Funds budgeted are there to support the stated objectives and activities of the Project. This office will remain open and staffed Monday through Friday; all calls and inquiries will be answered as quickly as possible and the needs of victims will continue to be our priority.

This year's budget will fund Project Director/Advocate, one full time and one part time Advocate positions. All staff in this budget are Project funded and give full commitment to this program with no other job responsibilities: our Executive Director, the District Attorney, takes no salary from the grant and both our financial and technical support are provided at no additional charge. Currently all staff is fully trained for victim advocacy and crisis response. We will try to send at least two Advocates to any training for Mass Violence that may be offered. By training both Advocates, we will have some flexibility in staffing, in the event that one is needed to respond somewhere or for any length of time. This budget supports sending two Advocates to the MVA Leave No Victim Behind Conference, FJC conference, NOVA conference and hopefully more trainings and a lot of online webinars to better support our role as Victim advocates. Our program has designated one of the Investigator's in the DA's Office to be assigned to our Mass Victimization Response Team, to address

Advocate safety issues as this team comes together. He will be participating in all local planning and any other reasonable trainings for crisis response he can attend with us. We feel this conference will continue to provide valuable training, shared information and contacts for future team development.

The Project Director/Advocate has been with Victim/Witness for a combined total of 13 years. She has completed all levels of required Advocate training provided by CCVAA, of which she is a member in good standing. She is a certified Senior Victim Advocate, which requires five years of experience, is also certified in Crisis Response and has continued training in Mass Victimization Training. The Projects Advocate is fully trained and certified in Entry Level and Crisis Response training. This past year she has assisted the lead MVA with presentation information, trainings and is working with L.E. and other community agencies to plan a county wide response to any incidents that may occur.

Project staff will attend trainings held locally whenever possible and participate in interagency programs to maximize the outreach we are able to provide.

There is money allocated in this budget for training for the three members of our staff in victim related assistance and specialized trainings for mass victimization incidents whenever they are available; both Advocates will participate in these.

Staff will continue to find affordable, local training opportunities whenever possible.

Our location in the District Attorney's Office affords phone coverage and makes information available to walk-in clients when we are away; it also provides the security of our DA Investigators when necessary. The Director/Advocate is on call to allow for 24/7 Victim/Witness Advocacy if needed.

Since COVID-19 has done a number on us all but add the stress of being involved in a traumatic situation and becoming a witness or worse, victim of a crime. With some of our funds we wanted to create a more warm and zen environment for our victims to come in and talk to us or the prosecuting team. We had the opportunity to get great ideas from San Joaquin family justice center and plan to bring a more comforting and at ease feel into our office and not have it cause any more trauma to our victims and witnesses.

We are in the process of bringing on a new volunteer comfort dog named Lilly. She is an 11 pound poodle mix. Her and her trainer/owner have been participating in comforting at senior centers, grief groups, hospice and more and we feel Lilly will be a great asset to children and all victims during court and interview proceedings who have been through any kind of trauma. We intend

to include them in any MV training as budget permits. Our budget does not allow for the purchase, training and care of a fulltime court/comfort dog, nor is one needed every day. Lilly's trainer/owner has pledged to be available and open for times our program will need her. We are very grateful and look forward to the addition they will bring to the list of services we can provide.

With additional MVA funding, we will purchase more gear, supplies and equipment to support the position and to better prepare our staff for a mass crisis situation. Our newer vehicle has given us the ability to respond to incidents if it is necessary, but to also attend trainings, transport victims to interviews and court and to visit them in their homes. We have never had a vehicle assigned to our Program, so most of our travel has been in our personal vehicles, which at times, creates a safety issue for Advocates.

Amador County covers 606 square miles ranging from gently rolling pastures in the west to rugged mountain terrain in the east; elevations ranging from 250 to over 9,000 feet. The county seat is the City of Jackson, incorporated in 1905. Other incorporated communities are Amador City, Lone, Plymouth, and Sutter Creek; although small by most urban standards, three of these cities have their own police departments. Mule Creek State Prison is in the Northwestern area and houses 3,948 inmates; crime committed on prison grounds are prosecuted in this county, victims and witnesses in these crimes are assisted by this program. Crimes committed at or related to the Jackson Rancheria Casino in Jackson and Harrah's Northern California Casino located in Lone, are both prosecuted here as well. The most recent census lists Amador's population at 41,259, with ethnic breakdown of 89.1% White, 3.0% Black, 15.5% Hispanic, 2.1% Native American and 1.8% Asian alone and 4% Native Hawaiian and other Pacific Islander and Other. This report also places our population over the age of 65 at 27.5%, much higher than the state average at 14.8%.

Staff is the Project Director who performs all the administrative tasks and carries a full victim caseload, one full time advocate and a one part time advocate who are the initial contact for all inquiries for service while providing advocacy

and court accompaniment. We are able to contact victims and we are providing a wider range of services while offering proactive advocacy for basic services. We also have a volunteer who is familiar with our programs and the judicial process, they are able to work on clerical, help with outreach events and other administrative duties in the office. We lost our volunteer comfort dog last year and are lined up to bring in a new trained comfort dog for this fiscal year. Additional funding for the Mass Victimization Advocate position is being utilized. The MVA position is held by our full time advocate, while both the part time advocate and the Director are also trained in Crisis Response. Since our previous MVA Advocate has moved to part time we are transitioning our full time Advocate into the position. My full time advocate will be continuing to form our Mass Victimization Response program; taking over attending all regional meetings via zoom with other counties, community planning sessions and purchasing necessary gear and equipment to assure this programs readiness when an incident occurs. We have met with the Sheriff's Office, lone PD, CHP and Jackson PD and discussed how we can be of assistance if there was a mass victimization incident in our county. We have an MOU drawn up and signed by the Chief of those law enforcement offices and are waiting to get in to see the Chief of Sutter Creek PD. Due to this program being small and

in a rural area, we are designating and cross training both advocates for MVA position. In case of unavailability of one, the other could respond; in an ongoing situation they could spell each other as needed.

In the last year we have collaborated with Operation Care, our local nonprofit DV and SA organization, in hopes to reach more victims and spread the word to the community about the services and assistance we can offer crime victims. We also have worked together to bring awareness in our community for crime victims, their families and survivors of crimes. In October we gathered together with families in our community who have lost a loved one to domestic violence, who have survived domestic violence and we connected with those who work to end domestic violence. The DA gave a speech and community members, law enforcement and local victim service agencies all came together to show support and socialize with each other. We also had a fun interactive week with the community, all our local LE agencies and the other victim resource centers we have in the county for Crime Victims' Rights Week in April. We had an awareness walk, a resource fair and a coffee and donut social. We posted pictures and events on social media and encouraged the community to join us. Each day of the week we would wear a specific color that represented a specific crime to bring awareness. We received a lot of positive feedback and

have started planning more events for the next year for Domestic Violence Awareness month, Child Abuse Awareness month, Human trafficking, Bullying and more. We also went to each of our 5 law enforcement agencies, Probation and the court to deliver "thank you" to all our LE personnel we work with to show our appreciation during Police Week. We have a great working relationship with them and it helps when dealing with Victims and LE calling us and/or referring the victims they interact with our way. We also created small labels made to stick on the first responder cards and provide those to the Sherriff's Office so they can hand them to victims at the time of the incident. We will be reaching out to the other local Police departments to spread the word and offer the first responder cards as well when dealing with crime victims at the time of the incidents for faster turnaround from the time of a crime to our office for services, guidance and help.

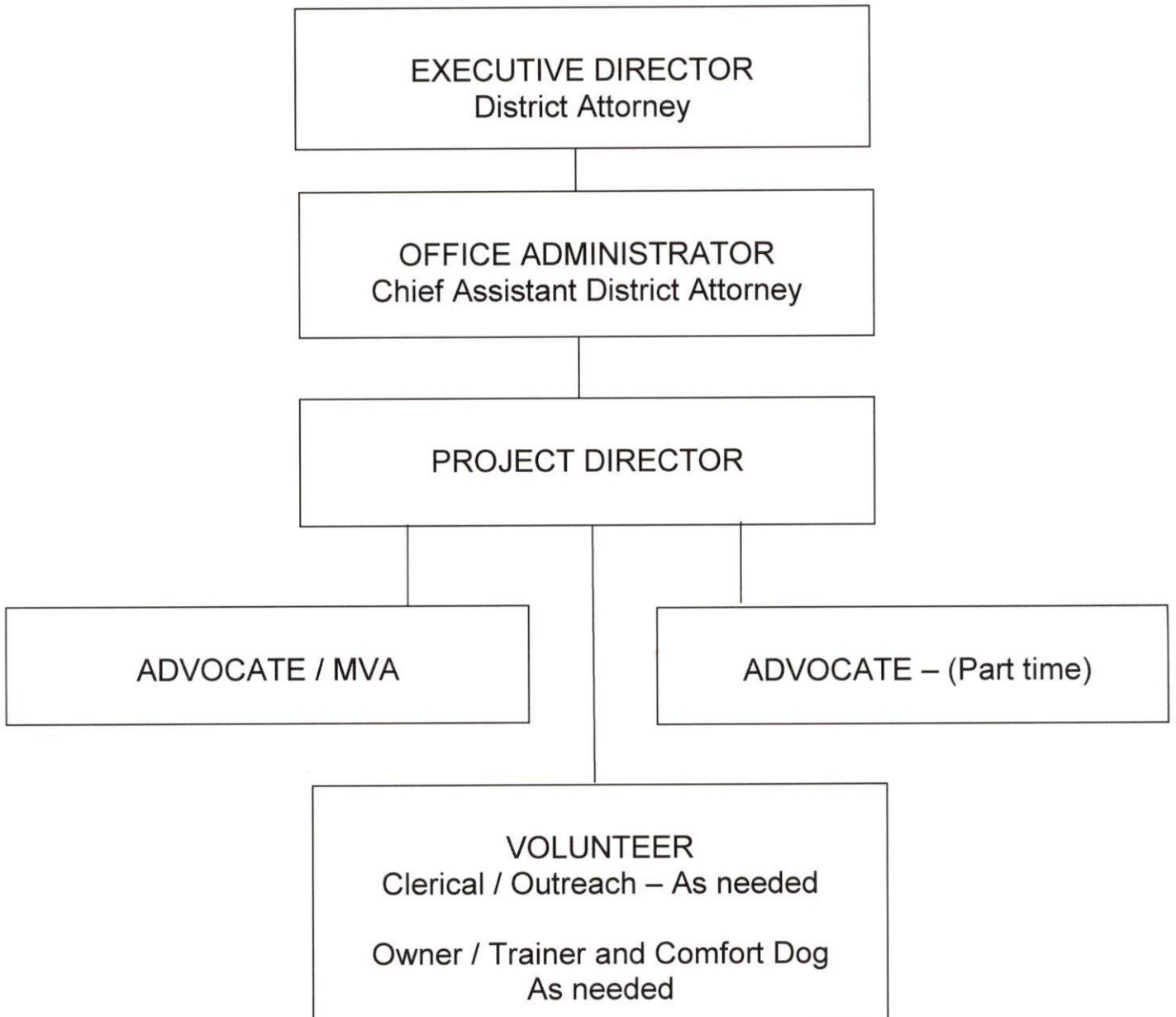

We have reached out to other victim service agencies to assist us with victims as we are all pulled in different directions with daily new crime cases. We are a staff of 3 and that is including the Director and all of us are handling cases. Our county policies do not allow for department fundraising therefore making it more challenging to meet a match. With all the continued and added challenges our county has faced this makes it very unlikely the our Victim Witness Program will be able to continue without a Match waiver.

Referral Counseling: directing victims to community resources which can be of further assistance;

Emergency Assistance: Meeting immediate needs of victims, such as food, shelter, clothing, or medical needs;

Filing Victim of Crime Compensation Claims: Assisting the victim in preparing and submitting application forms to receive compensation from the state Restitution Fund.


We, the undersigned, as authorized representatives of the Amador County Sheriff's Office and the Amador County Victim Witness Assistance Bureau, do hereby approve this document.


This agreement to be in effect until September 30, 2024.


