within JVFPD limits as part of the County’s ISA with the Buena Vista Band of Miwuk Indians.

Aye: Supervisors Axe, Crew, Morgan and Forster

Noes: None

Recused: Supervisor Oneto

Supervisor Oneto returned to the Board Chambers at this time and was present for the remainder of items presented.

Sanctuary State Legislation: Discussion relative to the California state legislature’s declaration of California being a “sanctuary state”.

Chairperson Morgan advised she requested this matter be placed on the agenda as she, as well as other Supervisors have received several emails and communication from concerned constituents regarding opposition of the sanctuary state status. She then invited Sheriff Martin Ryan and District Attorney Todd Riebe to speak relative to this issue. Their comments are

summarized below.

Sheriff Martin Ryan addressed the Board and stated under SB 54, California Sheriffs are precluded from relaying information about persons convicted of serious crimes such as domestic violence and repeat drunk driving, unless the offender also had prior convictions for serious or violent felonies defined very narrowly in two state statutes. And if there is an arrest and no conviction law enforcement cannot communicate with Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE). These statutes do not include such crimes as sexual battery, human trafficking, assault on a Peace Officer, solicitation of murder, drive by shootings, and a host of other clearly serious crimes. Such laws result in dangerous criminals, including gang members and drug dealers, being released into communities without notification to our federal authorities who could prevent that from happening. The threat of this violence includes all communities including the immigrant communities who are the usual victims of these criminals who are in our country illegally. Sheriff Ryan stated clearly that his office does not enforce the federal immigration laws that we are legally prohibited from enforcing anyway, and they do not ask persons we stop or arrest about their immigration status. He stated his office does not seek out persons who are in this country illegally in violation of federal law, rather they seek law enforcement out by virtue of being arrested for violations of state criminal law. These are the persons that, as local law enforcement, want out of our communities. When a subject is booked into the jail, a question is asked of everyone on the booking form if they were born outside the U.S. We do not ask their citizenship status and this information is not provided to ICE. We are required to notify certain foreign consulates if someone born in their country is booked into our jail. Sheriff Ryan state his office is only contacted by ICE in response to jail bookings via the LiveScan fingerprinting system that feeds the CA database. The CA system also feeds the federal database (NCIC) that ICE searches looking for their wanted individuals. The Amador County Sheriff's office has not had any ICE holds placed on our inmates since 2014 and therefore none of the inmates have been picked up or transported by ICE since 2014. In 2016, with an Average Daily Jail Population of 90, 3.24% of our inmates were Undocumented and 4.12% were Undocumented Felons as reported to us by the federal government (SCAAP), which provides some re-imbusement for costs of housing these persons. Hi stated his office complies with the Truth and Trust Acts and will comply with this law as well. Limiting the ability to communicate with our immigration authorities, and therefore having criminals released back into our neighborhoods, creates a safety hazard for law enforcement officers. It also creates the same for ICE agents who have been able to take custody of a criminal alien in the safety and security of our jails. Instead, armed ICE agents must now go into immigrant communities in their search for violent individuals. Such actions endanger the law abiding immigrant communities as well since they are often preyed upon by these criminals. He stated as he is sworn to do, he will uphold the laws of this state, however, it is his opinion, that this law creates very real, yet unnecessary, risks of harm for the citizens of Amador County, the immigrant communities, this state, as well as law enforcement personnel.

District Attorney Todd Riebe addressed the Board and touched briefly on the following points:

- **Legal Background:** The US Constitution gives Congress the general power to legislate in Article I. It specifically mentions that this power includes creating laws on naturalization

(Sec. 8, clause 4), thus giving Congress the power to define immigration categories and provide procedures on entry and deportation.

- **The 10th Amendment** says that the federal government cannot "commandeer" state governments. Basically, the federal government can create laws in certain categories, but it cannot force states to help enforce them. This means that states don't have to use state or local resources (money and/or people working in state or local governments) to enforce federal policies. However, state and local governments cannot actively subvert federal immigration enforcement efforts, as that would violate the Supremacy Clause of the US Constitution, which means that when federal law and state law collide, federal law trumps state law.
- **Federal authorities** state that CA's sanctuary state laws violate 8 U.S. Code sec. 1373, which states that "a Federal, State, or local government entity or official may not prohibit, or in any way restrict, any government entity or official from sending to, or receiving from, the immigration and Naturalization Service information regarding the citizenship or immigration status, lawful or unlawful, of any individual."
- **CA authorities** respond that the 10th Amendment prevents the federal government from ordering CA to collect immigration status information in order to share it with the federal government. CA authorities believe that because the data is never collected due to "Don't Ask, Don't Tell" policies, CA is not in violation of federal law.
- **Federal authorities** have sought to punish states and local governments with sanctuary laws that violate U.S.C. Sec. 1373, by withholding federal grant funding pursuant to the Spending Clause of Article I, Sec. 8 of the US Constitution. One such grant program is the Byrne JAG program, which is the primary provider of federal criminal justice funding to state and local governments. Chicago sued and the trial court issued a nationwide injunction preventing Attorney General Jeff Sessions from imposing the policy. Last week, a federal appellate court upheld the injunction, holding that because Congress, which issued the Byrne JAG grant, did not impose any immigration enforcement conditions on the receipt of such funds, the DOJ policy was an unconstitutional violation of the Spending Clause.
- **SB 54:** Prohibits state and local law enforcement agencies from using money or personnel to investigate, interrogate, detain, detect, or arrest persons for immigration enforcement purposes, and limits activities or conduct by law enforcement with immigration enforcement. The way this works is that when an illegal immigrant is about to be released from county jail, law enforcement is prohibited from communicating or cooperating with ICE except in those circumstances explicitly stated in SB 54. The illegal immigrant is released back into the community. In defiance of SB 54, San Diego and Orange counties, representing the 2nd and 3'd most populated counties in CA, have passed resolutions pledging to cooperate with federal authorities. Law enforcement in these counties compile a list of all of the names of county jail inmates to be released and make the list available to the public. Because all names are listed, these counties do not believe that they are violating SB 54. ICE can cross-reference the list with their database to determine which inmates are

known to be here illegally and detain them upon release. There has not been a formal response from the State as of yet.

- **How Does SB 54 Impact Public Safety:** Illegal immigrants that are released from County Jails back into the community and obey the law are not the problem. The problem are those who, once released, break the law again and create new victims that never had to have been victimized in the first place. It is this recidivist population within the illegal immigrant population who pose an unacceptable public safety risk created by SB 54.

Further discussion ensued with the following member of the public wishing to comment:

Ms. Sherry Curtis, District III resident, stated she is speaking on behalf of other citizens who could not attend today's meeting. She wished to urge the Board to draft a resolution in opposition of the sanctuary state designation as she feels it would be a serious public safety issue if the designation is imposed.

Supervisor Forster stated he would like County Counsel to keep tabs on this and give the Board the opportunity to file an amicus brief in support of the Attorney General of the United States if this issue should go to appeal.

Supervisor Oneto stated he would like this matter to come back to the Board for discussion and possible action and consideration of a draft a resolution or strong letter of opposition in this matter.

ACTION: Direction given to bring this matter back to the Board on May 8, 2018 for further discussion and possible action.

General Services Administration: Discussion and possible action relative to the Chew Kee Museum Roof in Fiddletown.

Mr. Jon Hopkins, General Services Director, addressed the Board and provided a quick overview of the Chew Kee Store and how it became County property. He then summarized the staff report relative to this matter which is hereby incorporated into these minutes as though set forth in full. He stated Ms. Alice Kaiser, President of the Fiddletown Preservation Society, (FPS), has requested discussion and possible action regarding the estimated expenditure of approximately \$13k to \$19k for roofing repairs at the Chew Kee Museum. Estimates for the repairs from Western Valley Construction are included in the Board packet.

The following individuals wished to speak relative to this matter:

Lengthy discussion ensued with the following action being taken.

ACTION: Direction given to Mr. Jon Hopkins, General Services Director, to work with the Fiddletown Preservation Society to investigate costs associated with replacing the roof with wood shingles and taking the funds from the unforeseen projects line in the Capital Improvement Budget. In addition, staff will work with FPS to ascertain if they will have the ability to contribute to the cost of the repair and if any grant possibilities will come to fruition.

Elected Officials Salary: Discussion and possible action relative to the salary paid to the elected officials in Amador County.

Mr. Chuck Iley, County Administrative Officer, addressed the Board and stated the six Amador County Elected Officials (Sheriff, District Attorney, Clerk/Recorder, Assessor, Auditor and Treasurer/Tax Collector) have made a request to receive the same pay increases that have been given to the management employees, which is similar to those given to the and file and law enforcement units. He noted, if the Board wishes to adjust the pay of these officials, then that must be accomplished via ordinance. The Board should identify the changes to be made and direct staff to bring back an ordinance at a future meeting. The Elected Officials are requesting the following changes to salaries and benefits to be reflected in Chapter 2.68 (Salaries of Elected Officials), Amador County Code:

1. Effective retroactive to October 1, 2017, a 2% wage increase; and effective October 1, 2018, an additional 1% wage increase.
2. Effective retroactive to October 1, 2017, that longevity be granted to all Elected Officials for 10, 15 and 20 years of total County service, in 2.5% increments, under the same terms and conditions as the County's Management Employees bargaining group.
3. Effective, April 1, 2018, if legally permissible consistent with maintaining the pre-tax status of contributions, or such later date as such pre-tax contributions are first permissible, the County to contribute fifty dollar (\$50.00) per month to the Section 457 deferred compensation account of each Elected Official who contributes at least fifty dollars (\$50.00) to their deferred compensation account for the same month. However, if the Elected Official ceases such contributions, the County match would no longer apply.
4. We further request a salary survey, as well as a review of the salary structures within our respective Offices, to determine if additional salary adjustments are warranted for the Elected Officials. The requested salary survey should utilize those counties that are typically used for other bargaining units.

Discussion ensued with the following action being taken.

ACTION: Direction given pursuant to the following motion.

MOTION: It was moved by Supervisor Axe, seconded by Supervisor Crew and carried to direct staff to prepare an ordinance approving requests 1-3 as outlined above; and prepare a salary survey of comparable positions in surrounding counties and bring back for review and possible action at a future meeting.

WHEREAS, On October 20, 2015, Governor Brown of the State of California, issued an Executive Order related to unprecedented tree mortality due to drought conditions, directed state agencies to begin collaborating and partnering with local government to take action to remove dead and dying trees threatening public safety and infrastructure and approved California Disaster Assistance Act funding to assist in these efforts; and

WHEREAS, California Government Code Section 8630 empowers the Board of Supervisors to proclaim the existence or threatened existence of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property and are or are likely to be beyond the control of the services, personnel, equipment, and facilities of this County; and

WHEREAS, On January 17, 2014, Governor Brown proclaimed a Drought State of Emergency as the State is experiencing the most severe drought in history with four years of below average rain and snow; and

WHEREAS, On December 14, 2015, California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection issued a news release stating “even with recent rains it will likely take years to slow down the massive tree mortality and bark beetle infestation”; and

WHEREAS, The latest aerial survey estimated that over 129 million trees have died across California as a result of the drought and the effects of bark beetle infestation, up from 3.3 million in 2014; and

WHEREAS, Tree mortality from bark beetle infestation and drought has accelerated over the past few years in Amador County; and

WHEREAS, On July 31, 2015, Governor Brown proclaimed a State of emergency due to a series of wildfires statewide citing drought conditions which have increased the State’s risk of wildfires and caused millions of trees to die; and

WHEREAS, Beginning on September 9, 2015 the Butte Fire in Amador and Calaveras County destroyed 921 structures including; 549 homes, 368 outbuildings, and 4 commercial properties, caused power loss to thousands of homes and business, and thousands of families to evacuate their homes, all resulting in part from dead and dying trees caused by drought conditions; and

WHEREAS, Unless the risks posed by dead, dying and diseased trees are immediately abated, there will remain a significantly increased risk to life and property, and interruption of essential services; and

WHEREAS, The magnitude of the Butte Fire tree mortality and the pervasive tree mortality in other parts of the County represents a threat that is beyond the capacity of the County (public and private)

services, personnel, equipment and facilities and requires coordination and assistance from State and Federal agencies.

THEREFORE, BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED that the Amador County Board of Supervisors do hereby find that the aforesaid conditions of extreme peril warrant and necessitate the proclamation of a local emergency in Amador County and imminent threat of disaster as the result of tree mortality.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Amador County Board of Supervisors does hereby establish a tree mortality taskforce and charge it to develop a risk abatement plan, coordinate agency, organization and citizen efforts, seek funding, resolve barriers, and maximize County resources.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the County of Amador requests the State of California include Amador County in the list of Priority Counties within the California Tree Mortality Task Force.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the County of Amador requests the assistance of the State of California in the coordination of resources to assist in the removal of dead and dying trees due to drought and bark beetle infestation.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the County of Amador requests the state of California to waive or expedite regulations, permits and permit fees that may hinder response and recovery efforts, make available assistance under the California Disaster Assistance Act or any other state funding, and to expedite access to federal resources and any other appropriate federal disaster relief programs.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that said local State of Emergency shall be deemed to continue to exist until its termination is proclaimed by the Board of Supervisors of Amador, State of California.



SUBJECT: USDA-APHIS-Wildlife Services for the 2018/19 Fiscal Year

Background: The Wildlife Services Agreement (#18-73-06-0247-RA) with USDA is for services provided to Amador County for the protection of people and their property due to damage from predatory animals in Amador County. It is a five year agreement with the work plan and cost approved annually by the Board of Supervisors.

Subject or Key Issue: USDA-APHIS-Wildlife Cooperative Service Agreement for the 2018/19 Fiscal Year

Alternatives: We could have the work done by county staff, but no department currently possesses the equipment and/or expertise. It could well cost us more, as USDA currently pays a portion of the costs. We could choose to forgo the services offered by the program.

Fiscal or Staffing Impacts: If signed, this agreement would cost the county \$74,592.00 for Fiscal Year 2018/19. This amount is included in the proposed Agriculture Department's budget and includes a 3% increase over last year for the same level of service.

Recommendation(s): It is recommended that the Board of Supervisors authorize the Board Chair to sign the attached Cooperative Service Agreement and associated Financial Plan. It is further recommended that the Board of Supervisors approve the attached Notice of Exemption and authorize the Board Chair to sign it.

WHAT IS THE ECONOMIC BENEFIT OF THE WS PROGRAM?

In 2003 a study was undertaken by the National Wildlife Research Center to estimate the benefits of Wildlife Services activities in California using several different economic methods due to the variety of services provided. 


Results indicated that for every \$1 counties invested in WS they saved up-to \$9 in wildlife damage and replacement costs.



COOPERATIVE SERVICE AGREEMENT (CSA)

Between

AMADOR COUNTY (COOPERATOR)

And

**UNITED STATES DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE (USDA)
ANIMAL AND PLANT HEALTH INSPECTION SERVICE (APHIS)
WILDLIFE SERVICES (WS)**

ARTICLE 1 – PURPOSE

The purpose of this agreement is to maintain an USDA-APHIS-WS Integrated Wildlife Damage Management (IWDM) program in Amador County. USDA-APHIS-WS will assist business/property owners, private citizens, and governmental agencies in protecting human resources, which include, but are not limited to, residents, property, livestock, crops, and natural resources from damage caused by predators, wild and feral animals, and other nuisance wildlife.

ARTICLE 2 – AUTHORITY

USDA-APHIS-WS has statutory authority under the Act of March 2, 1931, as amended (7 USCA 8351), and the Act of December 22, 1987 (7 USCA 8353), the Secretary of Agriculture may conduct a program of wildlife services with respect to injurious animal species and take any action the Secretary considers necessary in conducting the program. Additionally, the Secretary of Agriculture, except for management of urban rodents, is authorized to conduct activities to manage nuisance mammals and birds and those mammal and bird species that are reservoirs for zoonotic diseases. In carrying out a program of wildlife services involving injurious and/or nuisance animal species or involving mammal and bird species that are reservoirs for zoonotic diseases, the Secretary is authorized to cooperate with States, local jurisdictions, individuals, public and private agencies, organizations, and institutions.

ARTICLE 3 - MUTUAL RESPONSIBILITIES

The cooperating parties mutually understand and agree to/that:

- a. This Cooperative Service Agreement constitutes an IWDM program that addresses the need for managing conflicts caused by predators and other nuisance wildlife in Amador County.
- b. USDA-APHIS-WS will provide to the Cooperator a Financial Plan annually for approval. It is understood and agreed that any monies allocated for the purpose of this Agreement shall be expended only towards the activities and related expenses outlined herein.
- c. Cooperate with the California Department of Fish and Wildlife, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, County, city governments, and other entities to ensure compliance with applicable Federal, State, and local laws and regulations.
- d. When either of the Cooperating parties address the media or incorporate information into reports and/or publications, both Cooperating parties must agree, in writing, to have their

identities disclosed when receiving due credit related to the activities covered by this agreement.

- e. Protect sensitive information exchanged or generated during this process. For public requests of such information, under the Freedom of Information Act (5 U.S.C. §552) and/or the California Public Records Act (California Government Code §6250-6276.48) or Information Privacy Act of 1977 (Cal. Civ. Code §§ 1798 et seq.), the releasing Agency will notify the other Agency and provide an opportunity to comment on whether the information is privileged, or otherwise prohibited from disclosure by applicable law.
- f. USDA-APHIS-WS has advised the Cooperator that other private sector service providers may be available to provide wildlife management services and notwithstanding these other options, Cooperator requests that USDA-APHIS-WS provide wildlife management services as stated under the terms of this Agreement.
- g. All equipment with a purchase price of \$5,000 or more per unit, purchased directly with funds from the cooperator for use solely on this project shall be subject to disposal according to USDA-APHIS policy, and shall be specifically listed in the Financial Plan. Property title/disposal shall be determined when the project (including all continuations and revisions of this agreement) terminates, or when the equipment is otherwise directed to other projects, whichever comes first. If the equipment is sold prior to the project end, the proceeds should be allocated according to USDA-APHIS Policy. Continuations and revisions to this agreement shall list any equipment with a purchase price of \$5,000 or more per unit, carried over from a purchase directly with funds from the cooperator for use solely for this project. All other equipment purchased for the program is and remain the property of USDA-APHIS-WS.
- h. USDA-APHIS-WS will provide overall direction and control of the program.

ARTICLE 4 - COOPERATOR RESPONSIBILITIES

The Cooperator agrees to:

- a. Designate Eric Mayberry, Agricultural Commissioner, 12200-B Airport Road, Jackson, CA 95642-9527, (209) 223-6487 as the authorized representative who shall be responsible for collaboratively administering the activities conducted in this Agreement;
- b. Reimburse USDA-APHIS-WS for costs, not to exceed the annually approved amount specified in the Financial Plan. If costs are projected to exceed the amount reflected in the Financial Plan, the Financial Plan shall be formally revised and signed by both parties before services resulting in additional costs are performed. The Cooperator agrees to pay all costs of service submitted via an invoice within 30 days of the date of the submitted invoice or invoices as submitted by USDA-APHIS-WS. Late payments are subject to interest, penalties, and administrative charges and costs as set forth under the Debt Collection Improvement Act of 1996. If the Cooperator is delinquent in paying the full amount of the due service costs submitted by USDA-APHIS-WS, and/or is delinquent in paying the due late payments, and/or is delinquent in paying the interest, penalties, and/or administrative costs on any delinquent due service costs, USDA-APHIS-WS will immediately cease to provide the respective service associated with the submitted service costs. USDA-APHIS-WS will not reinstate or provide the respective service until all due service costs, and/or due late payments, and/or due interest,

penalty, and/or administrative costs are first paid in full.

- c. To provide a Tax Identification Number or Social Security Number in compliance with the Debt Collection Improvement Act of 1996.
- d. As a condition of this Agreement, the Cooperator ensures and certifies that it is not currently debarred or suspended and is free of delinquent Federal debt.

ARTICLE 5 – USDA-APHIS-WS RESPONSIBILITIES

USDA-APHIS-WS agrees to:

- a. Designate Dennis Orthmeyer, California State Director, 3419A Arden Way, Sacramento, California 95825, (916) 979-2675 as the authorized representative who shall be responsible for collaboratively administering the activities conducted in this Agreement.
- b. The performance of IWDM actions by USDA-APHIS-WS under this agreement is contingent upon a determination by USDA-APHIS-WS that such actions are in compliance with the National Environmental Policy Act, Endangered Species Act, and any other applicable environmental statutes. USDA-APHIS-WS will not make a final decision to conduct requested IWDM actions until it has made the determination of such compliance.
- c. To provide qualified personnel and other resources necessary to implement the approved IWDM activities delineated in this agreement and the Financial Plan referenced in Article 3.b. of this Agreement.
 - 1. Conduct all control activities with trained USDA-APHIS-WS employees and volunteers.
 - 2. Provide technical assistance which includes demonstrations on the proper use of management devices (i.e., propane exploders, exclusionary devices, cage traps, etc.) and information on animal husbandry, habitat management, and animal behavior modification that could reduce damage. Official USDA pamphlets may be used to convey this information to the public.
 - 3. Provide predator/nuisance wildlife identification and removal when livestock, crop property, natural resource damage; or wildlife displaying aggressive behavior causing actual injury to county residents is verified.
 - 4. Provide field assistance when the problem cannot effectively be resolved through technical assistance, when resource owner implemented nonlethal actions have failed, or concurrently when technical assistance is delivered. Field assistance would mostly be provided for situations that require the use of methods and techniques that are challenging or unsuitable for the public to implement on their own. Resource owners that are provided operational assistance are also encouraged to use additional management strategies and sound husbandry practices, when and where appropriate, that could potentially further reduce damage. Field activities may include but are not limited to the monitoring, trapping, dispersal, and removal of wildlife causing damage to property, livestock, crops, and natural resources.

5. Procure and maintain a vehicle, tools, supplies, and other specialized equipment as deemed necessary by the State Director to accomplish the objectives identified in this agreement. All expenditures will be processed through USDA-APHIS Financial Management Modernization Initiative (FMMI) system.
- d. To bill the Cooperator for costs incurred in performing IWDM activities as authorized in the approved Financial Plan as may be amended.
- e. To notify the Cooperator if costs are projected to exceed the amounts estimated and agreed upon in the Financial Plan. USDA-APHIS-WS will cease providing goods or services until a revision to Financial Plan, as appropriate, have been agreed to and signed by both parties to this Agreement.
- f. Authorized auditing representatives of the Cooperator shall be accorded reasonable opportunity to inspect the accounts and records of USDA-APHIS-WS pertaining to such claims for reimbursement to the extent permitted by Federal law and regulations.

ARTICLE 6 – CONTINGENCY STATEMENT

For costs borne by USDA-APHIS-WS, this agreement is contingent upon the passage of the Agriculture, Rural Development, and Related Agencies Appropriation Act for the current fiscal year from which expenditures may be legally met and shall not obligate USDA-APHIS-WS upon failure of Congress to so appropriate. This Agreement also may be reduced or terminated if Congress provides USDA-APHIS-WS funds only for a finite period under a Continuing Resolution.

ARTICLE 7 – NON-EXCLUSIVE SERVICE CLAUSE

Nothing in this agreement shall prevent any other country, State government or its political subdivisions, local government, university, or college, organization, association, or individual from entering into separate agreements with USDA-APHIS-WS for same or similar activities provided under the terms of this Agreement.

ARTICLE 8 – CONGRESSIONAL RESTRICTIONS

Pursuant to Section 22, Title 41, United States Code, no member of or delegate to Congress shall be admitted to any share or part of this agreement or to any benefit to arise therefrom.

ARTICLE 9 – APPLICABLE REGULATIONS

All IWDM activities will be conducted in accordance with applicable Federal, State, and local laws and regulations. USDA-APHIS-WS activities under this cooperative effort will be limited to the State of California, County of Amador. Techniques will be environmentally sound, safe, and selective. If applicable, both Federal and State permits will be secured to perform IDWM activities, and those activities will be conducted within the policy guidelines of USDA-APHIS-WS.

This agreement is not a procurement contract (31 U.S.C. 6303), nor is it considered a grant (31 U.S.C. 6304). In this agreement, USDA-APHIS-WS provides goods or services on a cost recovery basis to nonfederal recipients.

ARTICLE 10 – LIABILITY

USDA-APHIS-WS assumes no liability for any actions or activities conducted under this agreement except to the extent the recourse or remedies are provided by Congress under the Federal Tort Claims Act (28 USC 1346(b), 2401(b), 2671-2680).

ARTICLE 11 – NON-DISCRIMINATION CLAUSE

The United States Department of Agriculture prohibits discrimination in all its programs and activities on the basis of race, color, national origin, age, disability, and where applicable, sex, marital status, familial status, parental status, religion, sexual orientation, genetic information, political beliefs, reprisal, or because all or part of an individual’s income is derived from any public assistance program. Not all prohibited bases apply to all programs.

ARTICLE 12 – FAILURE TO PAY FEES

The cooperator is liable for fees assessed for services performed under this agreement, if applicable. USDA-APHIS-WS will assess a late payment penalty for failure to pay fees when due. In addition, the overdue fees shall accrue interest as required by 31 U.S.C. 3717.

ARTICLE 13 – AGREEMENT EFFECTIVE DATE

This Agreement shall become effective on July 1, 2018 and shall continue through June 30, 2022. This agreement may be amended at any time by mutual agreement of the parties in writing. It may be terminated by either party upon 90 days written notice to the other party. Further, in the event the Cooperator does not for any reason reimburse expended funds, USDA-APHIS-WS is relieved of the obligation to continue any operations under this agreement.

PROFESSIONAL SERVICES AGREEMENT

THIS SERVICES AGREEMENT (this "Agreement") is entered into as of 04/26, 2018 by and between the COUNTY OF AMADOR, a political subdivision of the State of California (the "County") and Luhdorff and Scalmanini Consulting Engineers, Inc., a California Corporation (the "Consultant").

RECITALS

- A. County desires to engage professional assistance to provide the hereinafter set forth special services.
- B. Consultant is in the business of providing services similar to those set forth in this Agreement.
- C. County desires to engage Consultant, and Consultant desires to be hired by County, to perform the work described below, upon the terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement.

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the performance of the covenants herein contained, the parties agree as follows:

1. SERVICES TO BE RENDERED BY CONSULTANT.

- 1.1 Upon request from County, Consultant will provide all equipment, supplies and personnel to perform professional engineering and consulting services for Amador County Environmental Health Department (the "Work"). The Work is more particularly described on **Attachment A** attached and incorporated by this reference. Consultant shall comply with all applicable Federal, State and local laws relating to Consultant's performance of this Agreement.
- 1.2 Consultant shall perform the Work in a manner consistent with the level of competency and standard of care normally observed by a person practicing in Consultant's profession. If County determines that any of the Work is not performed in accordance with such level of competency and standard of care, County, in its sole discretion, shall have the right to do any or all of the following: (a) require Consultant to meet with County to review the quality of the Work and resolve matters of concern; (b) require Consultant to repeat any substandard Work at no additional charge until it is satisfactory; (c) terminate this Agreement pursuant to section 4 below; or (d) pursue any and all other remedies at law or in equity.
- 1.3 Consultant is authorized to proceed immediately following full execution of this Agreement and delivery and approval of required insurance documents as required by Section 11. Performance of the Work shall be completed within the time required herein or prescribed for an individual task by County; provided, however, that if performance is delayed by earthquake, flood, high water or other act of God, or by strike, lockout, or similar labor disturbances, the time for Consultant's performance of this Agreement shall be extended by the number of days equal to the number of

days of delay.

- 1.4 Consultant shall complete each project assigned by County in accordance with an agreed-upon schedule.
2. SERVICES TO BE RENDERED BY COUNTY. County agrees to make available to Consultant all existing documents and information applicable to any assigned project constituting the Work.
3. CHANGES IN SCOPE OF SERVICES. Only the Amador County Board of Supervisors has the authority to agree to any extension of time, change order, change in the scope of work, change in the contract price, or other term or condition affecting either Consultant's or County's duties set forth herein. Adjustments in compensation, if any, shall be determined through negotiation between the parties to the Agreement and are subject to approval by the Board of Supervisors. Consultant acknowledges that no County staff person or County officer other than the Board of Supervisors has the power to amend the terms and conditions of this Agreement. Any change not so authorized in advance in writing by the Board of Supervisors shall be null and void.
4. TERM; TERMINATION OF AGREEMENT. This Agreement shall commence on the date of execution by County and shall terminate upon the successful completion of the Work, unless extended in writing by mutual agreement of the parties. County reserves the right to terminate this Agreement with or without cause on 30 days written notice to Consultant. In the case of such early termination, Consultant shall be paid for all services satisfactorily rendered up to the effective date of termination, up to the maximum fee prescribed for any task.

The County may immediately terminate this Agreement upon written notice to Consultant in the event Consultant, or any or its employees or subconsultants, fails to provide, in any manner, the services required under this Agreement or otherwise fails to comply with the terms of this Agreement.

5. COMPENSATION TO CONSULTANT.
 - 5.1 Consultant shall submit monthly invoices in arrears indicating for each item of the Work performed, hours of work expended (in quarter-hour increments), hourly rate or rates of persons performing the task, and copies of receipts for reimbursable materials or expenses. Compensation to Consultant shall be paid on a time-and-materials basis, with a cost-not-to-exceed limit of Forty-Four Thousand Seven Hundred Sixty Dollars and No Cents (\$44,760), in accordance with the fee schedule and list of reimbursable expenses set forth on **Attachment B** attached and incorporated by this reference.
 - 5.2 County shall make payment to Consultant within 30 days of the invoice for payment, based upon the services described on the invoice and in an amount properly allowed by the County.

- 5.3 Consultant shall provide a completed W-9 to the Auditor's Office. No payments shall be issued prior to submission of this form.
- 5.4 In the event Consultant claims or received payment from County for a service for which reimbursement is later disallowed by County, state or federal agencies, Consultant shall promptly refund the disallowed amount to County upon request or, at County's option, County may offset the amount disallowed from any payment that is due or becomes due to Consultant under this Agreement or any other agreement.

6. SUPERVISION OF THE WORK.

- 6.1 Consultant shall supervise and direct the Work, using Consultant's best skill and attention. Consultant shall be solely responsible for all methods, techniques, sequences and procedures, and shall coordinate all portions of the Work. County will deal only through Consultant, who shall be responsible for the proper execution of the entire Work.
- 6.2 Consultant shall assign only competent personnel to perform any portion of the Work. If at any time County, in its sole discretion, desires the removal of any person or persons assigned by Consultant to perform the Work, Consultant shall remove such person or persons immediately upon receiving written notice from County. If any person is identified in this Agreement (or any attachment hereto), Consultant shall not remove, replace, substitute, or otherwise change any key personnel without the prior written consent of County.
- 6.3 Consultant shall be responsible to County for the acts and omissions of Consultant's employees, subconsultants, and their agents and employees, and any other persons performing any of the Work under a contract with Consultant.
- 6.4 A subconsultant ("Subconsultant") is a person or organization that has a direct contract with Consultant to perform any of the Work. Consultant shall not subcontract any portion of the Work unless pre-approved in writing by County. Consultant agrees that it is as fully responsible to County for the acts and omissions of Subconsultants and of persons either directly or indirectly employed by Consultant as it is for the acts and omissions of persons directly employed by it. Nothing contained in this Agreement or any other document associated with the performance of the work shall create any contractual relation between any Subconsultant and County.
- 6.5 Consultant agrees to bind every Subconsultant and every Subconsultant agrees to be bound by the terms of this Agreement as to that portion of the Work performed by Subconsultant, unless specifically noted to the contrary in a subcontract approved in writing by County. Subconsultant agrees to be bound to the Consultant by the terms of this Agreement and to assume toward Consultant all of the obligations and responsibilities that the Consultant assumes toward County. Consultant agrees to be bound to the Subconsultant by all of the obligations that County assumes to Consultant under this Agreement as to the portion of the Work performed by

Subconsultant.

7. CONFERENCES, VISITS TO SITE, INSPECTION OF WORK. In the event it should become necessary for the State or County to hold any conference or visit the site of a project, as a part of any such conference, Consultant shall cooperate fully with the parties involved and shall arrange for qualified representatives of Consultant, upon request of County, to attend any such conference or visit to the site as a part thereof.
8. ASSIGNMENTS. Neither party may assign, sublet, or transfer its interest in this Agreement without the written consent of the other.
9. CONSULTANT NOT EMPLOYEE OF COUNTY. It is understood that Consultant is not acting hereunder as an employee of County, but solely as an independent consultant. Consultant, by virtue of this Agreement, has no authority to bind or incur any obligation on behalf of County. Except as expressly provided in this Agreement, Consultant has no authority or responsibility to exercise any rights or power vested in County. It is understood by both Consultant and County that this Agreement shall not under any circumstances be construed or considered to create an employer-employee relationship or a joint venture.
10. LICENSES, PERMITS, ETC. Consultant represents and warrants to County that it or its principals have all licenses, permits, qualifications, and approvals of whatsoever nature that are legally required for Consultant to practice its profession and to perform the Work. Consultant represents and warrants to County that Consultant shall, at its sole cost and expense, keep in effect at all times during the term of this Agreement any license, permits, and approvals that are legally required for Consultant or its principals to practice its profession and perform the Work. Consultant further represents and warrants to County that any Subconsultant engaged by Consultant to perform a portion of the Work shall similarly possess all licenses, permits, qualifications, and approvals of whatsoever nature that are legally required for the Subconsultant to perform the portion of the Work that is the subject of the subcontract at issue.
11. INSURANCE. Consultant shall procure and maintain for the duration of the contract insurance against claims for injuries to persons or damages to property which may arise from or in connection with the performance of the work hereunder by the Consultant, its agents, representatives, or employees. Within **five (5)** business days of award of the Bid to Consultant, Consultant shall furnish to County satisfactory proof that Consultant has the following insurance:
 - 11.1 Minimum Scope and Limit of Insurance: Coverage shall be at least as broad as:
 - 11.1.1 Commercial General Liability (CGL): Insurance Services Office Form CG 00 01 covering CGL on an "occurrence" basis, including products and completed operations, property damage, bodily injury and personal & advertising injury with limits no less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence. If a general aggregate limit applies, either the general aggregate limit shall apply separately to this project/location (ISO CG 25 03 or 25 04) or the general aggregate limit shall be twice the required occurrence limit.

11.1.2 Automobile Liability: Insurance Services Office Form Number CA 0001 covering, Code 1 (any auto), or if Consultant has no owned autos, Code 8 (hired) and 9 (non-owned), with limit no less than \$1,000,000 per accident for bodily injury and property damage.

11.1.3 Workers' Compensation insurance as required by the State of California, with Statutory Limits, and Employer's Liability Insurance with limit of no less than \$1,000,000 per accident for bodily injury or disease.

(If Consultant has no employees a Certificate of Exemption from Worker's Compensation Laws must be completed using the County's form and submitted with all other insurance documents).

11.1.4 Professional Liability (Errors and Omissions) Insurance appropriate to the Consultant's profession, with limit no less than \$2,000,000 per occurrence or claim, \$2,000,000 aggregate.

Broader Coverage/Higher Limits: If the Consultant maintains broader coverage and/or higher limits than the minimums shown above, the County requires and shall be entitled to the broader coverage and/or higher limits maintained by the Consultant. Any available insurance proceeds in excess of the specified minimum limits of insurance and coverage shall be available to the County.

11.2 The insurance policies are to contain, or be endorsed to contain, the following provisions:

11.2.1 Additional Insured Status: The County, its officers, officials, employees, and volunteers are to be covered as additional insureds on the CGL policy with respect to liability arising out of work or operations performed by or on behalf of the Consultant including materials, parts, or equipment furnished in connection with such work or operations. General liability coverage can be provided in the form of an endorsement to the Consultant's insurance (at least as broad as ISO Form CG 20 10 11 85 or both CG 20 10, CG 20 26, CG 20 33, or CG 20 38; and CG 20 37 forms if later revisions used).

11.2.2 Primary Coverage: For any claims related to this contract, the Consultant's insurance coverage shall be primary insurance primary coverage at least as broad as ISO CG 20 01 04 13 as respects the County, its officers, officials, employees, and volunteers. Any insurance or self-insurance maintained by the County, its officers, officials, employees, or volunteers shall be excess of the Consultant's insurance and shall not contribute with it.

11.2.3 Notice of Cancellation: Each insurance policy required above shall state that coverage shall not be canceled, except with notice to the County.

- 11.2.4 Waiver of Subrogation: Consultant hereby grants to County a waiver of any right to subrogation which any insurer of said Consultant may acquire against the County by virtue of the payment of any loss under such insurance. Consultant agrees to obtain any endorsement that may be necessary to affect this waiver of subrogation, but this provision applies regardless of whether or not the County has received a waiver of subrogation endorsement from the insurer.
- 11.3 Self-Insured Retentions: Self-insured retentions must be declared to and approved by the County. The County may require the Consultant to provide proof of ability to pay losses and related investigations, claim administration, and defense expenses within the retention. The policy language shall provide, or be endorsed to provide, that the self-insured retention may be satisfied by either the named insured or County.
- 11.4 Acceptability of Insurers: Insurance is to be placed with insurers authorized to conduct business in the state with a current A.M. Best's rating of no less than A:VII, unless otherwise acceptable to the County.
- 11.5 Claims Made Policies: If any of the required policies provide coverage on a claims-made basis:
- 11.5.1 The Retroactive Date must be shown and must be before the date of the contract or the beginning of contract work.
- 11.5.2 Insurance must be maintained and evidence of insurance must be provided for at least five (5) years after completion of the contract of work.
- 11.5.3 If coverage is canceled or non-renewed, and not replaced with another claims-made policy form with a Retroactive Date prior to the contract effective date, the Consultant must purchase "extended reporting" coverage for a minimum of five (5) years after completion of contract work.
- 11.6 Verification of Coverage: Consultant shall furnish the County with Certificates of Insurance including all required amendatory endorsements (or copies of the applicable policy language effecting coverage required by this clause) and a copy of the Declarations and Endorsement Page of the CGL policy listing all policy endorsements to County before work begins. However, failure to obtain the required documents prior to the work beginning shall not waive the Consultant's obligation to provide them. The County reserves the right to require complete, certified copies of all required insurance policies, including endorsements required by these specifications, at any time. **Certificates and endorsements shall refer to the Project or Work. Certificates of Insurance shall list the Certificate Holder as: County of Amador, Attn: (Department, Title, and Address of Contract Administrator). Consultant shall provide all insurance documentation to the Contract Administrator.**

- 11.7 Subcontractors: Consultant shall require and verify that all subcontractors maintain insurance meeting all the requirements stated herein, and Consultant shall ensure that County is an additional insured on insurance required from subcontractors.
- 11.8 Special Risks or Circumstances: County reserves the right to modify these requirements, including limits, based on the nature of the risk, prior experience, insurer, coverage, or other special circumstances.
12. OWNERSHIP OF DOCUMENTS. Upon completion or termination of this Agreement, County shall be entitled to ownership and immediate possession of, and Consultant shall furnish, on request, all computations, plans, correspondence, manuals, warranties, and other pertinent data gathered or computed by Consultant for the Work prior to termination. Consultant may retain copies of such original documents for Consultant's files.
13. INDEMNIFICATION. Consultant agrees to indemnify, defend (upon request of County) and hold harmless County and County's agents, board members, elected and appointed officials and officers, employees, volunteers and authorized representatives from any and all losses, liabilities, charges, damages, claims, liens, causes of action, awards, judgments, costs, and expenses (including, but not limited to, reasonable attorney's fees of County Counsel and counsel retained by County, expert fees, costs and staff time, and investigation costs) of whatever kind or nature (collectively "Claims"), that arise out of or are in any way connected with any negligent error, act or omission of Consultant or Consultant's officers, agents, employees, independent consultants, subconsultants, or authorized representatives, unless resulting from the sole negligence, active negligence, or willful misconduct of an indemnified party. Without limiting the generality of the foregoing, the same shall include injury or death to any person or persons; damage to any property, regardless of where located, including the property of County; and any workers' compensation claim or suit arising from or connected with any services performed pursuant to this Agreement on behalf of Consultant by any person or entity. Consultant's indemnity obligations shall not be limited by the amount of insurance provided.
14. PUBLIC RECORDS ACT DISCLOSURE. Consultant has been advised and is aware that all reports, documents, information and data including, but not limited to, computer tapes, discs or files furnished or prepared by Consultant, or any of its subconsultants, and provided to County may be subject to public disclosure as required by the California Public Records Act (California Government Code Section 6250 et seq.). Exceptions to public disclosure may be those documents or other information that qualify as trade secrets, as that term is defined in the California Government Code Section 6254.7, and of which Consultant informs County of such trade secret. The County will endeavor to maintain as confidential all information obtained by it that is designated as a trade secret. The County shall not, in any way, be liable or responsible for the disclosure of any trade secret including, without limitation, those records so marked if disclosure is deemed by County to be required by law or by court order.
15. RESPONSIBILITY FOR ERRORS. Consultant shall be responsible for its work and results

The address to which notice shall or may be mailed, as aforesaid, to either party shall or may be changed by written notice given by such party or the other, as hereinbefore provided, but nothing herein contained shall preclude the giving of any such notice by personal service.

20. CONTRACT EXECUTION. Each individual executing this Agreement on behalf of Consultant represents that he or she is fully authorized to execute and deliver this Agreement.
21. CONSTRUED PURSUANT TO CALIFORNIA LAW; VENUE. The parties hereto agree that the provisions of this Agreement will be construed pursuant to the laws of the State of California. Venue for all litigation relative to the formation, interpretation, and performance of this Agreement shall be in Amador County, California.
22. INCORPORATION OF AGREEMENTS AND AMENDMENTS. This Agreement contains all agreements of the parties with respect to any matter mentioned herein. No other Agreement or understanding pertaining to any such matter shall be effective, unless in writing signed by the party to be charged. This Agreement may be modified by the parties hereto only in writing and signed by both parties.
23. SEVERABILITY. The invalidity of any provision of this Agreement, as determined by a court of competent jurisdiction, shall in no way affect the validity of any other provision hereof.
24. TIME OF ESSENCE. Time is hereby expressly declared to be the essence of this Agreement and of each and every provision thereof, and each such provision is hereby made and declared to be a material, necessary, and essential part of this Agreement.
25. RETENTION OF RECORDS. Pursuant to Government Code section 8546.7, the performance of any work under this Agreement is subject to the examination and audit of the State Auditor at the request of County or as part of any audit of County for a period of three years after final payment under the Agreement. Each party hereto shall retain all records relating to the performance of the Work and the administration of the Agreement for three years after final payment hereunder.

Dear Mr. Israel:

Per your recent request, Luhdorff and Scalmanini Consulting Engineers (LSCE) have prepared this proposal to continue providing Amador County with professional services related to the evaluation of potential groundwater impacts due to activities at the Buena Vista Rancheria of Me-Wuk Indians (the Tribe). The scope of work described herein is a continuation of an effort that began in late 2008 under LSCE Project No. 08-1-086. That proposal contained several provisions for the rendering of services limited in duration to one year (e.g., associated with the participation in the Monitoring Group including review and comment on certain documents). However, there was a substantial delay of the construction activities and we understand that construction of the Rancheria has only recently begun in March 2018. The start of construction triggers a schedule of less than one year for the Tribe's consultant for the completion of certain work items and deliverables such as increased groundwater monitoring activities and the development of a groundwater flow model and water budget. The proposed scope of work is comprised of the following tasks.

Task 1 – Monitoring Group Participation

Under this task, LSCE will continue to represent the County on the Monitoring Group. In this capacity, LSCE will critically review groundwater monitoring activities and associated reports that are prepared by the tribe's consultant for consistency with agreed upon terms, technical quality, completeness, and schedule. This includes, as appropriate, communications and correspondence between LSCE and the County, and the Tribe's consultant. This task does not provide for LSCE staff to attend in-person meetings that involve travel.

Task 2 – Critical Review of Groundwater Model and Water Budget

The tribe's consultant provided preliminary details on groundwater model development via web conference in June 2011 and there is already Monitoring Group consensus on some key items pertaining to the model. The Tribe's consultant is expected to provide a draft of the fully developed and calibrated groundwater model and water budget and associated documentation within six months of the start of Rancheria construction in late March 2018. Therefore, the draft report is expected to be available for review in September 2018.

This task provides for critical review and comment on the groundwater flow model and water budget results. The objectives of the model are to predict drawdowns that will be caused by proposed pumping to supply the Project and to calculate a water budget with and without the Project. Included in LSCE's review will be the model platform selected by the Tribe's consultant, the area to be modeled, model layering, boundary and initial conditions, aquifer properties, simulation of streams, and recharge and pumping estimates. Pertaining to model calibration, LSCE's review will include the number, locations, and depths of proposed calibration wells, the calibration period, accuracy of the calibration and its sufficiency to estimate the "long-term safe yield" as required in ISA Exhibit D.

The water level and water budget impacts of Project pumping will be determined by comparing the results of one or more Project pumping scenarios with those of the baseline scenario. Before the baseline and Project scenarios are developed, we will ensure that the simulation period is long enough and includes an adequate number of wet, normal, and dry periods. This will be important so that long-term Project impacts and impacts in different year types (especially single-dry and multiple-dry years) can be determined. In order to not skew the results, we will request that the Tribe's consultant prepare a plot of cumulative departure from mean annual precipitation to ensure that precipitation is approximately average over the simulation period.

Specific model output required to evaluate the model results will be requested before simulations are conducted. The output needs to include simulated groundwater level hydrographs at selected wells and groundwater elevation contour maps at specific periods. We will specify inflow and outflow components to be included in the water budget tables. At a minimum, inflow components need to include subsurface inflow, deep percolation, recharge from streams, and recharge from reservoirs. Outflow components need to include subsurface outflow, discharge to streams, discharge to reservoirs, and groundwater pumping. The water budget also needs to include the change in groundwater storage. The water budget output should show the average annual water budget for each year of the simulation and the overall average for the simulation period. Water budgets should be provided for at least three simulations (the calibration period and the baseline and Project scenarios). The difference between the baseline and Project scenarios will represent the water budget impacts of the proposed Project.

Task 3 – Project Management and Communication

This task provides for program management and administrative activities such as: (i) ongoing examination regarding adherence to the scope, budget, and schedule, (ii) coordination of staff resources, (iii) internal review of work products, (iv) billing review, and (v) general communication and correspondence on behalf of the County. This task does not provide for LSCE staff to attend in-person meetings that involve travel.

Task 4 – In-person Meeting (as needed)

In case that an in-person meeting in Jackson or vicinity becomes necessary, this task provides for the participation of two LSCE staff persons at a meeting, including preparation, travel, and participation.


Cost Estimate and Schedule

3. If any of such officers, employees, subconsultants, and agent violates the Amador County Alcohol-Free and Drug-Free Workplace and Drug and Alcohol Testing Policy, the County of Amador may terminate the Agreement immediately.

MEDI-CAL COUNTY INMATE PROGRAM AGREEMENT

Article 1 – Parties

- A. The parties to this Agreement (Agreement) are *County of Amador* (the County) and the California Department of Health Care Services (DHCS).
- B. The County may voluntarily choose to participate in the Medi-Cal County Inmate Program (MCIP) by entering into this Agreement as authorized by Welfare and Institutions Code sections 14053.7 and 14053.8, and Government Code sections 26605.6, 26605.7, and 26605.8.
- C. DHCS is the single state agency responsible for administering the California Medical Assistance Program (Medi-Cal), including MCIP, pursuant to California Welfare and Institutions Code section 14100.1.

Article 2 – Purpose of the Agreement

- A. The purpose of this Agreement is to set forth the terms a County must abide by in order to participate in MCIP. If a County does not participate in MCIP or does not abide by the terms of this Agreement, the County remains responsible for arranging for and paying for medical care for its inmates. MCIP creates budgetary savings for the County for the medical care provided to its Medi-Cal eligible inmates. MCIP makes federal financial participation (FFP) available for medical care provided to Medi-Cal eligible county inmates. The County receives budgetary savings because it does not fund the federal share of MCIP services for their Medi-Cal eligible inmates. MCIP services are provided by Medi-Cal providers to Medi-Cal eligible inmates, for which FFP may be claimed consistent with federal law, including but not limited to subparagraph (A) following paragraph (29) of Section 1905(a) of the Social Security Act.
 - 1) MCIP allows the Medi-Cal providers to directly bill DHCS for MCIP services and DHCS will reimburse the Medi-Cal providers at their applicable Medi-Cal rate for the services rendered, to the extent FFP is available. DHCS will seek and retain FFP claimed for MCIP services and the County will reimburse DHCS any remaining balance for the claims paid by DHCS to the Medi-Cal provider for MCIP services, except for the MCIP services provided by public providers under the certified public expenditure (CPE) process.
 - 2) When the Medi-Cal provider is a Designated Public Hospital (DPH) or other public provider that incurs the cost of the nonfederal share pursuant to the CPE process, the Medi-Cal provider shall receive the FFP resulting from expenditures for the MCIP services. Notwithstanding the sentence above, DPHs may claim under Subparagraph 1 for MCIP services that are not claimed through the CPE process established in the Demonstration Project.

B. The County shall reimburse DHCS its apportioned share of the nonfederal share of the administrative costs incurred for the administration of MCIP based on Addendum A.

Article 3 – Term of the Agreement

Subject to the provisions of this Agreement, the term of this Agreement shall be one year from July 1, 2018, through June 30, 2019.

Article 4 – Maximum Payable Amount

A. The amount under this Agreement that the County shall be obligated to reimburse DHCS for MCIP services paid by DHCS to Medi-Cal providers shall not exceed the nonfederal share of the Medi-Cal payments for MCIP services for the County’s inmates incurred by DHCS. The maximum payable amount shall not exceed: \$25,000.00. This amount is subject to the annual limitations listed below:

Year	MCIP Services Total Nonfederal Share
SFY 2018-19	\$25,000.00

B. The amount that the County shall be obligated to pay DHCS for MCIP administrative services rendered under this Agreement shall not exceed its apportioned share of the nonfederal share of the federally claimable costs of administering MCIP incurred by DHCS. The maximum payable amount shall not exceed the County’s apportioned share, which shall be based on a methodology specified in *Addendum A*, which is: \$179.58. This amount is subject to the annual limitations listed below:

Year	MCIP Administrative Services Total Nonfederal Share for the County
SFY 2018-19	\$179.58

C. The maximum payable amount under this Agreement shall not exceed \$25,179.58.

D. For future SFY periods not covered under this Agreement, the maximum payable amount will be determined through a new Agreement or an amendment to this Agreement.

Article 6 – Payment Terms and Invoicing

A. General Terms

- 1) The County shall compensate DHCS for the County's apportioned share of the nonfederal share of MCIP administrative services, and for the nonfederal share of MCIP services listed in Article 7, as required by Welfare and Institutions Code sections 14053.7 and 14053.8, and Government Code sections 26605.6, 26605.7, and 26605.8, within sixty (60) days of receipt of an invoice from DHCS, which specifies both the total federally claimable cost, and the nonfederal share of the total cost, for payments DHCS has made to providers, except that the County shall not reimburse the state for the nonfederal share of services billed by Medi-Cal providers under a CPE process, as described in Articles 8 and 11, below. MCIP administrative services and MCIP services shall be separately invoiced by DHCS to the County. Addendum A attached to this

Agreement includes details regarding the nonfederal share of administrative costs. If the County is found to have overpaid DHCS comparing its owed nonfederal share to payments actually made, DHCS shall refund the overpayment to the County within forty-five (45) days of an invoice from the County, containing the same information. This refund may be made by offsetting the amount against the County's next quarterly payment due to DHCS.

- 2) Failure by the County to timely compensate DHCS pursuant to Paragraphs B and C shall constitute a material breach of this Agreement by the County, which, at DHCS' discretion, may result in termination by DHCS pursuant to Article 10. The County may cure such breach by rendering payment of the amount owed to DHCS prior to the termination of this Agreement.
- 3) In no event shall payment be made by the County for any invoice or portion thereof exceeding the respective maximum annual Agreement amount specified in Article 4. Payment for any MCIP administrative services rendered by DHCS or MCIP services paid by DHCS exceeding the respective maximum annual Agreement amount shall require an amendment to this Agreement pursuant to Article 9. If the County fails to execute a retroactive amendment to the maximum payable amount under this Agreement, DHCS shall terminate the Agreement pursuant to Article 10.

B. MCIP Services

- 1) DHCS shall submit to the County a quarterly invoice for MCIP services that identifies the nonfederal share amount, and a report that contains information regarding paid claims data for the quarter, including information identifying the provider of services and the beneficiary, the recipient aid code, and amount of reimbursement, and other information that may be agreed to between the parties.
- 2) The DHCS invoice shall not contain and the County shall not compensate DHCS for MCIP services provided by Medi-Cal providers where the County

incurs the cost of providing MCIP services and claims them through the CPE process.

- 3) If the Medi-Cal provider renders MCIP services that are not reimbursable under the CPE process established, then the invoice shall contain and the County shall reimburse DHCS for the nonfederal share of DHCS' payments for these MCIP services.

C. MCIP Administrative Services

- 1) DHCS shall submit to the County an annual invoice for the County's apportioned share of the nonfederal share of MCIP administrative services based on Addendum A. The annual invoice for reimbursement identifies the following summarized categories of DHCS costs for the allocated SFY period billed: salary, benefits, operating expenses, and total costs. Costs shall be multiplied by one minus the Federal Medical Assistance Percentage applicable to such administrative costs subject to the limit on the amount reimbursable by the County under Article 4. For SFY 2017-18 and thereafter, DHCS shall submit annual invoices to the County no later than one hundred eighty (180) days following the close of the SFY.
- 2) The County shall not be obligated to pay DHCS for the MCIP administrative services covered by any invoice if DHCS presents the invoice to the County more than one (1) year after this Agreement terminates.

Article 7 – DHCS Responsibilities

A. MCIP Services

- 1) DHCS shall pay the appropriate Medi-Cal fee-for-service rate to Medi-Cal providers that directly bill DHCS for MCIP services rendered to the County's MCIP-eligible inmates and shall seek FFP. DHCS shall be responsible to pay such providers only to the extent the County commits to reimburse DHCS the nonfederal share of all federally reimbursable MCIP claims and for which FFP is available and retained by DHCS for the MCIP service claims.
- 2) DHCS shall maintain accounting records to a level of detail which identifies the actual expenditures incurred for MCIP services, the services provided, the county responsible, the specific inmate treated, the inmate's aid code, and the specific provider billing.
- 3) DHCS shall submit claims in a timely manner to the federal Medicaid Program to draw down FFP for DHCS, and shall draw down and distribute FFP for MCIP services claimed through the CPE process. Such claims shall be submitted in compliance with all applicable laws and regulations.

B. MCIP Administrative Services

- 1) DHCS shall administer MCIP and this Agreement for claiming federal reimbursement for MCIP services. It is understood by both the County and DHCS that other administrative activities including, but not limited to, transporting MCIP eligible beneficiaries, arranging for their care and for their incarceration remain the administrative responsibilities of the County.
- 2) DHCS shall maintain accounting records to a level of detail which identifies the actual expenditures incurred for personnel services which includes salary/wages, benefits, overhead costs for DHCS's staff, as well as equipment and all related operating expenses applicable to these positions including, but not limited to, general expense, rent and supplies, and travel cost for identified staff and managerial staff working specifically on activities or assignments directly related to MCIP.

C. General Responsibilities

- 1) DHCS shall:
 - i. Ensure that an appropriate audit trail exists within DHCS records and accounting system and maintain expenditure data as indicated in this Agreement.
 - ii. Designate a person to act as liaison with County with regard to issues concerning this Agreement. This person shall be identified to County's contact person for this Agreement.
 - iii. Provide a written response by email or mail to County's contact person within thirty (30) days of receiving a written request for information related to MCIP.
 - iv. With each quarterly invoice, provide paid claim analysis report to the County regarding MCIP claims submitted by providers for the County's MCIP-eligible inmates, as used for the determination of the corresponding nonfederal share that is the County's obligation under this Agreement.
- 2) Should the scope of work or services to be performed under this Agreement conflict with DHCS' responsibilities under federal Medicaid law, the responsibilities under federal Medicaid law shall take precedence.
- 3) DHCS' cessation of any activities due to federal Medicaid law responsibilities does not relinquish the obligation of the County to reimburse DHCS for MCIP administrative costs and MCIP services incurred by DHCS in connection with this Agreement for periods in which the County participated in the program.

- 4) DHCS agrees to provide to the County, or any federal or state department having monitoring or reviewing authority, access to and the right to examine its applicable records and documents for compliance with relevant federal and state statutes, rules and regulations, and this Agreement.

Article 8 – County Responsibilities

A. MCIP Services

- 1) Except as provided in (vi.) of this section, the County is responsible for reimbursing DHCS for the nonfederal share of MCIP services paid by DHCS to Medi-Cal providers rendering MCIP services to the County's MCIP eligible beneficiaries.
 - i. The County may pay a Medi-Cal provider to the extent required by or otherwise permitted by state and federal law to arrange for services for the MCIP individuals. Such additional amounts shall be paid entirely with County funds, and shall not be eligible for Social Security Act Title XIX FFP.
 - ii. If DHCS pays the Medi-Cal provider more than what the county would have paid for services rendered, the county cannot request the difference from the Medi-Cal provider.
 - iii. If the county would have paid the Medi-Cal provider less than what DHCS paid the Medi-Cal provider, the county is still obligated to reimburse DHCS for the nonfederal share of the payment from DHCS for MCIP services.
 - iv. In the event that FFP is not available for any MCIP service claimed pursuant to this Agreement, the County shall be solely responsible for arranging and paying for any such MCIP service.
 - v. If the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) determines an overpayment has occurred for a payment made to a Medi-Cal provider for MCIP services to the County's MCIP-eligible inmate, including the application of any federal payment limit that reduces the amount of FFP available for MCIP services, then DHCS shall seek the overpayment amount from the provider and return the collected FFP to CMS and return the collected nonfederal share of the overpayment to the County. In the event that DHCS cannot recover from the Medi-Cal provider such overpayment, the County shall pay DHCS an amount equal to the FFP portion of the unrecovered amount to the extent that section 1903(d)(2)(D) of the Social Security Act is found not to apply.

- vi. The County is not responsible for reimbursing DHCS for the nonfederal share of expenditures for MCIP services provided by DPHs when those services are reimbursed under the CPE process because DHCS is not responsible for the nonfederal share of expenditures for MCIP services reimbursed in the CPE process.
 - vii. The County is responsible for reimbursing DHCS for the nonfederal share of MCIP services provided by DPHs that are not reimbursed under the CPE process.
- 2) If CMS determines DHCS claimed a higher federal medical assistance percentage (FMAP) rate than is allowed and FFP is reduced by CMS for the MCIP services provided to a County's MCIP-eligible inmate for MCIP services, then the County shall hold DHCS harmless for the return of the FFP to CMS.

B. MCIP Administrative Services

- 1) As a condition of participating in MCIP, the County accepts its responsibility for reimbursing DHCS for the County's apportioned share of the nonfederal share of costs of MCIP administrative services based on Addendum A, performed by DHCS in administering MCIP, so that there is no expenditure from the State General Fund.
- 2) The County shall reimburse DHCS its allotted portion of the nonfederal share of funding for compensation, associated operating expenses, equipment, and travel costs for no more than 3.50 full-time equivalent (FTE) positions composed of: one-half (0.50) FTE Staff Service Manager I, two (2) FTE Staff Services Analysts/Associate Governmental Program Analysts, one-half (0.50) FTE Attorney, and one-half (0.50) FTE Accounting Officer, to be established and housed at DHCS, to support the reported expenditures submission process for obtaining federal reimbursement under this Agreement. The County's allotted portion shall be based on a methodology specified in Addendum A.

C. General Responsibilities

- 1) Upon the County's compliance with all applicable provisions in this Agreement and applicable laws, the County may send its MCIP-eligible inmates to Medi-Cal providers to receive MCIP services.
- 2) The County shall reimburse DHCS pursuant to Paragraphs A and B with funds from the County's General Fund, or from any other funds allowed under federal law and regulation, including but not limited to, Section 1903(w) of the Social Security Act and Code of Federal Regulations, title 42, part 433, subpart B.
- 3) In the event of any federal deferral or disallowance which is applicable to MCIP expenditures, the County shall provide all documents requested by DHCS within fourteen (14) days.
- 4) The County shall assist with the completion of and delivery of completed Medi-Cal applications to County Welfare Department (CWD) within 90 calendar days after the date of admission of the inmate to an Medi-Cal provider off of the grounds of the county correctional facility which results in an expected stay of more than 24 hours.

Article 9 – Amendments

- A. Amendments to this Agreement shall be made only by a writing signed by the parties to this Agreement and, if required by state law, by approval of the California Department of General Services. Notwithstanding the previous sentence, any update made to the appropriate contact persons identified in Article 5 may be made by e-mail to the other contact person or persons and without formal amendment.
- B. This Agreement shall be amended pursuant to findings from the periodic assessment identified in Article 11.H, to accurately reflect the State's administrative costs and MCIP medical care costs.

Article 10 – Termination and Agreement Disputes

- A. This Agreement may be terminated by any party upon written notice given at least thirty (30) calendar days prior to the termination date. Notice shall be addressed to the respective parties as identified in Article 5 of this Agreement. The County shall remain obliged after the termination date to pay for all MCIP administrative costs and MCIP services incurred by DHCS for periods in which it participated in the program.
- B. This Agreement shall be terminated upon cessation of MCIP. The County shall remain obliged after the termination date to pay for all of the County's apportioned share of MCIP administrative costs based on Addendum A and all of the County's MCIP services incurred by DHCS for periods in which it participated in the program.

C. An informal dispute resolution process shall be undertaken prior to the dispute resolution processes described in Subparagraphs 1 to 2, below. In case of a dispute there shall be a discussion between the County and DHCS staff, and if not resolved then the County shall address the issue to DHCS in a written letter. If unresolved then the dispute resolution processes in Subparagraphs 1 to 2 shall be undertaken as appropriate.

- 1) Nothing in this Agreement shall prevent the County from pursuing any other administrative and judicial review available to it under law.
- 2) Judicial review pursuant to Code of Civil Procedure section 1085 shall be available to resolve disputes relating to the terms, performance, or termination of this Agreement, or any act, failure to act, conduct, order, or decision of DHCS that violate this Agreement subject to Article 11.F.

D. The terms of Article 6 (Payment Terms and Invoicing), Article 10 (Termination and Agreement Disputes), Article 11.B (Indemnification), and Article 11.D (Records) shall survive after the termination date.

Article 11 – General Provisions

A. Definitions.

- 1) The term “certified public expenditure process” or “CPE process” means the process established for the Medi-Cal program under state law (including but not limited to Welfare and Institutions Code section 14166.1, et seq.), the California Medi-Cal state plan, and approved Medicaid demonstration projects and waivers through which public Medi-Cal providers claim federal financial participation for their allowable expenditures.
- 2) The term “days” as used in this Agreement shall mean calendar days unless specified otherwise.
- 3) The term “Demonstration Project” means the California Medi-Cal 2020 Demonstration, Number 11-W-00193/9, as approved by CMS effective beginning December 30, 2015.
- 4) The term “designated public hospital” is defined as set forth in the Demonstration Project, which shall be codified in state law at Welfare and Institutions Code section 14184.10, subdivision (f) pursuant to SB 815 (2016), and as may be modified from time to time.
- 5) The term “inmate” as used in this Agreement includes the persons identified in Welfare and Institutions Code sections 14053.7(e)(2)(A) and 14053.8(k) “juvenile inmate,” and Government Code sections 26605.6(a) “prisoner,”

26605.7(a) "prisoner" and (d)(1) "probationer," and 26605.8 "prisoner" and "probationer."

- 6) The term "MCIP" or "Medi-Cal County Inmate Program" contains the following three components: the Adult County Inmate Program (ACIP), as authorized in state law pursuant to Welfare and Institutions Code section 14053.7 and Penal Code section 5072, the Juvenile County Ward Program (JCWP), as authorized in Welfare and Institutions Code section 14053.8, and the County Compassionate Release Program (CCRP) and County Medical Probation Program (CMPP), as authorized by Government Code sections 26605.6, 26605.7, and 26605.8.
- 7) "MCIP administrative services" means the administrative services provided by DHCS personnel for the administration of MCIP, which shall include, but not be limited to those services provided by the personnel in Article 8 when claiming federal reimbursement for MCIP services and seeking reimbursement for DHCS from the County.
- 8) "Medi-Cal provider" means, any individual, partnership, group association, corporation, institution, or entity and the officer, directors, owners, managing employees or agents of any partnership, group association, corporation, institution, or entity that provides services, goods, supplies, or merchandise, directly or indirectly, to a Medi-Cal beneficiary, and that has been enrolled in the Medi-Cal program.

For purposes of MCIP, a Medi-Cal provider may claim for MCIP services rendered to the MCIP-eligible inmate depending on the MCIP component program. For example, a clinic cannot seek reimbursement from DHCS for outpatient services provided to an ACIP inmate because the outpatient services provided are not allowable as MCIP services for ACIP. A Medi-Cal provider does not go through a separate Medi-Cal enrollment or certification process to participate in MCIP.

- 9) "MCIP services" constitutes all of the following, only to the extent federal financial participation is available: a) in ACIP, Medi-Cal allowable inpatient hospital services, including inpatient psychiatric services, and physician services provided during the inpatient hospital service stay of adult inmates in county correctional facilities who are determined eligible for Medi-Cal pursuant to Welfare and Institutions Code section 14053.7; b) in the Compassionate Release Program pursuant to Government Code section 26605.6 and Medical Probation Program pursuant to Government Code section 26605.7, full-scope Medi-Cal services; c) in JCWP, Medi-Cal allowable inpatient hospital services, including inpatient psychiatric services and physician services, of juvenile inmates in county correctional facilities who are determined eligible for Medi-Cal services pursuant to Welfare and Institutions Code section 14053.8; and, d) any other Medi-Cal program for which federal reimbursement is available for

coverage of adult inmates and juvenile inmates in county correctional facilities, if authorized by law and agreed to by the County and DHCS by amending this Agreement.

10)The term "Medi-Cal rate" means the reimbursement determined by the reimbursement methodology approved for the Medi-Cal provider under the California State Plan, or Social Security Act section 1115 Demonstration Project or section 1915 waiver.

11)The State Fiscal Year (SFY) begins on July 1st of each year and ends on June 30th in the subsequent calendar year.

- B. Indemnification. It is agreed that the County shall defend, hold harmless, and indemnify DHCS, its officers, employees, and agents from any and all reported expenditures, liability, loss, or expense (including reasonable attorney fees) for injuries or damage to any person, any property, or both which arise out of the terms and conditions of this Agreement and the negligent or intentional acts or omissions of the County, its officers, employees, or agents.
- C. Severability. If any term, condition, or provision of this Agreement is held by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, void, or unenforceable, the remaining provisions will nevertheless continue in full force and effect, and shall not be affected, impaired or invalidated in any way. Notwithstanding the previous sentence, if a decision by a court of competent jurisdiction invalidates, voids, or renders unenforceable a term, condition, or provision in this Agreement that is included in the purpose of this Agreement then the parties to this Agreement shall either amend this Agreement pursuant to Article 9, or it shall be terminated pursuant to Article 10.
- D. Records. DHCS and the County shall maintain and preserve all records relating to this Agreement for a period of three (3) years from DHCS' receipt of the last payment of FFP, or until three years after all audit findings are resolved, whichever is later. This does not limit any responsibilities held by DHCS or the County provided for elsewhere in this Agreement, or in state or federal law.
- E. Compliance with Applicable Laws. All parties performance under this Agreement shall be in accordance with all applicable federal and state laws, including, but not limited to:
- 1) The Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990, as amended;
 - 2) Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, as amended;
 - 3) Title XIX of the Social Security Act;
 - 4) Welfare and Institutions Code section 14000 et seq.;
 - 5) Government Code section 53060;
 - 6) The California Medicaid State Plan;

- 7) Laws and regulations including, but not limited to those related to licensure, certification, confidentiality of records, quality assurance, and nondiscrimination;
- 8) The Policy and Procedure Letters, and similar instructions, published with regulatory authority;
- 9) Government Code sections 26605.6, 26605.7, and 26605.8;
- 10) Penal Code section 5072;
- 11) Title 42 of the Code of Federal Regulations; and,
- 12) California Code of Regulations.

F. Controlling Law and Venue. The validity of this Agreement and its terms or provisions, as well as the rights and duties of the parties hereunder, the interpretation and performance of this Agreement shall be governed by the laws of the State of California. Venue of any action brought with regards to this Agreement shall be in any county in which the Attorney General maintains an office.

G. Integration Clause.

- 1) This Agreement and any exhibits and addendums attached hereto shall constitute the entire Agreement among the parties to it pertaining to the implementation of MCIP and supersedes any prior or contemporaneous understanding or agreement with respect to the subject matter of this Agreement.
- 2) Notwithstanding Subparagraph G.1., DHCS Form 9098 or DHCS Form 6208 (whichever is applicable) is incorporated by reference into this Agreement if the County has a DHCS Form 9098 or DHCS Form 6208 on record. Notwithstanding Subparagraph G.1., the terms of the DHCS Form 9098 or DHCS Form 6208 controls to the extent there is a conflict with this Agreement, except for Article 10 of this Agreement. If the DHCS Form 9098 or DHCS Form 6208 does not address a matter addressed by this Agreement, then this Agreement controls.

H. Periodic Assessment. Pursuant to Welfare and Institutions Code sections 14053.7 and 14053.8, and Government Code sections 26605.6, 26605.7, and 26605.8, the County enters into this Agreement in order to implement MCIP under which the County may participate and for which the County will pay the nonfederal share of all federally reimbursable administrative costs and medical care costs incurred by DHCS performing activities described in Article 7. The County agrees that DHCS, in its sole discretion, may conduct a periodic assessment in consultation with the counties, of such costs incurred by DHCS to determine compliance with Welfare and Institutions Code sections 14053.7 and 14053.8, Penal Code section 5072, and Government Code sections 26605.6, 26605.7, and 26605.8, and DHCS agrees to ensure that all invoicing as described in Article 6 and any other relevant documentation will be accordingly updated to ensure compliance with Welfare and Institutions Code sections

14053.7 and 14053.8, Penal Code section 5072, and Government Code sections 26605.6, 26605.7, and 26605.8.

- I. Conformance Clause. Any provision of this Agreement in conflict with present or future governing authorities is hereby amended to conform to those authorities and such amended provisions supersede any conflicting provisions in this Agreement. The governing authorities include, but are not limited to the authorities listed in Article 11.E.
- J. Waiver. No covenant, condition, duty, obligation, or undertaking made a part of this Agreement shall be waived except by amendment of the Agreement by the parties hereto, and forbearance or indulgence in any other form or manner by either party in any regard whatsoever shall not constitute a waiver of the covenant, condition, duty, obligation, or undertaking to be kept, performed, or discharged by the other party to which the same may apply; and, until performance or satisfaction of all covenants, duties, obligations, or undertakings is complete, the party shall have the right to invoke any remedy available under this Agreement, or under law, notwithstanding such forbearance or indulgence.
- K. Third Party Benefit. None of the provisions of this Agreement are or shall be construed as for the benefit of, or enforceable by, any person not a party to this Agreement.
- L. Conflict of Interest. The County is subject to the Medi-Cal Conflict of Interest Law, as applicable and set forth in Welfare and Institutions Code section 14022 and Article 1.1 (commencing with section 14030), and implemented pursuant to California Code of Regulations, title 22, section 51466.
- M. Budget Contingency Clause.
 - 1) DHCS will seek an appropriation in the Budget Act each State fiscal year which would authorize DHCS to pay Medi-Cal providers for MCIP services. It is mutually agreed that if the State Budget Act of the current SFY or any subsequent SFYs covered under this Agreement does not appropriate any funds for MCIP, this Agreement shall be of no further force and effect. In this event, an Article 10.B termination shall be implemented and DHCS shall have no liability to pay any funds whatsoever to Medi-Cal providers for MCIP services for the County's inmates rendered through the termination date of this Agreement.
 - 2) If funding associated with MCIP for any SFY is reduced by the State Budget Act DHCS shall have the option to cancel this Agreement, with no liability occurring to the State.

N. Limitation of State Liability.

- 1) Notwithstanding any other provision of this Agreement, DHCS shall be held harmless from any federal audit disallowance and interest resulting from payments made by the federal Medicaid program as reimbursement for claims providing services for MCIP, less the amounts already remitted to or recovered by DHCS for the disallowed claim.
- 2) To the extent that a federal audit disallowance and interest results from a claim or claims for which the Medi-Cal provider has received reimbursement for MCIP services under this Agreement, DHCS shall recoup from the Medi-Cal provider, upon written notice, amounts equal to the amount of the disallowance and interest in that fiscal year for the disallowed claim, less the amounts already remitted to or recovered by DHCS. All subsequent claims submitted to DHCS applicable to any previously disallowed claim, may be held in abeyance, with no payment made, until the federal disallowance issue is resolved.

O. Exclusions. The County shall comply with the following requirements:

- 1) The conviction of an employee or subcontractor of the County, or of an employee of a subcontractor, of any felony or of a misdemeanor involving fraud, abuse of any Medi-Cal beneficiary, or abuse of the Medi-Cal program, shall result in the exclusion of that employee or subcontractor, or employee of a subcontractor, from participation in MCIP except as a beneficiary.
- 2) Exclusion after conviction described in Article 11.O.1 shall result regardless of any subsequent order under Penal Code section 1203.4 allowing a person to withdraw his or her plea of guilty and to enter a plea of not guilty, or setting aside the verdict of guilty, or dismissing the accusation, information, or indictment.
- 3) Suspension or exclusion of an employee or a subcontractor, or of an employee of a subcontractor, from participation in the Medi-Cal program, the Medicaid program, or the Medicare program, shall result in the exclusion of that employee or subcontractor, or employee of a subcontractor, from participation in MCIP, except as a beneficiary.
- 4) Revocation, suspension, or restriction of the license, certificate, or registration of any employee, subcontractor, or employee of a subcontractor, shall result in exclusion from MCIP, when such license, certificate, or registration is required for the provision of services.

P. Confidentiality. The County shall comply with the applicable confidentiality requirements as specified in Section 1902(a)(7) of the Social Security Act; Code of Federal Regulations, title 42, section 431.300; Welfare and Institutions Code section 14100.2; and California Code of Regulations, title 22, section 51009; and, the Business Associates Agreement attached and hereby incorporated by reference.

Q. Data Sharing.

- 1) The County shall comply with all provisions of the current Business Associates Agreement (BAA) incorporated by reference and made part of this Agreement as Addendum B.

The persons signing this Agreement on behalf of County and DHCS, as applicable, represent and warrant that he or she is an individual duly authorized and having authority to sign on behalf of, and approve for, County or DHCS, as applicable, and is authorized and designated to enter into and approve this Agreement on behalf of County or DHCS, as applicable.

ADDENDUM A: MCIP Administrative Costs for State Fiscal Year 2018-19

The Medi-Cal County Inmate Program (MCIP) agreement is a one-year contract giving counties the option to participate on an annual basis. At the beginning of each calendar year, counties have the opportunity to participate in the program for the upcoming State Fiscal Year (SFY) by completing the MCIP Agreement.

The methodology for calculating each county's nonfederal share of administrative costs was developed by DHCS, in consultation with the California State Association of Counties, County Health Executives Association of California, California Association of Public Hospitals and Health Systems, and the California State Sheriffs' Association. For SFY 2018-19 the nonfederal share of administrative costs allocated to each county will be based on the following:

- 1) 30% of the total administrative costs will be distributed evenly to participating counties over 50,000 in population. *
- 2) 70% of the total administrative costs will be allocated to participating counties pro-rata based on population. *

**Population data will be obtained from the California Department of Finance, Demographic Estimates*

DHCS will invoice participating counties for the nonfederal share of administrative costs six months after the close of the SFY based on actual administrative costs per the methodology above, not exceeding the estimated amounts in the MCIP agreements.

I. Recitals

- A. This Contract (Agreement) has been determined to constitute a business associate relationship under the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996, Public Law 104-191 ("HIPAA"), the Health Information Technology for Economic and Clinical Health Act, Public Law 111-005 ("the HITECH Act"), 42 U.S.C. section 17921 et seq., and their implementing privacy and security regulations at 45 CFR Parts 160 and 164 ("the HIPAA regulations").
- B. The Department of Health Care Services ("DHCS") wishes to disclose to Business Associate certain information pursuant to the terms of this Agreement, some of which may constitute Protected Health Information ("PHI"), including protected health information in electronic media ("ePHI"), under federal law, and personal information ("PI") under state law.
- C. As set forth in this Agreement, Contractor, here and after, is the Business Associate of DHCS acting on DHCS' behalf and provides services, arranges, performs or assists in the performance of functions or activities on behalf of DHCS and creates, receives, maintains, transmits, uses or discloses PHI and PI. DHCS and Business Associate are each a party to this Agreement and are collectively referred to as the "parties."
- D. The purpose of this Addendum is to protect the privacy and security of the PHI and PI that may be created, received, maintained, transmitted, used or disclosed pursuant to this Agreement, and to comply with certain standards and requirements of HIPAA, the HITECH Act and the HIPAA regulations, including, but not limited to, the requirement that DHCS must enter into a contract containing specific requirements with Contractor prior to the disclosure of PHI to Contractor, as set forth in 45 CFR Parts 160 and 164 and the HITECH Act, and the Final Omnibus Rule as well as the Alcohol and Drug Abuse patient records confidentiality law 42 CFR Part 2, and any other applicable state or federal law or regulation. 42 CFR section 2.1(b)(2)(B) allows for the disclosure of such records to qualified personnel for the purpose of conducting management or financial audits, or program evaluation. 42 CFR Section 2.53(d) provides that patient identifying information disclosed under this section may be disclosed only back to the program from which it was obtained and used only to carry out an audit or evaluation purpose or to investigate or prosecute criminal or other activities, as authorized by an appropriate court order.
- E. The terms used in this Addendum, but not otherwise defined, shall have the same meanings as those terms have in the HIPAA regulations. Any reference to statutory or regulatory language shall be to such language as in effect or as amended.

II. Definitions

- A. Breach shall have the meaning given to such term under HIPAA, the HITECH Act, the HIPAA regulations, and the Final Omnibus Rule.
- B. Business Associate shall have the meaning given to such term under HIPAA, the HITECH Act, the HIPAA regulations, and the final Omnibus Rule.
- C. Covered Entity shall have the meaning given to such term under HIPAA, the HITECH Act, the HIPAA regulations, and Final Omnibus Rule.
- D. Electronic Health Record shall have the meaning given to such term in the HITECH Act, including, but not limited to, 42 U.S.C Section 17921 and implementing regulations.

- E. Electronic Protected Health Information (ePHI) means individually identifiable health information transmitted by electronic media or maintained in electronic media, including but not limited to electronic media as set forth under 45 CFR section 160.103.
- F. Individually Identifiable Health Information means health information, including demographic information collected from an individual, that is created or received by a health care provider, health plan, employer or health care clearinghouse, and relates to the past, present or future physical or mental health or condition of an individual, the provision of health care to an individual, or the past, present, or future payment for the provision of health care to an individual, that identifies the individual or where there is a reasonable basis to believe the information can be used to identify the individual, as set forth under 45 CFR section 160.103.
- G. Privacy Rule shall mean the HIPAA Regulation that is found at 45 CFR Parts 160 and 164.
- H. Personal Information shall have the meaning given to such term in California Civil Code section 1798.29.
- I. Protected Health Information means individually identifiable health information that is transmitted by electronic media, maintained in electronic media, or is transmitted or maintained in any other form or medium, as set forth under 45 CFR section 160.103.
- J. Required by law, as set forth under 45 CFR section 164.103, means a mandate contained in law that compels an entity to make a use or disclosure of PHI that is enforceable in a court of law. This includes, but is not limited to, court orders and court-ordered warrants, subpoenas or summons issued by a court, grand jury, a governmental or tribal inspector general, or an administrative body authorized to require the production of information, and a civil or an authorized investigative demand. It also includes Medicare conditions of participation with respect to health care providers participating in the program, and statutes or regulations that require the production of information, including statutes or regulations that require such information if payment is sought under a government program providing public benefits.
- K. Secretary means the Secretary of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services ("HHS") or the Secretary's designee.
- L. Security Incident means the attempted or successful unauthorized access, use, disclosure, modification, or destruction of PHI or PI, or confidential data that is essential to the ongoing operation of the Business Associate's organization and intended for internal use; or interference with system operations in an information system.
- M. Security Rule shall mean the HIPAA regulation that is found at 45 CFR Parts 160 and 164.
- N. Unsecured PHI shall have the meaning given to such term under the HITECH Act, 42 U.S.C. section 17932(h), any guidance issued pursuant to such Act, and the HIPAA regulations.

III. Terms of Agreement

A. Permitted Uses and Disclosures of PHI by Business Associate

Permitted Uses and Disclosures. Except as otherwise indicated in this Addendum, Business Associate may use or disclose PHI only to perform functions, activities or services specified in this Agreement, for, or on behalf of DHCS, provided that such use or disclosure would not violate the HIPAA regulations, if done by DHCS. Any such use or disclosure must, to the extent practicable, be limited to the limited data set, as defined in 45 CFR section 164.514(e)(2), or, if needed, to the minimum necessary to accomplish

the intended purpose of such use or disclosure, in compliance with the HITECH Act and any guidance issued pursuant to such Act, the HIPAA regulations, the Final Omnibus Rule and 42 CFR Part 2.

1. **Specific Use and Disclosure Provisions.** Except as otherwise indicated in this Addendum, Business Associate may:
 - a. **Use and disclose for management and administration.** Use and disclose PHI for the proper management and administration of the Business Associate provided that such disclosures are required by law, or the Business Associate obtains reasonable assurances from the person to whom the information is disclosed that it will remain confidential and will be used or further disclosed only as required by law or for the purpose for which it was disclosed to the person, and the person notifies the Business Associate of any instances of which it is aware that the confidentiality of the information has been breached.
 - b. **Provision of Data Aggregation Services.** Use PHI to provide data aggregation services to DHCS. Data aggregation means the combining of PHI created or received by the Business Associate on behalf of DHCS with PHI received by the Business Associate in its capacity as the Business Associate of another covered entity, to permit data analyses that relate to the health care operations of DHCS.

B. Prohibited Uses and Disclosures

1. Business Associate shall not disclose PHI about an individual to a health plan for payment or health care operations purposes if the PHI pertains solely to a health care item or service for which the health care provider involved has been paid out of pocket in full and the individual requests such restriction, in accordance with 42 U.S.C. section 17935(a) and 45 CFR section 164.522(a).
2. Business Associate shall not directly or indirectly receive remuneration in exchange for PHI, except with the prior written consent of DHCS and as permitted by 42 U.S.C. section 17935(d)(2).

C. Responsibilities of Business Associate

Business Associate agrees:

1. **Nondisclosure.** Not to use or disclose Protected Health Information (PHI) other than as permitted or required by this Agreement or as required by law.
2. **Safeguards.** To implement administrative, physical, and technical safeguards that reasonably and appropriately protect the confidentiality, integrity, and availability of the PHI, including electronic PHI, that it creates, receives, maintains, uses or transmits on behalf of DHCS, in compliance with 45 CFR sections 164.308, 164.310 and 164.312, and to prevent use or disclosure of PHI other than as provided for by this Agreement. Business Associate shall implement reasonable and appropriate policies and procedures to comply with the standards, implementation specifications and other requirements of 45 CFR section 164, subpart C, in compliance with 45 CFR section 164.316. Business Associate shall develop and maintain a written information privacy and security program that includes administrative, technical and physical safeguards appropriate to the size and complexity of the Business Associate's operations and the nature and scope of its activities, and which incorporates the requirements of section 3, Security, below. Business Associate will provide DHCS with its current and updated policies.

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3. **Security.** To take any and all steps necessary to ensure the continuous security of all computerized data systems containing PHI and/or PI, and to protect paper documents containing PHI and/or PI. These steps shall include, at a minimum:
- a. Complying with all of the data system security precautions listed in Attachment A, the Business Associate Data Security Requirements;
 - b. Achieving and maintaining compliance with the HIPAA Security Rule (45 CFR Parts 160 and 164), as necessary in conducting operations on behalf of DHCS under this Agreement;
 - c. Providing a level and scope of security that is at least comparable to the level and scope of security established by the Office of Management and Budget in OMB Circular No. A-130, Appendix III - Security of Federal Automated Information Systems, which sets forth guidelines for automated information systems in Federal agencies; and
 - d. In case of a conflict between any of the security standards contained in any of these enumerated sources of security standards, the most stringent shall apply. The most stringent means that safeguard which provides the highest level of protection to PHI from unauthorized disclosure. Further, Business Associate must comply with changes to these standards that occur after the effective date of this Agreement.

Business Associate shall designate a Security Officer to oversee its data security program who shall be responsible for carrying out the requirements of this section and for communicating on security matters with DHCS.

D. Mitigation of Harmful Effects. To mitigate, to the extent practicable, any harmful effect that is known to Business Associate of a use or disclosure of PHI by Business Associate or its subcontractors in violation of the requirements of this Addendum.

E. Business Associate's Agents and Subcontractors.

1. To enter into written agreements with any agents, including subcontractors and vendors, to whom Business Associate provides PHI or PI received from or created or received by Business Associate on behalf of DHCS, that impose the same restrictions and conditions on such agents, subcontractors and vendors that apply to Business Associate with respect to such PHI and PI under this Addendum, and that comply with all applicable provisions of HIPAA, the HITECH Act the HIPAA regulations, and the Final Omnibus Rule, including the requirement that any agents, subcontractors or vendors implement reasonable and appropriate administrative, physical, and technical safeguards to protect such PHI and PI. Business associates are directly liable under the HIPAA Rules and subject to civil and, in some cases, criminal penalties for making uses and disclosures of protected health information that are not authorized by its contract or required by law. A business associate also is directly liable and subject to civil penalties for failing to safeguard electronic protected health information in accordance with the HIPAA Security Rule. A "business associate" also is a subcontractor that creates, receives, maintains, or transmits protected health information on behalf of another business associate. Business Associate shall incorporate, when applicable, the relevant provisions of this Addendum into each subcontract or subaward to such agents, subcontractors and vendors, including the requirement that any security incidents or breaches of unsecured PHI or PI be reported to Business Associate.

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2. In accordance with 45 CFR section 164.504(e)(1)(ii), upon Business Associate's knowledge of a material breach or violation by its subcontractor of the agreement between Business Associate and the subcontractor, Business Associate shall:
 - a. Provide an opportunity for the subcontractor to cure the breach or end the violation and terminate the agreement if the subcontractor does not cure the breach or end the violation within the time specified by DHCS; or
 - b. Immediately terminate the agreement if the subcontractor has breached a material term of the agreement and cure is not possible.

F. Availability of Information to DHCS and Individuals. To provide access and information:

1. To provide access as DHCS may require, and in the time and manner designated by DHCS (upon reasonable notice and during Business Associate's normal business hours) to PHI in a Designated Record Set, to DHCS (or, as directed by DHCS), to an Individual, in accordance with 45 CFR section 164.524. Designated Record Set means the group of records maintained for DHCS that includes medical, dental and billing records about individuals; enrollment, payment, claims adjudication, and case or medical management systems maintained for DHCS health plans; or those records used to make decisions about individuals on behalf of DHCS. Business Associate shall use the forms and processes developed by DHCS for this purpose and shall respond to requests for access to records transmitted by DHCS within fifteen (15) calendar days of receipt of the request by producing the records or verifying that there are none.
2. If Business Associate maintains an Electronic Health Record with PHI, and an individual requests a copy of such information in an electronic format, Business Associate shall provide such information in an electronic format to enable DHCS to fulfill its obligations under the HITECH Act, including but not limited to, 42 U.S.C. section 17935(e).
3. If Business Associate receives data from DHCS that was provided to DHCS by the Social Security Administration, upon request by DHCS, Business Associate shall provide DHCS with a list of all employees, contractors and agents who have access to the Social Security data, including employees, contractors and agents of its subcontractors and agents.

G. Amendment of PHI. To make any amendment(s) to PHI that DHCS directs or agrees to pursuant to 45 CFR section 164.526, in the time and manner designated by DHCS.

H. Internal Practices. To make Business Associate's internal practices, books and records relating to the use and disclosure of PHI received from DHCS, or created or received by Business Associate on behalf of DHCS, available to DHCS or to the Secretary of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services in a time and manner designated by DHCS or by the Secretary, for purposes of determining DHCS' compliance with the HIPAA regulations. If any information needed for this purpose is in the exclusive possession of any other entity or person and the other entity or person fails or refuses to furnish the information to Business Associate, Business Associate shall so certify to DHCS and shall set forth the efforts it made to obtain the information.

- I. **Documentation of Disclosures.** To document and make available to DHCS or (at the direction of DHCS) to an Individual such disclosures of PHI, and information related to such disclosures, necessary to respond to a proper request by the subject Individual for an accounting of disclosures of PHI, in accordance with the HITECH Act and its implementing regulations, including but not limited to 45 CFR section 164.528 and 42 U.S.C. section 17935(c). If Business Associate maintains electronic health records for DHCS as of January 1, 2009, Business Associate must provide an accounting of disclosures, including those disclosures for treatment, payment or health care operations, effective with disclosures on or after January 1, 2014. If Business Associate acquires electronic health records for DHCS after January 1, 2009, Business Associate must provide an accounting of disclosures, including those disclosures for treatment, payment or health care operations, effective with disclosures on or after the date the electronic health record is acquired, or on or after January 1, 2011, whichever date is later. The electronic accounting of disclosures shall be for disclosures during the three years prior to the request for an accounting.
- J. **Breaches and Security Incidents.** During the term of this Agreement, Business Associate agrees to implement reasonable systems for the discovery and prompt reporting of any breach or security incident, and to take the following steps:
1. **Notice to DHCS.** (1) To notify DHCS **immediately** upon the discovery of a suspected security incident that involves data provided to DHCS by the Social Security Administration. This notification will be **by telephone call plus email or fax** upon the discovery of the breach. (2) To notify DHCS **within 24 hours by email or fax** of the discovery of unsecured PHI or PI in electronic media or in any other media if the PHI or PI was, or is reasonably believed to have been, accessed or acquired by an unauthorized person, any suspected security incident, intrusion or unauthorized access, use or disclosure of PHI or PI in violation of this Agreement and this Addendum, or potential loss of confidential data affecting this Agreement. A breach shall be treated as discovered by Business Associate as of the first day on which the breach is known, or by exercising reasonable diligence would have been known, to any person (other than the person committing the breach) who is an employee, officer or other agent of Business Associate.

Notice shall be provided to the DHCS Program Contract Manager, the DHCS Privacy Officer and the DHCS Information Security Officer. If the incident occurs after business hours or on a weekend or holiday and involves data provided to DHCS by the Social Security Administration, notice shall be provided by calling the DHCS EITS Service Desk. Notice shall be made using the "DHCS Privacy Incident Report" form, including all information known at the time. Business Associate shall use the most current version of this form, which is posted on the DHCS Privacy Office website (www.dhcs.ca.gov, then select "Privacy" in the left column and then "Business Use" near the middle of the page) or use this link:

Upon discovery of a breach or suspected security incident, intrusion or unauthorized access, use or disclosure of PHI or PI, Business Associate shall take:

- a. Prompt corrective action to mitigate any risks or damages involved with the breach and to protect the operating environment; and
- b. Any action pertaining to such unauthorized disclosure required by applicable Federal and State laws and regulations.

2. **Investigation and Investigation Report.** To immediately investigate such security incident, breach, or unauthorized access, use or disclosure of PHI or PI. If the initial report did not include all of the requested information marked with an asterisk, then within 72 hours of the discovery, Business Associate shall submit an updated "DHCS Privacy Incident Report" containing the information marked with an asterisk and all other applicable information listed on the form, to the extent known at that time, to the DHCS Program Contract Manager, the DHCS Privacy Officer, and the DHCS Information Security Officer:
3. **Complete Report.** To provide a complete report of the investigation to the DHCS Program Contract Manager, the DHCS Privacy Officer, and the DHCS Information Security Officer within ten (10) working days of the discovery of the breach or unauthorized use or disclosure. If all of the required information was not included in either the initial report, or the Investigation Report, then a separate Complete Report must be submitted. The report shall be submitted on the "DHCS Privacy Incident Report" form and shall include an assessment of all known factors relevant to a determination of whether a breach occurred under applicable provisions of HIPAA, the HITECH Act, the HIPAA regulations and/or state law. The report shall also include a full, detailed corrective action plan, including information on measures that were taken to halt and/or contain the improper use or disclosure. If DHCS requests information in addition to that listed on the "DHCS Privacy Incident Report" form, Business Associate shall make reasonable efforts to provide DHCS with such information. If necessary, a Supplemental Report may be used to submit revised or additional information after the completed report is submitted, by submitting the revised or additional information on an updated "DHCS Privacy Incident Report" form. DHCS will review and approve or disapprove the determination of whether a breach occurred, is reportable to the appropriate entities, if individual notifications are required, and the corrective action plan.
4. **Notification of Individuals.** If the cause of a breach of PHI or PI is attributable to Business Associate or its subcontractors, agents or vendors, Business Associate shall notify individuals of the breach or unauthorized use or disclosure when notification is required under state or federal law and shall pay any costs of such notifications, as well as any costs associated with the breach. The notifications shall comply with the requirements set forth in 42 U.S.C. section 17932 and its implementing regulations, including, but not limited to, the requirement that the notifications be made without unreasonable delay and in no event later than 60 calendar days. The DHCS Program Contract Manager, the DHCS Privacy Officer, and the DHCS Information Security Officer shall approve the time, manner and content of any such notifications and their review and approval must be obtained before the notifications are made.
5. **Responsibility for Reporting of Breaches.** If the cause of a breach of PHI or PI is attributable to Business Associate or its agents, subcontractors or vendors, Business Associate is responsible for all required reporting of the breach as specified in 42 U.S.C. section 17932 and its implementing regulations, including notification to media outlets and to the Secretary. If a breach of unsecured PHI involves more than 500 residents of the State of California or its jurisdiction, Business Associate shall notify the Secretary of the breach immediately upon discovery of the breach. If Business Associate has reason to believe that duplicate reporting of the same breach or incident may occur because its subcontractors, agents or vendors may report the breach or incident to DHCS in addition to Business Associate, Business Associate shall notify DHCS, and DHCS and Business Associate may take appropriate action to prevent duplicate reporting. The breach reporting requirements of this paragraph are in addition to the reporting requirements set forth in subsection 1, above.
6. **DHCS Contact Information.** To direct communications to the above referenced DHCS staff, the Contractor shall initiate contact as indicated herein. DHCS reserves the right to make changes to the

contact information below by giving written notice to the Contractor. Said changes shall not require an amendment to this Addendum or the Agreement to which it is incorporated.

K. Termination of Agreement. In accordance with Section 13404(b) of the HITECH Act and to the extent required by the HIPAA regulations, if Business Associate knows of a material breach or violation by DHCS of this Addendum, it shall take the following steps:

1. Provide an opportunity for DHCS to cure the breach or end the violation and terminate the Agreement if DHCS does not cure the breach or end the violation within the time specified by Business Associate; or
2. Immediately terminate the Agreement if DHCS has breached a material term of the Addendum and cure is not possible.

L. Due Diligence. Business Associate shall exercise due diligence and shall take reasonable steps to ensure that it remains in compliance with this Addendum and is in compliance with applicable provisions of HIPAA, the HITECH Act and the HIPAA regulations, and that its agents, subcontractors and vendors are in compliance with their obligations as required by this Addendum.

M. Sanctions and/or Penalties. Business Associate understands that a failure to comply with the provisions of HIPAA, the HITECH Act and the HIPAA regulations that are applicable to Business Associate may result in the imposition of sanctions and/or penalties on Business Associate under HIPAA, the HITECH Act and the HIPAA regulations.

IV. Obligations of DHCS

DHCS agrees to:

A. Notice of Privacy Practices. Provide Business Associate with the Notice of Privacy Practices that DHCS produces in accordance with 45 CFR section 164.520, as well as any changes to such notice. Visit the DHCS Privacy Office to view the most current Notice of Privacy Practices at: <http://www.dhcs.ca.gov/formsandpubs/laws/priv/Pages/default.aspx> or the DHCS website at www.dhcs.ca.gov (select "Privacy in the left column and "Notice of Privacy Practices" on the right side of the page).

B. Permission by Individuals for Use and Disclosure of PHI. Provide the Business Associate with any changes in, or revocation of, permission by an Individual to use or disclose PHI, if such changes affect the Business Associate's permitted or required uses and disclosures.

C. *Notification of Restrictions.* Notify the Business Associate of any restriction to the use or disclosure of PHI that DHCS has agreed to in accordance with 45 CFR section 164.522, to the extent that such restriction may affect the Business Associate's use or disclosure of PHI.

D. *Requests Conflicting with HIPAA Rules.* Not request the Business Associate to use or disclose PHI in any manner that would not be permissible under the HIPAA regulations if done by DHCS.

V. Audits, Inspection and Enforcement

A. From time to time, DHCS may inspect the facilities, systems, books and records of Business Associate to monitor compliance with this Agreement and this Addendum. Business Associate shall promptly remedy any violation of any provision of this Addendum and shall certify the same to the DHCS Privacy Officer in writing. The fact that DHCS inspects, or fails to inspect, or has the right to inspect, Business Associate's facilities, systems and procedures does not relieve Business Associate of its responsibility to comply with this Addendum, nor does DHCS':

1. Failure to detect or
2. Detection, but failure to notify Business Associate or require Business Associate's remediation of any unsatisfactory practices constitute acceptance of such practice or a waiver of DHCS' enforcement rights under this Agreement and this Addendum.

B. If Business Associate is the subject of an audit, compliance review, or complaint investigation by the Secretary or the Office of Civil Rights, U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, that is related to the performance of its obligations pursuant to this HIPAA Business Associate Addendum, Business Associate shall notify DHCS and provide DHCS with a copy of any PHI or PI that Business Associate provides to the Secretary or the Office of Civil Rights concurrently with providing such PHI or PI to the Secretary. Business Associate is responsible for any civil penalties assessed due to an audit or investigation of Business Associate, in accordance with 42 U.S.C. section 17934(c).

VI. Termination

A. *Term.* The Term of this Addendum shall commence as of the effective date of this Addendum and shall extend beyond the termination of the contract and shall terminate when all the PHI provided by DHCS to Business Associate, or created or received by Business Associate on behalf of DHCS, is destroyed or returned to DHCS, in accordance with 45 CFR 164.504(e)(2)(ii)(I).

B. *Termination for Cause.* In accordance with 45 CFR section 164.504(e)(1)(ii), upon DHCS' knowledge of a material breach or violation of this Addendum by Business Associate, DHCS shall:

1. Provide an opportunity for Business Associate to cure the breach or end the violation and terminate this Agreement if Business Associate does not cure the breach or end the violation within the time specified by DHCS; or
2. Immediately terminate this Agreement if Business Associate has breached a material term of this Addendum and cure is not possible.

- C. *Judicial or Administrative Proceedings.*** Business Associate will notify DHCS if it is named as a defendant in a criminal proceeding for a violation of HIPAA. DHCS may terminate this Agreement if Business Associate is found guilty of a criminal violation of HIPAA. DHCS may terminate this Agreement if a finding or stipulation that the Business Associate has violated any standard or requirement of HIPAA, or other security or privacy laws is made in any administrative or civil proceeding in which the Business Associate is a party or has been joined.
- D. *Effect of Termination.*** Upon termination or expiration of this Agreement for any reason, Business Associate shall return or destroy all PHI received from DHCS (or created or received by Business Associate on behalf of DHCS) that Business Associate still maintains in any form, and shall retain no copies of such PHI. If return or destruction is not feasible, Business Associate shall notify DHCS of the conditions that make the return or destruction infeasible, and DHCS and Business Associate shall determine the terms and conditions under which Business Associate may retain the PHI. Business Associate shall continue to extend the protections of this Addendum to such PHI, and shall limit further use of such PHI to those purposes that make the return or destruction of such PHI infeasible. This provision shall apply to PHI that is in the possession of subcontractors or agents of Business Associate.

VII. Miscellaneous Provisions

- A. *Disclaimer.*** DHCS makes no warranty or representation that compliance by Business Associate with this Addendum, HIPAA or the HIPAA regulations will be adequate or satisfactory for Business Associate's own purposes or that any information in Business Associate's possession or control, or transmitted or received by Business Associate, is or will be secure from unauthorized use or disclosure. Business Associate is solely responsible for all decisions made by Business Associate regarding the safeguarding of PHI.
- B. *Amendment.*** The parties acknowledge that federal and state laws relating to electronic data security and privacy are rapidly evolving and that amendment of this Addendum may be required to provide for procedures to ensure compliance with such developments. The parties specifically agree to take such action as is necessary to implement the standards and requirements of HIPAA, the HITECH Act, the HIPAA regulations and other applicable laws relating to the security or privacy of PHI. Upon DHCS' request, Business Associate agrees to promptly enter into negotiations with DHCS concerning an amendment to this Addendum embodying written assurances consistent with the standards and requirements of HIPAA, the HITECH Act, the HIPAA regulations or other applicable laws. DHCS may terminate this Agreement upon thirty (30) days written notice in the event:
1. Business Associate does not promptly enter into negotiations to amend this Addendum when requested by DHCS pursuant to this Section; or
 2. Business Associate does not enter into an amendment providing assurances regarding the safeguarding of PHI that DHCS in its sole discretion, deems sufficient to satisfy the standards and requirements of HIPAA and the HIPAA regulations.
- C. *Assistance in Litigation or Administrative Proceedings.*** Business Associate shall make itself and any subcontractors, employees or agents assisting Business Associate in the performance of its obligations under this Agreement, available to DHCS at no cost to DHCS to testify as witnesses, or otherwise, in the event of litigation or administrative proceedings being commenced against DHCS, its directors, officers or employees based upon claimed violation of HIPAA, the HIPAA regulations or other laws relating to security and privacy, which involves inactions or actions by the Business Associate, except where Business Associate or its subcontractor, employee or agent is a named adverse party.

- D. *No Third-Party Beneficiaries.*** Nothing express or implied in the terms and conditions of this Addendum is intended to confer, nor shall anything herein confer, upon any person other than DHCS or Business Associate and their respective successors or assignees, any rights, remedies, obligations or liabilities whatsoever.
- E. *Interpretation.*** The terms and conditions in this Addendum shall be interpreted as broadly as necessary to implement and comply with HIPAA, the HITECH Act, the HIPAA regulations and applicable state laws. The parties agree that any ambiguity in the terms and conditions of this Addendum shall be resolved in favor of a meaning that complies and is consistent with HIPAA, the HITECH Act and the HIPAA regulations.
- F. *Regulatory References.*** A reference in the terms and conditions of this Addendum to a section in the HIPAA regulations means the section as in effect or as amended.
- G. *Survival.*** The respective rights and obligations of Business Associate under Section VI.D of this Addendum shall survive the termination or expiration of this Agreement.
- H. *No Waiver of Obligations.*** No change, waiver or discharge of any liability or obligation hereunder on any one or more occasions shall be deemed a waiver of performance of any continuing or other obligation, or shall prohibit enforcement of any obligation, on any other occasion.

Attachment A
Business Associate Data Security Requirements

I. Personnel Controls

- A. *Employee Training.*** All workforce members who assist in the performance of functions or activities on behalf of DHCS, or access or disclose DHCS PHI or PI must complete information privacy and security training, at least annually, at Business Associate's expense. Each workforce member who receives information privacy and security training must sign a certification, indicating the member's name and the date on which the training was completed. These certifications must be retained for a period of six (6) years following contract termination.
- B. *Employee Discipline.*** Appropriate sanctions must be applied against workforce members who fail to comply with privacy policies and procedures or any provisions of these requirements, including termination of employment where appropriate.
- C. *Confidentiality Statement.*** All persons that will be working with DHCS PHI or PI must sign a confidentiality statement that includes, at a minimum, General Use, Security and Privacy Safeguards, Unacceptable Use, and Enforcement Policies. The statement must be signed by the workforce member prior to access to DHCS PHI or PI. The statement must be renewed annually. The Contractor shall retain each person's written confidentiality statement for DHCS inspection for a period of six (6) years following contract termination.
- D. *Background Check.*** Before a member of the workforce may access DHCS PHI or PI, a thorough background check of that worker must be conducted, with evaluation of the results to assure that there is no indication that the worker may present a risk to the security or integrity of confidential data or a risk for theft or misuse of confidential data. The Contractor shall retain each workforce member's background check documentation for a period of three (3) years following contract termination.

II. Technical Security Controls

- A. *Workstation/Laptop encryption.*** All workstations and laptops that process and/or store DHCS PHI or PI must be encrypted using a FIPS 140-2 certified algorithm which is 128bit or higher, such as Advanced Encryption Standard (AES). The encryption solution must be full disk unless approved by the DHCS Information Security Office.
- B. *Server Security.*** Servers containing unencrypted DHCS PHI or PI must have sufficient administrative, physical, and technical controls in place to protect that data, based upon a risk assessment/system security review.
- C. *Minimum Necessary.*** Only the minimum necessary amount of DHCS PHI or PI required to perform necessary business functions may be copied, downloaded, or exported.
- D. *Removable media devices.*** All electronic files that contain DHCS PHI or PI data must be encrypted when stored on any removable media or portable device (i.e. USB thumb drives, floppies, CD/DVD, smartphones, backup tapes etc.). Encryption must be a FIPS 140-2 certified algorithm which is 128bit or higher, such as AES.
- E. *Antivirus software.*** All workstations, laptops and other systems that process and/or store DHCS PHI or PI must install and actively use comprehensive anti-virus software solution with automatic updates scheduled at least daily.

- F. Patch Management.** All workstations, laptops and other systems that process and/or store DHCS PHI or PI must have critical security patches applied, with system reboot if necessary. There must be a documented patch management process which determines installation timeframe based on risk assessment and vendor recommendations. At a maximum, all applicable patches must be installed within 30 days of vendor release.
- G. User IDs and Password Controls.** All users must be issued a unique user name for accessing DHCS PHI or PI. Username must be promptly disabled, deleted, or the password changed upon the transfer or termination of an employee with knowledge of the password, at maximum within 24 hours. Passwords are not to be shared. Passwords must be at least eight characters and must be a non-dictionary word. Passwords must not be stored in readable format on the computer. Passwords must be changed every 90 days, preferably every 60 days. Passwords must be changed if revealed or compromised. Passwords must be composed of characters from at least three of the following four groups from the standard keyboard:
- Upper case letters (A-Z)
 - Lower case letters (a-z)
 - Arabic numerals (0-9)
 - Non-alphanumeric characters (punctuation symbols)
- H. Data Destruction.** When no longer needed, all DHCS PHI or PI must be cleared, purged, or destroyed consistent with NIST Special Publication 800-88, Guidelines for Media Sanitization such that the PHI or PI cannot be retrieved.
- I. System Timeout.** The system providing access to DHCS PHI or PI must provide an automatic timeout, requiring re-authentication of the user session after no more than 20 minutes of inactivity.
- J. Warning Banners.** All systems providing access to DHCS PHI or PI must display a warning banner stating that data is confidential, systems are logged, and system use is for business purposes only by authorized users. User must be directed to log off the system if they do not agree with these requirements.
- K. System Logging.** The system must maintain an automated audit trail which can identify the user or system process which initiates a request for DHCS PHI or PI, or which alters DHCS PHI or PI. The audit trail must be date and time stamped, must log both successful and failed accesses, must be read only, and must be restricted to authorized users. If DHCS PHI or PI is stored in a database, database logging functionality must be enabled. Audit trail data must be archived for at least 3 years after occurrence.
- L. Access Controls.** The system providing access to DHCS PHI or PI must use role based access controls for all user authentications, enforcing the principle of least privilege.

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HIPAA Business Associate Addendum

- M. *Transmission encryption.*** All data transmissions of DHCS PHI or PI outside the secure internal network must be encrypted using a FIPS 140-2 certified algorithm which is 128bit or higher, such as AES. Encryption can be end to end at the network level, or the data files containing PHI can be encrypted. This requirement pertains to any type of PHI or PI in motion such as website access, file transfer, and E-Mail.
- N. *Intrusion Detection.*** All systems involved in accessing, holding, transporting, and protecting DHCS PHI or PI that are accessible via the Internet must be protected by a comprehensive intrusion detection and prevention solution.

III. Audit Controls

- A. *System Security Review.*** All systems processing and/or storing DHCS PHI or PI must have at least an annual system risk assessment/security review which provides assurance that administrative, physical, and technical controls are functioning effectively and providing adequate levels of protection. Reviews should include vulnerability scanning tools.
- B. *Log Reviews.*** All systems processing and/or storing DHCS PHI or PI must have a routine procedure in place to review system logs for unauthorized access.
- C. *Change Control.*** All systems processing and/or storing DHCS PHI or PI must have a documented change control procedure that ensures separation of duties and protects the confidentiality, integrity and availability of data.

IV. Business Continuity / Disaster Recovery Controls

- A. *Emergency Mode Operation Plan.*** Contractor must establish a documented plan to enable continuation of critical business processes and protection of the security of electronic DHCS PHI or PI in the event of an emergency. Emergency means any circumstance or situation that causes normal computer operations to become unavailable for use in performing the work required under this Agreement for more than 24 hours.
- B. *Data Backup Plan.*** Contractor must have established documented procedures to backup DHCS PHI to maintain retrievable exact copies of DHCS PHI or PI. The plan must include a regular schedule for making backups, storing backups offsite, an inventory of backup media, and an estimate of the amount of time needed to restore DHCS PHI or PI should it be lost. At a minimum, the schedule must be a weekly full backup and monthly offsite storage of DHCS data.

V. Paper Document Controls

- A. *Supervision of Data.*** DHCS PHI or PI in paper form shall not be left unattended at any time, unless it is locked in a file cabinet, file room, desk or office. Unattended means that information is not being observed by an employee authorized to access the information. DHCS PHI or PI in paper form shall not be left unattended at any time in vehicles or planes and shall not be checked in baggage on commercial airplanes.
- B. *Escorting Visitors.*** Visitors to areas where DHCS PHI or PI is contained shall be escorted and DHCS PHI or PI shall be kept out of sight while visitors are in the area.
- C. *Confidential Destruction.*** DHCS PHI or PI must be disposed of through confidential means, such as cross cut shredding and pulverizing.

ADDENDUM B
HIPAA Business Associate Addendum

- D. **Removal of Data.** DHCS PHI or PI must not be removed from the premises of the Contractor except with express written permission of DHCS.
- E. **Faxing.** Faxes containing DHCS PHI or PI shall not be left unattended and fax machines shall be in secure areas. Faxes shall contain a confidentiality statement notifying persons receiving faxes in error to destroy them. Fax numbers shall be verified with the intended recipient before sending the fax.
- F. **Mailing.** Mailings of DHCS PHI or PI shall be sealed and secured from damage or inappropriate viewing of PHI or PI to the extent possible. Mailings which include 500 or more individually identifiable records of DHCS PHI or PI in a single package shall be sent using a tracked mailing method which includes verification of delivery and receipt, unless the prior written permission of DHCS to use another method is obtained.

- 2. Patrol in the following campgrounds, developed sites, or dispersed areas:
 - Amador Ranger District:** Including, but not limited to Mokelumne Canyon Campgrounds and dispersed areas up to Salt Springs Reservoir, Cole Creek, South Shore, Winton, Sugar Pine, Bear River, Silver Lake South and Kirkwood campgrounds and the summer home tracts at Devils Gate and Bear River. Patrols will be scheduled during known or anticipated high use periods, such as holiday weekends, scheduled events and routine weekend use.

- a. Patrols are to be made in a marked Sheriff's vehicle as well as on foot. The assigned Deputies will possess a radio capable of operating on Forest Service frequencies or other jointly available frequencies and will maintain communications with the Forest Service LEOs and either Camino or Grass Valley ECC. Duties for that day or time period scheduled will be entirely Forest Service oriented, and as such, the assigned Deputy will not be available for routine calls for service, unless approved by a designated representative.
- b. For each Patrol Shift, the assigned personnel will complete and turn in an Officer's Daily Log, or similar document. For Eldorado National Forest patrol, the logs shall be faxed at the end of the shift to the Patrol Captain at 530.642.5197. These logs shall accompany the request for reimbursement for both units.

- 3. Cooperator will notify Camino ECC at 530.644.0200 of all known injury/fatality incidents that occur on National Forest System lands as soon as possible.

- 4. The Cooperator will furnish a proposed Forest patrol schedule to the Forest Service for review that concentrates on holiday weekends, special event and weekends. Patrols will normally occur between Memorial Day and Labor Day weekends, but may be conducted on a call-as-needed basis with Forest Service approval. The Forest patrol schedule will be implemented upon the concurrence of the Cooperator and the Forest Service. Forest patrols will be provided as Cooperator staffing allows.

Upon concurrence of the local patrol Captain or their designated representative, an official from the Incident Management Team managing the incident, Cooperator personnel assigned to an incident where meals are provided will be entitled to such meals.

Social Services Department requests Board of Supervisors' approval and execution of agreement between Amador County and Sierra Child and Family Services for Child & Family Team Meeting Facilitator for the remainder of fiscal year 2017-2018 beginning January 1, 2018 and all of the 2018-2019 fiscal year.

A Request for Proposal (17-30) was mailed to six interested vendors as well as advertised in the newspaper. One proposal was received. After review and scoring of the submission, the proposal from Sierra Child and Family Services has been accepted by the Social Services Department and the recommendation to award the contract to Sierra Child & Family was approved by the BOS on February 13, 2018.

SERVICES AGREEMENT

THIS SERVICES AGREEMENT (this "Agreement") is entered into as of _____, 2018 by and between the COUNTY OF AMADOR, a political subdivision of the State of California (the "County") and SIERRA CHILD AND FAMILY SERVICES, Inc., a California Corporation (the "Contractor").

RECITALS

A. Pursuant to Government Code section 31000, County desires to engage assistance to provide the hereinafter set forth special services.

B. Contractor is in the business of providing services similar to those set forth in this Agreement.

C. County desires to engage Contractor, and Contractor desires to be hired by County, to perform the work described below, upon the terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement.

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the performance of the covenants herein contained, the parties agree as follows:

1. **SERVICES TO BE RENDERED BY CONTRACTOR.** Upon written request by County's Director of Health and Human Services, Contractor will provide child welfare services delivered in the context of a child and family-centered, child and family team that shares responsibility to assess, plan, intervene, monitor and refine services over time pursuant to Welfare and Institutions Code Sections 16501 and 16501.1(c)and(d) for Amador County Social Services Department Child Protective Services (the "Work"). The Work is more particularly described on **Attachment A** attached and incorporated by this reference. Contractor shall perform the Work in compliance with all statutes, ordinances, regulations and requirements of federal, state and local governing bodies applicable to the performance of the Work.
2. **SERVICES TO BE RENDERED BY COUNTY.** County agrees to compensate Contractor in return for performance of the Work as set forth in this Agreement.
3. **CHANGES IN SCOPE OF SERVICES.** Only the Amador County Board of Supervisors has the authority to agree to any extension of time, change order, change in the scope of work, change in the contract price, or other term or condition affecting either Contractor's or County's duties set forth herein. Adjustments in compensation, if any, shall be determined through negotiation between the parties to the Agreement and are subject to approval by the Board of Supervisors. Contractor acknowledges that no County staff person or County officer other than the Board of Supervisors has the power to amend the terms and conditions of this Agreement. Any change not so authorized in advance in writing by the Board of Supervisors shall be null and void.
4. **TERM; EARLY TERMINATION OF AGREEMENT.**

- 4.1 This Agreement shall commence on January 1, 2018, and shall terminate on June 30, 2019, unless extended in writing by mutual agreement of the parties. County reserves the right to terminate this Agreement with or without cause on sixty days (60 days) written notice to Contractor. In the case of such early termination, Contractor shall be paid for all services satisfactorily rendered up to the effective date of termination, up to the maximum fee prescribed for any task. Services may be extended for two (2) consecutive years pending mutual agreement by both parties.
- 4.2 County shall have the right to terminate this Agreement upon three (3) days written notice in the event that the receipt of funds from the State is reduced, suspended, or terminated for any reason. Contractor hereby expressly waives any and all claims against County for damages arising from said termination, suspension, or reduction of funds. County shall honor all legitimate obligations incurred by Contractor if the Agreement is terminated by activating this clause.
- 4.3 The County may immediately terminate this Agreement upon written notice to Contractor in the event Contractor, or any or its employees or subconsultants, fails to provide, in any manner, the services required under this Agreement or otherwise fails to comply with the terms of this Agreement.

5. COMPENSATION TO CONTRACTOR; PAYMENT.

- 5.1 Contractor shall be paid for services rendered with a cost-not-to-exceed limit of \$15,000 for the remainder of fiscal year 2017-2018 and \$30,000 for the fiscal year 2018-2019 in accordance with the fee schedule set forth on **Attachment B** attached and incorporated by this reference. In no event shall compensation to Contractor exceed for any portion of the Work the amounts set forth on **Attachment B**.
- 5.2 County shall make payment to Contractor within thirty (30) days of the invoice for payment, based upon the services described on the invoice and in an amount properly allowed by the County.
- 5.3 In the event Contractor claims or received payment from County for a service for which reimbursement is later disallowed by County, state or federal agencies, Contractor shall promptly refund the disallowed amount to County upon request or, at County's option, County may offset the amount disallowed from any payment that is due or becomes due to Contractor under this Agreement or any other agreement.
- 5.4 Contractor shall provide a completed W-9 to the Auditor's Office. No payments shall be issued prior to submission of this form.

6. SUPERVISION OF THE WORK.

- 6.1 Contractor shall supervise and direct the Work, using Contractor's best skill and attention. Contractor shall be solely responsible for all methods, techniques, sequences and procedures, and shall coordinate all portions of the Work. County will deal only through Contractor, who shall be responsible for the proper execution of the entire Work.

- 6.2 Contractor shall be responsible to County for the acts and omissions of Contractor's employees, subcontractors, and their agents and employees, and any other persons performing any of the Work under a contract with Contractor.
- 6.3 Contractor shall assign only competent personnel to perform any portion of the Work. If at any time County, in its sole discretion, desires the removal of any person or persons assigned by Contractor to perform the Work, Contractor shall remove such person or persons immediately upon receiving written notice from County. If any person is identified in this Agreement (or any attachment hereto), Contractor shall not remove, replace, substitute, or otherwise change any key personnel without the prior written consent of County.
- 6.4 A subcontractor ("Subcontractor") is a person or organization that has a direct contract with Contractor to perform any of the Work. Contractor shall not subcontract any portion of the Work unless pre-approved in writing by County. Contractor agrees that it is as fully responsible to County for the acts and omissions of Subcontractors and of persons either directly or indirectly employed by Contractor as it is for the acts and omissions of persons directly employed by it. Nothing contained in this Agreement or any other document associated with the performance of the work shall create any contractual relation between any Subcontractor and County.
- 6.5 Contractor agrees to bind every Subcontractor and every Subcontractor agrees to be bound by the terms of this Agreement as to that portion of the Work performed by Subcontractor, unless specifically noted to the contrary in a subcontract approved in writing by County. Subcontractor agrees to be bound to the Contractor by the terms of this Agreement and to assume toward Contractor all of the obligations and responsibilities that the Contractor assumes toward County. Contractor agrees to be bound to the Subcontractor by all of the obligations that County assumes to Contractor under this Agreement as to the portion of the Work performed by Subcontractor.
7. CONFERENCES, VISITS TO SITE, INSPECTION OF WORK. In the event it should become necessary for the State or County to hold any conference or visit the site of the proposed work, as a part of any such conference, Contractor shall cooperate fully with the parties involved and shall arrange for qualified representatives of Contractor, upon request of County, to attend any such conference or visit to the site as a part thereof.
8. ASSIGNMENTS. Neither party may assign, sublet, or transfer its interest in this Agreement without the written consent of the other.
9. CONTRACTOR NOT EMPLOYEE OF COUNTY. It is understood that neither Contractor nor any employee of Contractor is acting hereunder as an employee of County, but solely as an independent contractor. Contractor, by virtue of this Agreement, has no authority to bind or incur any obligation on behalf of County. Except as expressly provided in this Agreement, Contractor has no authority or responsibility to exercise any rights or power vested in County. It is understood by both Contractor and County that this Agreement shall not under any circumstances be construed or considered to create an employer-employee relationship or a joint venture.

10. LICENSES, PERMITS, ETC; SANCTIONED EMPLOYEES.

- 10.1 Contractor represents and warrants to County that it and all of its employees providing services under this Agreement have all licenses, permits, qualifications, and approvals of whatsoever nature that are legally required for Contractor to practice its profession and to perform the Work. Contractor represents and warrants to County that Contractor shall, at its sole cost and expense, keep in effect at all times during the term of this Agreement any license, permits, and approvals that are legally required for Contractor and its employees to practice its profession and perform the Work. Contractor further represents and warrants to County that any Subcontractor engaged by Contractor to perform a portion of the Work shall similarly possess all licenses, permits, qualifications, and approvals of whatsoever nature that are legally required for the Subcontractor to perform the portion of the Work that is the subject of the subcontract at issue.
- 10.2 Contractor shall immediately notify County in the event Contractor or any of its employees, volunteers, interns, subcontractors or providers retained in any capacity by Contractor is under investigation by a licensing board, is found to be in violation of any rules or regulations of the licensing board, or is the subject of a disciplinary action.
- 10.3 Contractor shall not employ in any capacity or retain as a subcontractor any individual or entity that is listed on either the Suspended and Ineligible Contractor List published by the California Department of Health Services, or any debarment list published by the Federal Office of the Inspector General with regard to Medicaid or Medicare programs. Contractor shall periodically review any such lists to confirm the status of Contractor's then current employees or subcontractors. If Contractor does employ or subcontract with an individual or entity on any such lists, Contractor shall be fully responsible for any associated penalties, sanctions, losses or damages that may be imposed on County therefor.

11. INSURANCE.

- 11.1 Minimum Scope and Limit of Insurance: Contractor shall procure and maintain for the duration of the contract insurance against claims for injuries to persons or damages to property which may arise from or in connection with the performance of the work hereunder by the Contractor, its agents, representatives, or employees.

Coverage shall be at least as broad as:

- 11.1.1 Commercial General Liability (CGL): Insurance Services Office Form CG 00 01 covering CGL on an "occurrence" basis, including products and completed operations, property damage, bodily injury and personal & advertising injury with limits no less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence. If a general aggregate limit applies, either the general aggregate limit shall apply separately to this project/location (ISO CG 25 03 or 25 04) or the general aggregate limit shall be twice the required occurrence limit.

11.1.2 Automobile Liability: Insurance Services Office Form Number CA 0001 covering, Code 1 (any auto), or if Contractor has no owned autos, Code 8 (hired) and 9 (non-owned), with limit no less than \$1,000,000 per accident for bodily injury and property damage.

11.1.3 Worker's Compensation insurance as required by the State of California, with Statutory Limits, and Employer's Liability Insurance with limit of no less than \$1,000,000 per accident for bodily injury or disease.

(If Contractor has no employees a Certificate of Exemption from Worker's Compensation Laws must be completed using the County's form and submitted with all other insurance documents).

11.1.4 Professional Liability (Errors and Omissions) Insurance appropriate to the Contractor's profession, with limit no less than \$2,000,000 per occurrence or claim, \$2,000,000 aggregate.

The insurance policies are to contain, or be endorsed to contain, the following provisions:

11.2 Claims Made Policies: If any of the required policies provide coverage on a claims-made basis:

- a. The Retroactive Date must be shown and must be before the date of the contract or the beginning of contract work.
- b. 11.2.2 Insurance must be maintained and evidence of insurance must be provided for at least five (5) years after completion of the contract of work.
- c. If coverage is canceled or non-renewed, and not replaced with another claims-made policy form with a Retroactive Date prior to the contract effective date, the Contractor must purchase "extended reporting" coverage for a minimum of five (5) years after completion of contract work.

11.3 Broader Coverage: If the Contractor maintains broader coverage and/or higher limits than the minimums shown above, the County requires and shall be entitled to the broader coverage and/or higher limits maintained by the Contractor. Any available insurance proceeds in excess of the specified minimum limits of insurance and coverage shall be available to the County.

11.4 Verification of Coverage: Contractor shall furnish the County with Certificates of Insurance including all required amendatory endorsements (or copies of the applicable policy language effecting coverage required by this clause) and a copy of the Declarations and Endorsement Page of the CGL policy listing all policy endorsements to County before work begins. However, failure to obtain the required documents prior to the work beginning shall not waive the Contractor's obligation to provide them. The County reserves the right to require complete, certified copies of all required insurance policies, including endorsements required by these specifications, at any time. Certificates and endorsements shall refer to the Project or Work. Certificates of

Insurance shall list the Certificates Holder as: County of Amador; General Services Administration; Attn: Jon Hopkins, Contract Administrator; 12200-B Airport Road; Jackson, CA 95642-9527. Contractor shall provide all insurance documentation to the Contract Administrator.

- 11.5 **Notice of Cancellation:** Each insurance policy required above shall state that coverage shall not be cancelled, except with notice to the County.
- 11.6 **Additional Insured Status:** The County, its officers, officials, employees, and volunteers are to be covered as additional insureds on the CGL policy with respect to liability arising out of work or operations performed by or on behalf of the Contractor including materials, parts, or equipment furnished in connection with such work or operations. General liability coverage can be provided in the form of an endorsement to the Contractor's insurance (at least as broad as ISO Form CG 20 10 11 85 or both CG 20 10, CG 20 26, CG 20 33, or CG 20 38; and CG 20 37 forms if later revisions used).
- 11.7 **Primary Coverage:** For any claims related to this contract, the Contractor's insurance coverage shall be primary insurance primary coverage at least as broad as ISO CG 20 01 04 13 as respects the County, its officers, officials, employees, and volunteers. Any insurance or self-insurance maintained by the County, its officers, officials, employees, or volunteers shall be excess of the Contractor's insurance and shall not contribute with it.
- 11.8 **Subcontractors:** Contractor shall require and verify that all subcontractors maintain insurance meeting all the requirements stated herein, and Contractor shall ensure that County is an additional insured on insurance required from subcontractors.
- 11.9 **Self-Insured Retentions:** Self-insured retentions must be declared to and approved by the County. The County may require the Contractor to provide proof of ability to pay losses and related investigations, claim administration, and defense expenses within the retention. The policy language shall provide, or be endorsed to provide, that the self-insured retention may be satisfied by either the named insured or County.
- 11.10 **Waiver of Subrogation:** Contractor hereby grants to County a waiver of any right to subrogation which any insurer of said Contractor may acquire against the County by virtue of the payment of any loss under such insurance. Contractor agrees to obtain any endorsement that may be necessary to affect this waiver of subrogation, but this provision applies regardless of whether or not the County has received a waiver of subrogation endorsement from the insurer.
- 11.11 **Special Risks or Circumstances:** County reserves the right to modify these requirements, including limits, based on the nature of the risk, prior experience, insurer, coverage, or other special circumstances.
- 11.12 **Acceptability of Insurers:** Insurance is to be placed with insurers authorized to conduct business in the state with a current A.N. Best's rating of no less than A:VII, unless otherwise acceptable to the County.

12. INDEMNIFICATION. Contractor agrees to indemnify, defend (upon request of County) and hold harmless County and County's agents, board members, elected and appointed officials and officers, employees, volunteers and authorized representatives from any and all losses, liabilities, charges, damages, claims, liens, causes of action, awards, judgments, costs, and expenses (including, but not limited to, reasonable attorney's fees of County Counsel and counsel retained by County, expert fees, costs and staff time, and investigation costs) of whatever kind or nature (collectively "Claims"), that arise out of or are in any way connected with any negligent error, act or omission of Contractor or Contractor's officers, agents, employees, independent contractors, subcontractors, or authorized representatives, unless resulting from the sole negligence, active negligence, or willful misconduct of an indemnified party. Without limiting the generality of the foregoing, the same shall include injury or death to any person or persons; damage to any property, regardless of where located, including the property of County; and any workers' compensation claim or suit arising from or connected with any services performed pursuant to this Agreement on behalf of Contractor by any person or entity.

13. DOCUMENTS AND RECORDS.

13.1 Contractor shall keep and maintain full and complete documentation and accounting records concerning the Work. Records shall include without limitation all medical records, accounting records and administrative record related to services provided hereunder. Contractor shall preserve these records for a period of at least seven (7) years following the close of the County fiscal year in which the services were rendered; provided, however, that if an audit has been started, records must be retained until completion and final resolution of any and all issues that may arise. Final settlement shall be made at the end of the audit and appeal process. All accounting records shall be maintained so that they clearly reflect the source of funding for each type of service for which reimbursement is claimed by Contractor. Accounting records include without limitation ledgers, books, vouchers, time sheets, payrolls, appointment schedules, client data cards and schedules for allocating costs.

13.2 Contractor shall permit County and any authorized state or federal agency to audit, inspect and copy all records, notes and writings of any kind in connection with the Work, to the extent permitted by law, for the purpose of monitoring the quality and quantity of services, accessibility and appropriateness of services, and ensuring fiscal accountability. All such audits, inspections, and copying shall occur during normal business hours. Upon request, Contractor shall provide copies of such records to County. Where required by law, Contractor shall obtain necessary releases to permit County or other governmental or accrediting agencies to access patient medical records.

13.3 Contractor shall provide to County a copy of any audits performed with respect to the Work no later than thirty (30) days after completion of the audit report. Contractor shall include in any agreement(s) with auditing firms a clause that will allow access by County and state and federal agencies to the working papers of the external independent auditor.

13.4 If Contractor is a Medi-Cal provider, Contractor shall provide a copy to County of any

year-end cost report documenting actual contract expenditures funded by this Agreement.

- 13.5 Upon completion or termination of this Agreement, County shall be entitled to immediate possession of, and Contractor shall furnish, on request, any plans, correspondence and other pertinent data gathered or prepared by Contractor for the Work prior to termination. Contractor may retain copies of such original documents for Contractor's files.

14. NON-DISCRIMINATION; CULTURAL COMPETENCY; RESIDENCY.

14.1 Contractor shall provide all services under this Agreement without discrimination, and shall not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment, on the basis of race, religious creed, color, national origin, ancestry, physical disability, mental disability, medical condition, marital status, sex, age, or sexual orientation. Contractor will comply with Section 1735 of the Labor Code and all provisions of Executive Order No. 10925 of March 6, 1961, as amended, and all rules, regulations and relevant orders of the President's Committee on Equal Opportunity created thereby. Contractor shall also comply with the California Fair Employment and Housing Act (Government Code, Section 12900 and following).

14.2 Contractor shall provide culturally sensitive services and language interpretation to County beneficiaries when necessary to insure the provision of culturally competent treatment services.

14.3 County residency is a basic eligibility requirement for services rendered under this Agreement; however, transients referred by County in an emergency or persons in involuntary status may also be provided services if requested by County and approved by Contractor.

15. ALCOHOL-FREE AND DRUG-FREE WORK PLACE POLICY. Contractor acknowledges they have obtained and read a copy of the County's policy regarding alcohol free and drug free workplace, available for review at: Amadorgov.org/Policies, which is hereby made a part of and incorporated herein by reference into this Contract. Contractor shall execute the policy acknowledgment attached hereto as **Attachment C**.

16. HIPAA COMPLIANCE. The parties acknowledge the existence of the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996 and its implementing regulations ("HIPAA"). Amador County Health Services Department, Social Services Division ("ACHSD") is an entity covered by HIPAA [45 C.F.R. Parts 160, 162, and 164], and County is a "hybrid entity" under HIPAA.

Through the Business Associate Agreement ("BAA"), ACHSD and Contractor have obligations with respect to the confidentiality, privacy, and security of patients' medical information, and must take certain steps to preserve the confidentiality of this information, including the establishment of proper procedures for the release of such information as required by HIPAA.

Each party hereby represents that it is and shall remain in compliance with the rules and

regulations of HIPAA. Pursuant to sections 160.103, 164.502(e), 164.504(a), and 164.504(e) of HIPAA, Contractor must enter into a BAA with ACHSD, a copy of which is attached hereto as **Attachment D** attached and incorporated by this reference. Failure or refusal of a party to execute a BAA when required by law shall constitute a basis for termination of this Agreement in its entirety.

The Contractor shall, immediately upon discovery of an unauthorized disclosure or breach of privacy and/or security of Personal Identifiable Information and/or Protected Health Information by Contractor, notify County of such breach within 1 business day of discovery at (209 223-6412. Contractor shall take prompt corrective action to cure any deficiencies and any action pertaining to such unauthorized disclosure required by Federal and State laws and regulations. Contractor shall investigate such breach and provide a written report of the investigation to the Privacy Officer, postmarked within fifteen (15) working days of the discovery of the breach to the following address:

In the event the County is obligated to pay any costs associated with an unauthorized disclosure or breach of privacy and/or security of Personal Identifiable Information and/or Protected Health Information by Contractor, Contractor shall pay on County's behalf any and all such costs arising.

17. NOTICES. All notices herein provided to be given, or which may be given, by either party to the other, shall be deemed to have been fully given when made in writing and deposited in the United States Postal Services, certified with return receipt requested, with postage prepaid and addressed as follows:

The address to which notice shall or may be mailed, as aforesaid, to either party shall or may be changed by written notice given by such party or the other, as hereinbefore provided, but nothing herein contained shall preclude the giving of any such notice by personal service.

18. **CONTRACT EXECUTION.** Each individual executing this Agreement on behalf of Contractor represents that he or she is fully authorized to execute and deliver this Agreement. If Contractor is a corporation, limited liability company, or general or limited partnership, Contractor shall, within thirty (30) days after execution of this Agreement, deliver to County a certified copy of a resolution of the Board of Directors or partner or member authorization of Contractor authorizing or ratifying the execution of this Agreement.
19. **CONSTRUED PURSUANT TO CALIFORNIA LAW; VENUE.** The parties hereto agree that the provisions of this Agreement will be construed pursuant to the laws of the State of California. Venue for all litigation relative to the formation, interpretation and performance of this Agreement shall be in Amador County, California.
20. **INCORPORATION OF AGREEMENTS AND AMENDMENTS.** This Agreement contains all agreements of the parties with respect to any matter mentioned herein. No other Agreement or understanding pertaining to any such matter shall be effective, unless in writing signed by the party to be charged. This Agreement may be modified by the parties hereto only in writing and signed by both parties.
21. **SEVERABILITY.** The invalidity of any provision of this Agreement, as determined by a court of competent jurisdiction, shall in no way affect the validity of any other provision hereof.
22. **TIME OF ESSENCE.** Time is hereby expressly declared to be the essence of this Agreement and of each and every provision thereof, and each such provision is hereby made and declared to be a material, necessary, and essential part of this Agreement.
23. **RETENTION OF RECORDS.** Pursuant to Government Code section 8546.7, the performance of any work under this Agreement is subject to the examination and audit of the State Auditor at the request of County or as part of any audit of County for a period of three years after final payment under the Agreement. Each party hereto shall retain all records relating to the performance of the Work and the administration of the Agreement for three years after final payment hereunder.
24. **CONFLICT OF INTEREST.** Contractor warrants and represents that it presently has no interest and covenants that it will not acquire any interest, direct or indirect, that represents a financial conflict of interest under state law or that would otherwise conflict in any manner or degree with the performance of the Work. Contractor further agrees that in the performance of this Agreement no person having any such interest shall be employed by Contractor.

ATTACHMENT D – BUSINESS ASSOCIATE AGREEMENT

This Business Associate Agreement (“BAA”) is effective upon execution, and is appended to the Services Agreement (“Agreement”) dated as of _____, 2018, made and entered into by and between the COUNTY OF AMADOR, a political subdivision of the State of California (the “County”) and SIERRA CHILD AND FAMILY SERVICES, Inc., a California Corporation (the “Contractor”).

RECITALS

A. Amador County has entered into the Agreement whereby SIERRA CHILD AND FAMILY SERVICES, Inc., a California Corporation (the “Contractor”) (“Business Associate”) will establish and implement appropriate privacy and security safeguards with respect to “protected health information” (as defined below) that the Business Associate may create, receive, maintain, transmit, use or disclose in connection with the services to be provided by the Business Associate to Amador County Health Services Department, Social Services Division (the “Covered Entity”), and that such safeguards will be consistent with the standards set forth in regulations promulgated under the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996 (HIPAA) as amended by the Health Information Technology for Economic and Clinical Health Act of 2009, (HITECH). All references to regulatory Sections, Parts and Subparts in this Agreement are to Title 45 of the Code of Federal Regulations as in effect or as amended, and for which compliance is required, unless otherwise specified.

B. Under the terms of the Agreement, the Covered Entity may make available and/or transfer to the Business Associate, and/or the Business Associate will generate or otherwise access confidential, personally identifiable health information in conjunction with services delivered on behalf of the Covered Entity.

C. This confidential information may be used or disclosed only in accordance with HIPAA and the applicable regulations [including, but not limited to, 45 Code of Federal Regulations sections 164.502(e) and 164.504(e)] issued pursuant to HIPAA and the terms of this BAA, HITECH regulations, or more stringent provisions of State or Federal laws.

D. Pursuant to Amador County Board of Supervisors Resolution No. 04-253, the Director of the Amador County Health Services Department is duly authorized to execute a Business Associate Agreement with Contractor, as required by HIPAA.

NOW, THEREFOR, in consideration of the obligations, benefits, and compensation provided to Business Associate under the provisions of the Agreement, and in order to ensure that it remains valid and complies with HIPAA, the parties agree as follows:

1. Definitions.
 - a. Breach shall have the meaning given to such term under the HITECH Act [42 U.S.C. Section 17921]
 - b. Business Associate shall have the meaning given to such term under the Privacy Rule, the Security Rule and the HITECH Act, including,

- but not limited to, 42 U.S.C. Section 17938 and 45 C.F.R. Section 160.103
- c. Covered Entity shall have the meaning given to such term under the Privacy Rule and the Security Rule, including, but not limited to, 45 C.F.R. Section 160.103
 - d. Designated Record Set shall have the meaning given to such term under the Privacy Rule, including, but not limited to 45 C.F. R. Section 164.501
 - e. Electronic Protected Health Information shall mean Protected Health Information that is maintained in or transmitted by electronic media
 - f. Electronic Health Record shall have the meaning given to such term in the HITECH Act, including, but not limited to, 42 U.S.C. Section 17921
 - g. HIPAA Rules shall mean the Privacy, Security, Breach Notification, and Enforcement Rules at 45 C.F.R. Part 160 and Part 164
 - h. Individual shall have the same meaning as the term in Section 164.501 and shall include a person who qualifies as a personal representative in accordance with Section 164.502(g)
 - i. Minimum Necessary shall mean the minimum amount of Protected Health Information necessary for the intended purpose, as set forth at Sections 164.502(b) and 164.514(d)
 - j. Protected Health Information or PHI shall have the same meaning as the term in Section 160.103, limited to the information received from Covered Entity or created, received, maintained, or transmitted by Business Associate on behalf of Covered Entity
 - k. Subcontractor shall mean a subcontractor of Business Associate that creates, receives, maintains, or transmits Protected Health Information on behalf of the Business Associate
 - l. Unsecured PHI shall have the same meaning as the term defined in Section 164.402, limited to the information received from Covered Entity or created, received, maintained, or transmitted by Business Associate on behalf of Covered Entity

2. Business Associate's Obligations and Compliance with HIPAA Privacy and Security Rules. Business Associate acknowledges that it is directly required to comply with the HIPAA Rules and that Business Associate (including its subcontractors) may be held directly liable and subject to penalties for failure to comply. Business Associate agrees not to use or further disclose PHI other than as permitted or required by this BAA, or as required by law. In meeting its obligations under this section, it is understood that Business Associate is not acting as the Covered Entity's agent. In performance of the work, duties and obligations and in the exercise of the rights granted under this BAA, it is understood and agreed that Business Associate is at all times acting as an independent contractor in providing services pursuant to the BAA and the Agreement.

Permitted Uses and Disclosure Except as otherwise provided in this BAA, the Business Associate may use or disclose PHI to perform functions, activities or services for or on behalf of the Covered Entity as specified in the Agreement, provided that such use or disclosure would not violate HIPAA and its implementing

regulations. The Business Associate may use and disclose the minimum necessary PHI for its proper management, administrative, and legal responsibilities as follows:

A. The Business Associate may use the minimum necessary PHI for the Business Associate's proper management and administration, or to carry out Business Associate's legal responsibilities.

B. The Business Associate may disclose the minimum necessary PHI for the Business Associate's proper management and administration, or to carry out the Business Associate's legal responsibilities only if:

(1) The disclosure is required by law; or

(2) The Business Associate obtains reasonable assurances, evidenced in writing, from the person to whom the PHI is being disclosed that the PHI will be held confidentially and used or further disclosed only as required by law or for the purpose for which it was disclosed to the person; and

(3) The person promptly notifies the Business Associate (who will in turn promptly notify the Covered Entity) of any instances of which it is aware in which the confidentiality of the PHI has been breached.

3. Further Disclosure of PHI. The Business Associate shall not use or further disclose any PHI that is created, received, maintained or transmitted on behalf of the Covered Entity, except as permitted or required by the Agreement, or as required by law.

4. Safeguarding PHI. The Business Associate shall develop, implement, maintain and use appropriate administrative, technical and physical safeguards to prevent the improper use or disclosure of any PHI that is created, received, maintained or transmitted on behalf of the Covered Entity for any purpose other than those expressly permitted under the Agreement. Business Associate agrees to comply with Subpart C of 45 C.F.R. Part 164 with respect to Electronic Protected Health Information. Business Associate must secure all Electronic Protected Health Information by technological means that render such information unusable, unreadable, or indecipherable to unauthorized individuals. Destruction of Protected Health Information on paper, film or other hard copy media must involve either shredding or otherwise destroying the PHI so that it cannot be read or reconstructed. Should any employee or subcontractor of Business Associate have direct, authorized access to computer systems of Covered Entity that contain PHI, Business Associate shall immediately notify Covered Entity of any change of such personal in order for Covered Entity to disable the previously authorized access.

5. Unauthorized Use or Disclosure of PHI. Business Associate agrees to mitigate, to the greatest extent possible, any harm that results from the breach, security incident, or unauthorized access, use or disclosure of PHI by Business Associate or its employees, officers, subcontractors, agents or other representatives. Following a breach, security incident, or any unauthorized access, use or disclosure of PHI, Business Associate agrees to take any and all corrective action necessary to prevent recurrence, to document any such action, and to make this documentation available

to Covered Entity. Except as required by law, Business Associate agrees that it will not inform any third party of a breach or unauthorized access, use or disclosure of PHI without obtaining the Covered Entity's prior written consent. Covered Entity hereby reserves the sole right to determine whether and how such notice is to be provided to any individuals, regulatory agencies, or other as may be require by law. When applicable law requires the breach be reported to a federal or state agency or that notice be given to media outlets, Business Associate shall cooperate with and coordinate with Covered Entity to ensure such reporting is in compliance with applicable law and to prevent duplicate reporting, and to determine responsibilities for reporting. The Business Associate shall report to the Covered Entity any use or disclosure of the PHI not authorized in the Agreement or required by law of which it becomes aware, including any breach as required in Section 164.410 or security incident. In such report, the Business Associate shall:

- A. Identify the nature of the unauthorized use or disclosure;
- B. Identify the PHI used or disclosed;
- C. Identify who made the unauthorized use or received the unauthorized disclosure;
- D. Identify what the Business Associate has done or will do to mitigate any negative effects of the unauthorized use or disclosure;
- E. Identify what corrective action the Business Associate has taken or shall take to prevent future similar unauthorized use or disclosure; and
- F. Provide such other information, including a written report, as reasonably requested by the Covered Entity.

6. Subcontractors and Agents. The Business Associate shall require each of its subcontractors or agents to which the Business Associate provides PHI that is created, received, maintained or transmitted by the Business Associate on behalf of the Covered Entity, to comply with the same restrictions and conditions that apply through this BAA to the Business Associate with respect to such information, including the requirement to immediately notify the Business Associate of any instances of any breach, security incident, intrusion, or unauthorized access to or use or disclosure of PHI of which it becomes aware. Upon request, Business Associate shall provide copies of such agreements to Covered Entity. Business Associate shall implement and maintain sanctions against any agent, subcontractor or other representative that violates such restrictions, conditions or requirements and shall mitigate the effects of any such violation.

7. Access to PHI. The Business Associate shall provide an Individual access to PHI in a Designated Record Set as required by 45 Code of Federal Regulations section 164.524; and at the request of the Covered Entity, and in the time and manner designated by the Covered Entity, the Business Associate shall provide access to PHI

in a Designated Record Set to Covered Entity or, as directed by Covered Entity, to an Individual.

8. Amendments to Designated Record Sets. The Business Associate shall make any amendment(s) to PHI in a Designated Record Set that the Covered Entity directs or at the request of the Individual, and in the time and manner designated by the Covered Entity in accordance with 45 Code of Federal Regulations section 164.526. If amendment to PHI is made by the request of an Individual to the Business Associate, the Business Associate shall notify the Covered Entity.

9. Accounting of Disclosure. Business Associate shall provide to an Individual information collected in accordance with 45 Code of Federal Regulations section 164.528; and Business Associate shall provide to the Covered Entity information collected in accordance with 45 Code of Regulations section 164.528, to permit Covered Entity to respond to a request by an Individual for an accounting of disclosures of PHI in accordance with 45 Code of Federal Regulations section 164.528.

10. Inspection of Books and Records. The Business Associate shall make available its internal practices, books and records related to the use, disclosure and privacy protection of PHI received from the Covered Entity, or created and received by the Business Associate on behalf of the Covered Entity, available to any state or federal agency, including the Secretary of the United States Department of Health and Human Services for purposes of determining compliance with the privacy requirements and any related regulations or official guidance, in the time and manner designated by the Covered Entity or the Secretary. With reasonable notice, Covered Entity and its authorized agents or contractors may audit and/or examine Business Associate's facilities, systems, policies, procedures and documentation to determine compliance with the terms of this BAA. Business Associate shall promptly correct any violation of this BAA found by Covered Entity and shall certify in writing that the correction has been made. Covered Entity's failure to detect any unsatisfactory practice does not constitute acceptance of the practice or a waiver of Covered Entity's enforcement rights under this BAA.

11. Return or Destruction of PHI. Upon termination of the Agreement for any reason, the Business Associate shall:

A. Return or destroy all PHI received from the Covered Entity, or created or received by the Business Associate on behalf of the Covered Entity that the Business Associate still maintains in any form and retain no copies of such information, if feasible.

B. In the event that the Business Associate determines that returning or destroying the PHI is not feasible, the Business Associate shall provide the Covered Entity notification of the conditions that make return or destruction not feasible. If the Covered Entity agrees that return or destruction is not feasible, the Business Associate shall extend the protections of this BAA to such PHI and limit further use and disclosures of such PHI for as long as the Business Associate, or any of its agents or subcontractors, maintains such PHI for the purposes that make return or destruction infeasible.

12. Termination of Agreement. If the Covered Entity determines that the Business Associate has violated a material term of this BAA, the Covered Entity is authorized to terminate the Agreement.

13. Amendment. The terms of this BAA are subject to changes in the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act that may take effect at a time subsequent to the effective date of this BAA, and which shall be incorporated into this BAA by way of amendment executed by and between the Covered Entity and the Business Associate.

14. Conflicts. The terms and conditions of this BAA will override and control any conflicting term or condition of the Agreement. All non-conflicting terms and conditions of Agreement shall remain in full force and effect.

RE: Dispense with the bidding procedures and approve utilizing CA 9-1-1 funds to upgrade current Console Furniture Stations at the Sheriff's Dispatch Office

Background: Every five (5) years the State of California, California 9-1-1 Emergency Communications Office allocates monies to public safety centers for 9-1-1 equipment updates and replacement. This five (5) year cycle the State of California 9-1-1 System allocated a total of \$255,000.00 for the replacement of four (4) Vesta 9-1-1 Telephone positions and three (3) full Console Furniture Stations vital for the 9-1-1 Communication Center at the Amador County Sheriff's Office. The four (4) Vesta 9-1-1 Telephone positions have recently been acquired (\$201,106.26) and the Sheriff's office is now requesting the three (3) Dispatch Console Furniture Stations (\$46,442.66).

Subject or Key Issue: Dispense with the bidding procedures in accordance with Title 3 Revenue and Finance Chapter 3.08 Section 3.08.200 Dispensing with Bids and approve utilization of State Contract 4-08-71-0077C.

Analysis: The County's current dispatch stations are outdated and in need of ergonomic upgrades. The Console Furniture Stations will include various upgrades including the sit/stand console. The furniture will be paid for entirely by the State of California with State Emergency Telephone Number Account ("SETNA") funds. The contractor that will be providing and installing the Console Furniture Stations, Russ Bassett, was chosen through a competitive Invitation for Bid (IFB) process conducted by the State. Said IFB includes the standards of performance of the contract between the State and Russ Bassett for the provision and installation of the Console Furniture Stations. In order for the Console Furniture Stations to be installed, the County must accept the equipment by signing the quote and provide a purchase order showing all of the equipment that will be purchased. The purchase order will allow SETNA funds to be expended on the County's behalf, and will show the cost of each piece of equipment. The sample purchase order, Multiple Award Schedule and Russ Bassett quote are attached.

Alternative: N/A

Fiscal or Staffing Impact: There will be no impact to the general fund. The project will be funded by the State of California 9-1-1 CPE (Customer Premise Equipment) fund. The cost in the amount of \$39,192.66 will be billed and paid directly for by the State of California. The remaining \$7,250.00 will be paid by the Sheriff's Office to the vendor and reimbursed by the State. This is due to the contract not covering shipping and handling; however there are sufficient State funds that cover those cost via a reimbursement process.

NOTE: The Department of General Services auditors will request substantiation of compliance with this requirement when agency files are reviewed.

In response to our commitment to increase participation by small businesses, the Department of General Services **waives the administrative fee (a fee currently charged to customer agencies to support the CMAS program) for orders to certified small business enterprises.**

SMALL BUSINESS/DVBE - TRACKING

State agencies are able to claim subcontracting dollars towards their small business or DVBE goals whenever the Contractor subcontracts a commercially useful function to a certified small business or DVBE. The Contractor will provide the ordering agency with the name of the small business or DVBE used and the dollar amount the ordering agency can apply towards its small business or DVBE goal.

SMALL BUSINESS/DVBE - SUBCONTRACTING

1. The amount an ordering agency can claim towards achieving its small business or DVBE goals is the dollar amount of the subcontract award made by the Contractor to each small business or DVBE.
2. The Contractor will provide an ordering agency with the following information at the time the order is quoted:
 - a. The Contractor will state that, as the prime Contractor, it shall be responsible for the overall execution of the fulfillment of the order.
 - b. The Contractor will indicate to the ordering agency how the order meets the small business or DVBE goal, as follows:

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- List the name of each company that is certified by the Office of Small Business and DVBE Certification that it intends to subcontract a commercially useful function to; and
- Include the small business or DVBE certification number of each company listed, and attach a copy of each certification; and
- Indicate the dollar amount of each subcontract with a small business or DVBE that may be claimed by the ordering agency towards the small business or DVBE goal; and
- Indicate what commercially useful function the small business or DVBE subcontractor will be providing towards fulfillment of the order.

3. The ordering agency's purchase order must be addressed to the prime Contractor, and the purchase order must reference the information provided by the prime Contractor as outlined above.

NEW EQUIPMENT REQUIRED

The State will procure new equipment. All equipment must be new (or warranted as newly manufactured) and the latest model in current production. Used, shopworn, demonstrator, prototype, or discontinued models are not acceptable.

Where Federal Energy Management Program (FEMP) standards are available, all State agencies shall purchase only those products that meet the recommended standards. All products displaying the Energy Star label meet the FEMP standards.

SPECIAL MANUFACTURED GOODS

Any contract for goods to be manufactured by the contractor specifically for the State and not suitable for sale to others may require progress payments.

For Non-IT goods contracts, see the CMAS contract Non-IT Commodities Terms & Conditions, Provision 69, Progress Payments.

TRADE-IN EQUIPMENT

Trade-ins at open market price may be considered. The product description and trade-in allowance must be identified on the purchase order.

Agencies are required to adhere to SAM 3520 through 3520.6, Disposal of Personal Property and Surplus Personal Property, as applicable, when trade-ins are considered. A Property Survey Report, Std. 152, must be submitted for approval prior to disposition of any State-owned personal property, including general office furniture regardless of the acquisition value, or if the property was recorded or capitalized for accounting purposes.

OPEN MARKET/INCIDENTAL, NON-SCHEDULE ITEMS

The only time that open market/incidental, non-schedule items may be included in a CMAS order is when they fall under the parameters of the Not Specifically Priced (NSP) Items provision. If the NSP provision is not included in the schedule, or the products and/or services required do not qualify under the parameters of the NSP provision, the products and/or services must be procured separate from CMAS.

NOT SPECIFICALLY PRICED (NSP) ITEMS

Contractors must be authorized providers of the hardware, software and/or services they offer under the Not Specifically Priced (NSP) Items provision.

Agency and contractor use of the NSP provision is subject to the following requirements:

1. Purchase orders containing only NSP items are prohibited.
2. A purchase order containing NSP items may be issued only if it results in the lowest overall alternative to the State.
3. NSP items shall be clearly identified in the order. Any product or service already specifically priced and included in the contract may not be identified as an NSP item.
4. Maximum Order Limitation: For orders \$250,000, or less, the total dollar value of all NSP items included in a purchase order shall not exceed \$5,000. For orders exceeding \$250,000, and at the option of the contractor, the total dollar value of all NSP items in a purchase order shall not exceed 5% of the total cost of the order, or \$25,000 whichever is lower.
5. An NSP item included in an order issued against a contract is subject to all of the terms and conditions set forth in the contract.
6. Trade-ins, upgrades, involving the swapping of boards, are permissible, where the contract makes specific provisions for this action. In those instances where it is permitted, the purchase order must include the replacement item and a notation that the purchase involves the swapping of a board.

The following NSP items ARE SPECIFICALLY EXCLUDED from any order issued under this contract:

1. Items not intended for use in directly supporting the priced items included in the same order. An NSP item must be subordinate to the specifically priced item that it is supporting. For example, a cable, which is not otherwise specifically priced in the contract, is subordinate to a specifically priced printer or facsimile machine, and is eligible to be an NSP item subject to that cable meeting the

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remaining NSP requirements. However, a printer or facsimile machine, which is not otherwise specifically priced in the contract, is not subordinate to a specifically priced cable, and is not eligible to be an NSP item.

2. Supply type items, except for the minimum amount necessary to provide initial support to the priced items included in the same order.
3. Items that do not meet the Productive Use Requirements for information technology products, per the SCM, Volume 3, Chapter 2, Section 2.B6.2.
4. Any other item or class of items specifically excluded from the scope of this contract.
5. Public Works components NOT incidental to the total purchase order amount.
6. Products or services the contractor is NOT factory authorized or otherwise certified or trained to provide.
7. Follow-on consultant services that were previously recommended or suggested by the same contractor.

The contractor is required to reject purchase orders containing NSP items that do not conform to the above requirements. The contractor will promptly notify the agency issuing the non-conforming order of its non-acceptance and the reasons for its non-acceptance.

STATE AND LOCAL GOVERNMENTS CAN USE CMAS

State and local government agency use of CMAS contracts is optional. A local government is any city, county, city and county, district, or other local governmental body or corporation, including UC, CSU, K-12 schools and community colleges empowered to expend public funds. While the State makes this contract available, each local government agency should make its own determination whether the CMAS program is consistent with their procurement policies and regulations.

UPDATES AND/OR CHANGES

A CMAS amendment is not required for updates and/or changes once the update and/or change becomes effective for the federal GSA schedule, except as follows:

- A CMAS amendment is required when the contract is based on products and/or services from another contractor's multiple award contract and the contractor wants to add a new manufacturer's products and/or services.
- A CMAS amendment is required for new federal contract terms and conditions that constitute a material difference from existing contract terms and conditions. A material change has a potentially significant effect on the delivery, quantity or quality

of items provided, the amount paid to the contractor or on the cost to the State.

- A CMAS amendment is required for changes to contracts that require California Prison Industry Authority (CALPIA) approval.

A CMAS amendment is required to update and/or change terms and conditions and/or products and services based on a non-federal GSA multiple award contract.

SELF-DELETING FEDERAL GSA TERMS AND CONDITIONS

Instructions, or terms and conditions that appear in the Special Items or other provisions of the federal GSA and apply to the purchase, license, or rental (as applicable) of products or services by the U.S. Government in the United States, and/or to any overseas location shall be self-deleting. (Example: "Examinations of Records" provision).

Federal regulations and standards, such as Federal Acquisition Regulation (FAR), Federal Information Resources Management Regulation (FIRMR), Federal Information Processing Standards (FIPS), General Services Administration Regulation (GSAR), or Federal Installment Payment Agreement (FIPA) shall be self-deleting. Federal blanket orders and small order procedures are not applicable.

ORDER OF PRECEDENCE

The CMAS Terms and Conditions shall prevail if there is a conflict between the terms and conditions of the contractor's federal GSA, (or other multiple award contract), packaging, invoices, catalogs, brochures, technical data sheets or other documents (see CMAS Terms and Conditions, CONFLICT OF TERMS).

APPLICABLE CODES, POLICIES AND GUIDELINES

All California codes, policies, and guidelines are applicable. THE USE OF CMAS DOES NOT REDUCE OR RELIEVE STATE AGENCIES OF THEIR RESPONSIBILITY TO MEET STATEWIDE REQUIREMENTS REGARDING CONTRACTING OR THE PROCUREMENT OF GOODS OR SERVICES. Most procurement and contract codes, policies, and guidelines are incorporated into CMAS contracts. Nonetheless, there is no guarantee that every possible requirement that pertains to all the different and unique State processes has been included.

STATEWIDE PROCUREMENT REQUIREMENTS

Agencies must carefully review and adhere to all statewide procurement requirements in the SCM, Volumes 2 and 3, such as:

- Automated Accounting System requirements of State Administrative Manual (SAM) Section 7260-62
- Productive Use Requirements, per the SCM, Volume 3, Chapter 2, Section 2.B6.2.

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- SAM Sections 4819.41 and 4832 certifications for information technology procurements and compliance with policies.
- Services may not be paid for in advance.
- Agencies are required to file with the Department of Fair Employment and Housing (DFEH) a Contract Award Report Std. 16 for each order over \$5,000 within 10 days of award, including supplements that exceed \$5,000.
- Pursuant to Public Contract Code Section 10359 State agencies are to report all Consulting Services Contract activity for the preceding fiscal year to DGS and the six legislative committees and individuals that are listed on the annual memorandum from DGS.
- Pursuant to Unemployment Insurance Code Section 1088.8, State and local government agencies must report to the Employment Development Department (EDD) all payments for services that equal \$600 or more to independent sole proprietor contractors. See the Contractor's Std. 204, Payee Data Record, to determine sole proprietorship. For inquiries regarding this subject, contact EDD at (916) 651-6945 for technical questions or (888) 745-3886 for information and forms.
- Annual small business and disabled veteran reports.
- Post evaluation reports. Public Contract Code 10369 requires State agencies to prepare post evaluations on form Std. 4 for all completed non-IT consulting services contracts of more than \$5,000. Copies of negative evaluations for non-IT consulting services only must be sent to the DGS, Office of Legal Services. The Bureau of State Audits requires State agencies annually to certify compliance with these requirements.

ETHNICITY/RACE/GENDER REPORTING REQUIREMENT

Effective January 1, 2007, in accordance with Public Contract Code 10111, State agencies are to capture information on ethnicity, race, and gender of business owners (not subcontractors) for all awarded contracts, including CAL-Card transactions. Each department is required to independently report this information to the Governor and the Legislature on an annual basis.

Agencies are responsible for developing their own guidelines and forms for collecting and reporting this information,

Contractor participation is voluntary.

PAYMENTS AND INVOICES

1. Payment Terms

Payment terms for this contract are net 45 days.

Payment will be made in accordance with the provisions of the California Prompt Payment Act, Government Code Section 927 et. seq. Unless expressly exempted by statute, the Act requires State agencies to pay properly submitted, undisputed invoices not more than 45 days after (i) the date of acceptance of goods or performance of services; or (ii) receipt of an undisputed invoice, whichever is later.

2. Payee Data Record (Std. 204)

Each State accounting office must have a copy of the Contractor's Payee Data Record (Std. 204) in order to process payment of invoices. Contractors are required to provide a copy of their Std. 204 upon request from an agency customer. Agencies should forward a copy of the Std. 204 to their accounting office. Without the Std. 204, payment may be unnecessarily delayed.

3. DGS Administrative and Incentive Fees

Orders from State Agencies:

The Department of General Services (DGS) will bill each State agency directly an administrative fee for use of CMAS contracts. The administrative fee should NOT be included in the order total, nor remitted before an invoice is received from DGS. This administrative fee is waived for CMAS purchase orders issued to California certified small businesses.

Orders from Local Government Agencies:

Effective for CMAS orders dated 1/1/2010 or later, CMAS contractors, who are not California certified small businesses, are required to remit to the DGS an incentive fee equal to 1% of the total of all local government agency orders (excluding sales tax and freight) placed against their CMAS contract(s). This incentive fee is in lieu of local government agencies being billed the above referenced DGS administrative fee.

This incentive fee is waived for CMAS purchase orders issued to California certified small businesses.

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The check covering this fee shall be made payable to the Department of General Services, CMAS Unit, and mailed to the CMAS Unit along with the applicable Quarterly Report. See the provision in this contract entitled "Contractor Quarterly Report Process" for information on when and where to send these checks and reports.

4. Contractor Invoices

Unless otherwise stipulated, the contractor must send their invoices to the agency address set forth in the purchase order. Invoices shall be submitted in triplicate and shall include the following:

- Contract number
- Agency purchase order number
- Agency Bill Code
- Line item number
- Unit price
- Extended line item price
- Invoice total

State sales tax and/or use tax shall be itemized separately and added to each invoice as applicable.

The company name on the CMAS contract, purchase order and invoice must match or the State Controller's Office will not approve payment.

5. Advance Payments

Advance payment is allowed for services only under limited, narrowly defined circumstances, e.g., between specific departments and certain types of non-profit organizations, or when paying another government agency (GC 11256 – 11263 and 11019).

It is NOT acceptable to pay in advance, except software maintenance and license fees, which are considered a subscription, may be paid in advance if a provision addressing payment in advance is included in the purchase order.

Warranty upgrades and extensions may also be paid for in advance, one time.

6. Credit Card

Russ Bassett Corporation accepts the State of California credit card (CAL-Card).

A Purchasing Authority Purchase Order (Std. 65) is required even when the ordering department chooses to pay the contractor via the CAL-Card. Also, the DGS administrative fee is applicable for all CMAS orders to suppliers not California certified as a small business.

7. Lease/Purchase Analysis

State agencies must complete a Lease/Purchase Analysis (LPA) to determine best value when contemplating a lease/rental, and retain a copy for future audit purposes (SAM 3700). Approval by the Department of General Services is not required.

8. Leasing

Except for Federal Lease to Own Purchase (LTOP) and hardware rental provisions with no residual value owed at end term (\$1 residual value is acceptable), Federal GSA Lease provisions are NOT available through CMAS because the rates and contract terms and conditions are not acceptable or applicable to the State.

SEAT Management financing options are NOT available through this contract.

As an alternative, agencies may consider financing through the State's financial marketplace GS \$Mart™. All terms and conditions and lenders are pre-approved for easy financing. The GS \$Mart™ Internet address is www.dgs.ca.gov/pd/programs/statefinancialmarketplace.aspx. Buyers may contact the GS \$Mart™ Administrator, Pat Mullen by phone at (916) 375-4617 or via e-mail at pat.mullen@dgs.ca.gov for further information.

9. Maintenance Tax

The Board of Equalization has ruled that in accordance with Section 1655 of the Sales and Use Tax Regulations of the Business Taxes Law Guide, that whenever optional maintenance contracts include consumable supplies, such supplies are subject to sales tax.

Generally, the State has two options:

1. For contracts that provide for maintenance services (i.e., the furnishing of labor and parts necessary to maintain equipment), the charges for the provision of maintenance services are not taxable.
2. For contracts that provide for maintenance services and consumable supply items (e.g., toner, developer, and staples), the provision of the consumable supplies is considered a taxable sale of tangible personal property. Therefore, State agencies awarding optional maintenance contracts are responsible for paying the applicable sales tax on the consumable supplies utilized during the performance period of the maintenance contract.

The contractor will be required to itemize the taxed consumables for State accounting purposes.

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CONTRACTOR QUARTERLY REPORT PROCESS

Contractors are required to submit a detailed CMAS Business Activity Report on a quarterly basis to the CMAS Unit. See Attachment B for a copy of this form and instructions. This report shall be mailed to:

For the full instructions on completing and submitting CMAS Quarterly Business Activity Reports, and a soft copy of a blank quarterly report form, go to www.dgs.ca.gov/pd/Programs/Leveraged/CMAS.aspx, and then select "For Suppliers/Contractors".

Important things to remember regarding CMAS Quarterly Business Activity Reports (referred to as "reports" below):

- A report is required for each CMAS contract each quarter, even when no new purchase orders are received in the quarter.
- A separate report is required for each CMAS contract.
- Each purchase order must be reported only once in the quarter identified by the purchase order date, regardless of when the services were performed, the products were delivered, the invoice was sent, or the payment was received.
- Purchase orders from State and local government agencies must be separated on the report, as shown in the instructions.
- Contractors must report the sales activity for all resellers listed on their CMAS contract.
- Any report that does not follow the required format or excludes required information will be deemed incomplete and returned to the contractor for corrections.
- Taxes and freight must not be included in the report.
- For CMAS orders dated 1/1/2010 or later, contractors are no longer required to attach copies of purchase orders to their reports. This changed requirement will begin on Q1-2010 reports, which are due 4/15/2010.
- For CMAS orders dated 1/1/2010 or later, contractors who are not California certified small businesses must attach to their quarterly report a check covering the required incentive fee for all CMAS sales to local government agencies (see more information below). This new requirement will start on Q1-2010 reports, which are due 4/15/2010.

- New contracts, contract renewals or extensions, and contract modifications will be approved only if the contractor has submitted all required quarterly reports and incentive fees.

CMAS Quarterly Business Activity Reports are due in the CMAS Unit within two weeks after the end of each quarter as shown below:

CONTRACTOR QUARTERLY INCENTIVE FEES

CMAS contractors who are not California certified small businesses must remit to the DGS an incentive fee equal to 1% of the total of all local government agency orders (excluding sales tax and freight) placed against their CMAS contract(s). This incentive fee is in lieu of local government agencies being billed the above referenced DGS administrative fee.

CMAS contractors cannot charge local government agencies an additional 1% charge on a separate line item to cover the incentive fee. The contractor must include the 1% incentive fee in the price of the products or services offered, and the line item prices must not exceed the applicable GSA prices.

A local government agency is any city, county, district, or other local governmental body, including the California State University (CSU) and University of California (UC) systems, K-12 public schools and community colleges empowered to expend public funds.

This incentive fee is waived for CMAS purchase orders issued to California certified small businesses.

The check covering this fee shall be made payable to the Department of General Services, CMAS Unit, and mailed to the CMAS Unit along with the applicable Quarterly Report. See the provision in this contract entitled "Contractor Quarterly Report Process" for information on when and where to send these checks and reports.

CONTRACTOR PROVIDES COPY OF THE CONTRACT AND SUPPLEMENTS

CMAS contractors are required to provide the entire contract that consists of the following:

- Cover pages with DGS logo and CMAS analyst's signature, and Ordering Instructions and Special Provisions.
- California CMAS Terms and Conditions.
- Federal GSA Terms and Conditions (unless otherwise stipulated in the CMAS contract).
- Federal GSA products, services, and price list (unless otherwise stipulated in the CMAS contract).
- Supplements, if applicable.

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It is important for the agency to confirm that the required products, services, and prices are included in the contract and are at or below contract rates. To streamline substantiation that the needed items are in the contract, the agencies should ask the contractor to identify the specific pages from the contract that include the required products, services, and prices. Agencies should save these pages for their file documentation.

CONTRACTORS ACTING AS FISCAL AGENTS ARE PROHIBITED

When a subcontractor ultimately provides all of the products or performs all of the services that a contractor has agreed to provide, and the prime contractor only handles the invoicing of expenditures, then the prime contractor's role becomes that of a fiscal agent because it is merely administrative in nature, and does not provide a Commercially Useful Function (CUF). It is unacceptable to use fiscal agents in this manner because the agency is paying unnecessary administrative costs.

AGENCY RESPONSIBILITY

Agencies must contact contractors to obtain copies of the contracts and compare them for a best value purchasing decision.

Each agency is responsible for its own contracting program and purchasing decisions, including use of the CMAS program and associated outcomes.

This responsibility includes, but is not necessarily limited to, ensuring the necessity of the services, securing appropriate funding, complying with laws and policies, preparing the purchase order in a manner that safeguards the State's interests, obtaining required approvals, and documenting compliance with Government Code 19130.b (3) for outsourcing services.

It is the responsibility of each agency to consult as applicable with their legal staff and contracting offices for advice depending upon the scope or complexity of the purchase order.

If you do not have legal services available to you within your agency, the DGS Office of Legal Services is available to provide services on a contractual basis.

CONFLICT OF INTEREST

Agencies must evaluate the proposed purchase order to determine if there are any potential conflict of interest issues. See the attached CMAS Terms and Conditions, Conflict of Interest, for more information.

FEDERAL DEBARMENT

When federal funds are being expended, the agency is required to obtain (retain in file) a signed "Federal Debarment" certification from the contractor before the purchase order is issued.

This certification is required by the regulations implementing Executive Order 12549, Debarment and Suspension, 29 CFR Part 98, Section 98.510, Participants; responsibilities. The regulations were published as Part VII of the May 26, 1988 Federal Register (pages 19160-19211).

LIQUIDATED DAMAGES FOR LATE DELIVERY

The value of the liquidated damages cannot be a penalty, must be mutually agreed upon by agency and contractor and included in the purchase order to be applicable.

ACCEPTANCE TESTING CRITERIA

If the agency wants to include acceptance testing for all newly installed technology systems, and individual equipment, and machines which are added or field modified (modification of a machine from one model to another) after a successful performance period, the test criteria must be included in the purchase order to be applicable.

SHIPPING INSTRUCTIONS

F.O.B. (Free On Board) Origin. **Buying agency pays the freight charges.**

State agencies (not local governments) must follow the instructions below for shipping charges exceeding \$50.

All shipments will be made by ground transportation unless otherwise ordered on the Std. 65.

Before placing order, contact the DGS Transportation Management (916) 376-1888 to determine the routing of freight shipments. You will need to provide Transportation Management with the point of origin and destination. They will also want to know the commodity being shipped and the estimated shipping weight of the order. If shipping overnight, the account number must be included.

Routing information should be shown on the face of the Contract/Delegation Purchase Order (Std. 65) in the format shown below.

SUBJECT: Sheriff's Office Vehicles Purchase

Background: On Thursday, April 19, 2018 at 1:30pm Amador County Invitation to Bids 18-08 were received, opened and read publicly for the purchase of two (2) 2018 AWD Utility Interceptor Vehicles and one (1) 2018 4-Wheel Drive, Four Door Expedition for the Sheriff's Office. Two (2) responses were received from: 1) Tracy Ford-Tracy, 2) Ron Dupratt Ford-Dixon. Attached is the Bid Receipt Log.

Lowest bidder for the two (2) 2018 AWD Utility Interceptor Vehicles for the Sheriff's Office (Bid Item #1) is Tracy Ford at \$57,483.92.

Lowest bidder for the one (1) 2018 4-Wheel Drive, Four Door Expedition for the Sheriff's Office (Bid Item #2) is Ron Dupratt Ford at \$41,740.21.

Subject or Key Issue: Award ITB 18-08 for the purchase of vehicles listed above.

Analysis: While the County can take advantage of State contracted (CMAS) vendor pricing, this only remains an option when specific vehicle requirements match the needs of the County. CMAS is the California Multiple Award Schedules (CMAS) that offers a wide variety of commodities, non-IT Services, and IT products and services at prices which have been assessed to be fair, reasonable and competitive. The use of these contracts is optional and is available to California State and Local Government agencies. Additionally, State pricing is not always the best price and limited the FY 17/18 competition pool to eight (8) State qualified vehicle vendors. Experience has taught us that issuing bids to meet our needs often results in greater competition and better pricing. Conversely, when no bidder beats the State pricing, bids may be rejected and then vehicles purchased using the State pricing or the lowest bidder is allowed to match the State pricing. Either way, the tax payers receive the best value for vehicles and in this case CMAS pricing was not an advantage.

Alternatives: These vehicles have been approved through the budget process. No other alternatives have been identified.
