#### A. Call to Order:

The meeting was called to order by Zach Wood at 10:02 with a quorum.

### B. Approve Agenda

Upon a motion by Chuck Beatty and seconded by Zach Wood, the agenda was approved 2-0.

### C. Correspondence

None

### D. Minutes: July 19, 2019

On a motion by Chuck Beatty, seconded by Zach Wood, the July minutes were approved with a correction to spelling of the name Katherine Evatt.

### E. Public Matters: Information items and persons wishing to address the Committee regarding non-agenda items

Bertrand Perroud described the acquisition of the Kirkwood Meadows D

#### F. Agenda Items:

1. Discussion and possible action regarding a request to modify four street identification signs along Kirkwood Meadows Drive at the intersections with Merrill, Wintergreen, Hawkweed, and Fremont. The planned modifications include the addition of 2-inch tall letters below the street name with the text "Private Road." The additional text will maintain the same style of the original street signs. The sign

panels will need to be increase from 8" to 11.5" tall to accommodate the additional text. No other changes are requested. (Bertrand Perroud, Kirkwood Meadows Association)

Bertrand Perroud introduced the proposal to include the word "private" on street signage within existing Kirkwood Meadows Association neighborhoods. The construction and placement of the existing signs would not change. Zach Wood commented that privately maintained right of way and associated signage may not be required to meet the Manual for Uniform Traffic Control Device (MUTCD) standard. MUTCD is the standard required for County and State right of way.

Motion: Chuck Beatty moved to accept the proposed signage, seconded by Zach Wood. Motion carried.

Ayes: Wood, Beatty.

2. Discussion regarding the condition of existing street signs in Kirkwood. (Bertrand Perroud, Kirkwood Meadows Association)

Bertrand Perroud commented that signage was inconsistent and in disrepair throughout Kirkwood valley. Wood and Beatty described signed maintenance standards for Alpine and Amador counties referenced to CalTrans. Bertrand Perroud asked that snow removal best practice to avoid sign damage. Erik Christeson stated that in winter storm conditions that snow removal operations cannot avoid signage. Wood noted that the counties would compare right of way sign standards and share the MUTCD standard for street name signs; Kirkwood stakeholders (KCA and HOAs) could identify sign height and Kirkwood specific construction, material, and color standards.

3. Continued discussion and possible acceptance of the 2017/2018 Parking Analysis submitted May 2018 for compliance with Kirkwood Specific Plan Mitigation Measure 4.7(d)/COA 97. This item was continued to allow KMR to include parking capacity for compliance with MM 4.7(d), and to include calculations for loss of parking due to snow storage. (Kirkwood Mountain Resort)

Brian Bigley introduced the item and described that KMR would use the accepted count methodology for future parking operations.

<u>Motion:</u> It was moved by Chuck Beatty, seconded by Zach Wood, and carried to accept the revised 17/18 Parking Analysis.

Ayes: Wood, Beatty.

4. Discussion and possible acceptance of the 2018/2019 Parking Analysis submitted May 2019 for compliance with Kirkwood Specific Plan Mitigation Measure 4.7(d)/COA 97. (Kirkwood Mountain Resort)

Brian Bigley described that the report includes days when the resort ran out of in valley parking. Bigley noted that the report included information about mitigation measures including employee shuttle and carpooling. Wood asked about the ratio of employee shuttle ridership of employees who live in employer provided housing vs other housing from Tahoe. Bigley described 50% / 50% ratio of shuttle users. Chuck Beatty asked about the KM Drive parking counts including the "West Meadows" parking. Bertrand Perroud described the KMA easement between Wintergreen and Hawkweed with the stipulations related to the resort parking more than five times per year. Perroud noted that the parking for

peak days had declined from the previous year. There was discussion related to the shuttle service on Kirkwood Meadows Dr between Loop Rd and Chicken Feathers.

**Motion:** It was moved by Chuck Beatty, seconded by Zach Wood, and carried to accept the 2018-19 parking analysis.

Ayes: Wood, Beatty.

Eric Christeson gave an update on the LAFCO process for the connection of customers on Highway on a case by base basis. CalTrans Peddler Hill is expected to make an application to the district.

### F. Agenda Items:

1. Continued discussion and possible action regarding the condition and design of existing and future street signs in Kirkwood

Zach Wood provided background from the previous meeting. Brendan described that metal could be a better material for maintenance. Frank Dixon recalled that interest in signs was trigger by KMA sign update to private. Dixon noted that signs are regularly destroyed each winter season. More intricate signs take longer to replace in the summer season. Brendan Ferry asked about existing sign ownership and maintenance information available. Brian Bigley noted that KMR has information about resort signage. Zach Wood described partial sign inventory data collected by Alpine County. Erik Christeson stated that KMPUD maintains hydrant signage and can enforce with ticketing.

2. Discussion and possible action regarding a permit for the removal of six hazardous trees. Pursuant to Appendix 2 of the 2003 Kirkwood Specific Plan, "Tree Ordinance," hazardous trees may be removed prior to permit approval. Applicant: Brandi Benson. Location: 33800 Dangburg Dr, Kirkwood; APN 026-170-003

<u>Motion:</u> It was moved by Brendan Ferry, seconded by Zach Wood, and carried to approve the tree removal.

Ayes: Wood, Ferry.

3. Discussion and possible action regarding a permit for the removal of eight hazardous trees. Pursuant to Appendix 2 of the 2003 Kirkwood Specific Plan, "Tree Ordinance," hazardous trees may be removed prior to permit approval. Applicant: KMPUD. Location: 33540 Loop Rd, Kirkwood; APN 006-010-061

Erik Christeson thanked KMR who had a forester who brought the trees to the attention of KMPUD. The manhole trees have already been removed; the larger trees are pending removal. Brendan Ferry asked if bark beetles were impacting forests in Kirkwood. Erik Christeson described that beetles are uncommon in Kirkwood but could be moving up.

<u>Motion:</u> It was moved by Zach Wood, seconded by Brendan Ferry, and carried to approve the tree removal.

4. Discussion and possible action regarding proposed changes to the Kirkwood Mountain Resort wayfinding signs. Pursuant to Exhibit G of the 2003 Kirkwood Specific Plan, "Sign Ordinance," changes to directional signs are to be reviewed and approved by the Tri-County Technical Advisory Committee. Applicant: Kirkwood Mountain Resort Location: Various existing wayfinding sign locations

Brian Bigley noted that the purpose of the project was to have continuity of design with the re-designed Highway 88 monument sign which was approved. The sign size would be the same as existing the material would be vinyl on aluma panel construction, installed onto the wood sign. There are approximately 12 sign locations. The resort plans to install more flagpole\wayfinding signs. Zach Wood asked about the standard dimensions of the new signage to be added as amendments to the existing sign permits. Wood asked for updates to new sign locations to compare to the previous TC TAC approval.

<u>Motion:</u> It was moved by Brendan Ferry, seconded by Zach Wood, that the signs on the left side of the exhibit are approved.

Chuck and Brian.

After I talked to Tom Tinsley of CDF, I sent him both of your contact particulars and a copy of the Tree Ordinance.

Chuck knows this, but I have thought for a long time that only trees over 6" diameter were affected by the tree ordinance. In reading the ordinance, I see that it is ALL trees. Theoretically, if a landowner cleared all the small lodgepole pine trees within 30 feet of their house, they could be subject to a fine of \$30 x # inches diameter @ dbh x the number of trees. So I guess that if a tree height is less than 4.5 ft., there is no penalty??? Now the next question is, does CDF want the landowners to remove the 2"-6" diameter trees that they see as "ladder fuels"?

One problem is that the inspections that are being done are done from the road. What I want is to meet a CDF inspector at a couple of houses and have them point to the vegetation that has to be removed. One landowner sent me an inspection form saying that he has to take out logs and stumps. This makes no sense to me. Logs and stumps are not like flashy fuels that will ignite quickly.

Tinsley kind of glibly suggested that the solution to the problem is to change the Tree Ordinance. I laughed and told him that he had no idea how tough it was to get the Specific Plan approved. But only you two can tell me if we could make some modifications to the Tree Ordinance that gave the landowners more specifics and then put CDF on the spot to use more discretion in their application of the PRC 4291.

Steve, Chuck - Last week 2 Calfire inspectors from the Camino office dropped by to see me and discuss what they termed as resistance to the 4291 inspections that they have been doing in Kirkwood. They asked if there were any restrictions on cutting trees in Kirkwood. They were particularly interested to see if some small trees in the "understory" that might be over-crowded could be removed. I reviewed the Kirkwood Tree Ordinance with them and gave them copies. The ordinance does not set any size criteria in its restrictions for tree removal. In other words, no exemptions for trees under a certain size.

They also asked about homeowner associations in Kirkwood. I gave them contact information for Bruce Gianola at KCA. I suggested a discussion with him might helpful.

Chuck & Brian,

Recently, I have talked to a couple of people up at Kirkwood that have received inspection notices from CDF about work that is required to be done under PRC 4291. It seems that for some people, CDF is telling them to do stuff that is not allowed under the Tree Ordinance of the Kirkwood Specific Plan.

I talked to Tom Tinsely, Unit Forester for the Amador/El Dorado Ranger Unit and he told me that they have no discretion in applying the requirements of PRC 4291. He agreed with me that the vegetation type at Kirkwood was different than that of lower elevations - little ladder fuels and less likelihood of fire moving from the ground to the crowns. I also said that a fire in Kirkwood was more likely to start IN a house and then move to another adjacent house if the winds were strong enough. A couple of trees might burn, but there would not be a crown fire situation. He agreed but said that if they treated Kirkwood differently from the rest of the state, people would be griping about how preference was given, unequal treatment, etc. Of course, I don't buy that. It just speaks to an inability to be assertive and act professionally. He also suggested that if there was a problem, then the Tri-Tac should just change the Tree Ordinance.

I'm going to check out some of these properties to see if there truly is a conflict between what CDF is requiring and what the Tree Ordinance allows and requires. CDF is threatening to cite the landowners if they don't get the work done after the third inspection. They're suggesting that the DA will have these people in Superior Court. I doubt that Todd Riebe wants to clog his court calendar with a bunch of small potatoes cases, but people are anxious.

Tinsley wants your contact info, so I'm going to send it to him. I don't know how he'll treat this, but he should probably ask to be on the agenda of the next Tri-Tac meeting.

If you have any questions, feel free to call. I'll keep you both updated on what I find up at K'wood.

AEU's Prevention Bureau Chief, Capt. McFarlin and myself are meeting this morning to discuss Kirkwood. I will attempt to make contact with both Mr. Beatty and Mr. Peters this morning as well to start a dialogue pointing out the differences between PRC 4291 and both Alpine and Amador county ordinances/HOA guidelines. Please assist me in getting a meeting between the Defensible Space Inspector, C Hopkins in particular, at Kirkwood. I have received three calls from anxious landowners and I told them that I would meet with CDF and have the inspector walk ON to the property to look at the situation, rather than just stand on the road. I will also talk more to Chuck Beatty and Brian Peters about this.

If I were king of the world, I would amend the Kirkwood Tree Ordinance myself, but that is a process that I think involves CEQA, public review, and a lot of bureaucratic hoopla. I believe that CDF should be able, at the Sacto level, to make a decision to allow discretion in the application of 4291.

Hope to hear from you soon. I will schedule a day next week to be at Kirkwood (Wed, Thur, or Friday)

Dear Mr. Peters,

On the 25<sup>th</sup> of September I visited the residence of Ms Jan Baszucki at 212 East Meadows Drive, Unit A in Kirkwood, CA. The APN of the property is 006-121-003,

The purpose of my visit was to assess the health of the trees on her property and to determine if any of the trees constituted a hazard to her house or to human safety.

What I found was that there are three trees that I would recommend removing and a description of them is as follows:

Tree #1 - An 18" diameter Red fir. It is heavily infested with the parasite Dwarf Mistletoe and has a distinct lean toward the house. The branches of the tree are within two (2) feet of the chimney.

Tree #2 – A 16" diameter Lodgepole Pine. It also has a lean toward the house and has branches within one (1) foot of the eaves of the house. This tree has a bole wound that may indicate root rot.

Tree #3 – A 10" diameter Red fir. This is a suppressed tree, overtopped by other trees near by and it is heavily infested with the parasite Dwarf Mistletoe. Its removal will reduce competition and allow the other trees nearby to thrive.

I marked the trees with their respective numbers in yellow paint. All three are located on the south side of Ms Baszucki's house.




